

Tigers Topple Nezperce, Culdesac

While it may be too early in the season of talk of "winning streaks", none the less Kendrick's boys basketball team did win its fourth basketball game of the current season Monday night, defeating the Culdesac Braves 57-30 on the CHS court. Friday the Tigers took win number 3, a 33-43 victory over Nezperce at Nezperce.

In the Nezperce game, the Indians used good defense in the first quarter to take a slim 13-12 lead at the end of the period. Kendrick started to unwind in the second period and outscored the Indians 15-7 and were ahead 27-20 at halftime.

Traced by the shooting of Jack Meyer, Robert Blair and Troy Hewett, the Tigers hit 16 of 28 shots from the field in the second half for an 57 percent average and they kept well ahead of the Nezperce squad the remainder of the game.

Robert Blair scored 19 points to lead the Tiger attack. Jack Meyer had 16 and Troy Hewett added 11 points.

Nezperce took the Jr. Varsity game in a close 41-39 contest.

Culdesac Beaten

Coch Brent Monroe wasn't completely satisfied with his Tigers' performance Monday evening at Culdesac, but his squad did well enough to roll to an easy 57-30 win over Culdesac.

While the Tigers may not have been hot from the shooting standpoint, they used a good defense to run up a 14-2 first quarter and had stretched it out to 24-7 at the half.

Culdesac did better in the second half, but were still unable to match the Tigers or overcome the huge first half deficit.

The Tigers hit 22 of 61 shots from the floor for a cool 36 percent and were 13 of 24 from the free throw line for 54 percent. The Wolves suffered through a 10 of 52 percent average from the floor for just 19 percent.

Again it was Robert Blair who led Kendrick's attack with 17 points while Brian Parks had 14 points and Jack Meyer had 12. Troy Hewett added 7 points and Rob Vincent 5.

Kendrick's Jr. Varsity team romped to a 69-36 victory.

The Tigers will be back on the home court this Friday for a game with Deary. Next Monday and Tuesday the Tigers will participate in a Christmas tournament at Lapwai then will take a holiday break and won't play again until Jan. 4.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor George Wilson, with all members present.

The Council opened bids for a plain paper copier from a number of suppliers. These will be taken under advisement and a decision made later.

Mr. Ray Trautman was appointed to the Planning and Zoning Commission by Mayor Wilson, confirmed by Council vote.

George Whitted, 77, Genesee Farmer, Passes Dec. 7

George Henry Whitted, 77, a Genesee-area native and retired farmer, died of a stroke Friday at 6:10 p. m. at the Latah Care Center. He had been a resident of the center about two years and in failing health recently.

He was born July 30, 1907, to Henry and Leona Hall Whitted. He attended the Pine Grove school, about 7 miles northeast of Genesee, and farmed in that area for more than 50 years. He moved into Genesee in 1974.

He was married to Ella Lunders, December 17, 1932, in Asotin.

Mr. Whitted had served on a local conservation committee and was a commissioner of the former Lenville Good Roads District. Quiet in manner, he had a wry sense of humor and enjoyed practical jokes, which he played on unsuspecting friends and associates.

His memory was sharp and he could tell his neighbors what had been grown on which fields and could name the year and yield. During his years on the farm, practices changed from horse-drawn plows and steam-powered threshers to four-wheel-drive tractors and self-propelled combines. A series of strokes over the past 12 years left him increasingly incapacitated and eventually he moved to the care center.

He attended the Genesee Community church.

Survivors include his wife at the Genesee home; two daughters, Marilyn Whitted of Seattle and Sharon Merrick of Genesee; a brother, Arthur "Jack" Whitted of Reubens, a sister, Estella Severson of Jerome, and two granddaughters.

A brother, Kenneth, died in 1962.

The funeral was held Tuesday at 2 p. m. at the Genesee Community Church. The Rev. Roger Merndon officiated.

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Survey Shows 30% of Idaho Grain Growers are Planting Their Own Weeds

Twin Falls—There's no other way to put it. More than 13 percent of Idaho Grain Growers are sowing their wild oats—and one in three is planting that or some other weed.

A survey of growers' grain drills throughout Idaho in 1982 and 1983 indicates that grain growers plant an average of 462—and as many as 4,365—seeds of wild oats per acre.

According to Steven Dewey, weeds specialist with the UI Cooperative Extension Service who coordinated the survey, grain growers inadvertently sow an average of 5,188 seeds of 31 varieties of weeds per acre.

This occurs because weed seeds are harvested with grain and later find their way into next season's drillbox.

About 350 samples were collected from all Idaho counties during the two-year survey. UI weeds researchers analyzed the contents of grain drills, identified the kinds and numbers in each sample, and then calculated the number of weeds that growers were planting per acre in their wheat and barley fields.

Dewey said drillbox surveys are "quite involved and time-consuming, so they're not done very often." A previous survey was taken about 10 years ago in Idaho, with strikingly similar results. Dewey noted that no new weeds were found in the latest drillbox survey.

Wild oats occurred in the highest percentage of all the grain samples analyzed. Downy brome, or cheatgrass, was the second-most prevalent weed. It was found in more than 7 percent of the overall samples.

Dewey noted that the average level of infestation by downy brome was quite high—with nearly 1,900 seeds being planted per acre. "That should have a tremendous impact on reduction of yield," he said.

At the top of the list following wild oats and downy brome were wild buckwheat, lambsquarters, field pennycress, pigweed, prickly lettuce, wild mustard, sunflower and foxtail.

Canada thistle, near the bottom, was found only in 0.6 percent of the samples, even though it is very common in Idaho's small grain fields. Dewey attributed the low number to the fact that much grain is harvested before many Canada thistle seeds mature, but he noted that Canada thistle can spread without seed.

A recent publication by the Weed Science Society of America, "Crop Losses Due to Weeds in Canada and the United States," indicates that weeds reduce yields in the Northwest by 7 percent in potatoes, 12 percent in barley, 13 percent in wheat and corn, 14 percent in beans and 20 percent in sugarbeets.

Using those figures, Dewey estimates weeds reduce the value of those six crops in Idaho by about \$135 million.

"The weed situation is getting worse, not better, and the losses continue to increase," he said.

"According to Dewey, growers' 'main line of defense' is not planting weed seeds. They should buy certified or registered seed, which will greatly reduce the number of weed seeds in the drillbox, or they should have their own home-grown seed cleaned at a reputable seed-house, he said.

"Once weeds are in a field, it's very difficult to totally eradicate them. It's virtually impossible if you have a lot of them."

The concert is one of the most popular traditions on the UI campus for the Christmas season and should be of special interest to area residents, he noted.

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NEW PROGRAM PUTS UNIVERSITY FACULTY IN PUBLIC SCHOOL ROOMS

Coeur d'Alene—A new idea in cooperative teaching is being tried in Coeur d'Alene schools this fall.

The project, "Building Bridges Toward Mastery," brings University of Idaho faculty members together with Coeur d'Alene High school teachers in the public school classroom.

Jack Dawson, director of the UI Coeur d'Alene Education Center, said "the idea was to work to build a bridge between a school district and a university. The feedback we have been receiving from both sides has been positive."

UI faculty in English, history and biological sciences spent the early part of the fall making plans with the secondary teachers about the information to be presented to the high school students. An appropriate level of difficulty and complexity was selected for development into a three week enrichment unit, to help the high school teachers upgrade their knowledge in the subject area.

Faculty guidance was offered to provide the teachers with sufficient content background to prepare the specific lesson designs. The faculty members helped with planning and design of the unit instrumental components and then spent some time this month helping to team teach the unit.

The program is funded by a grant from the Northwest Area Foundation is located in Minneapolis, Minn. UI faculty members who participated were, Kurt Olson, Ruth Windhover, Dave Barber and Walter Resford, all of the English Department; Kathy Alken, of the History Department, and Rodney Mead, Richard Wallace and Doug Henderson, all of the Biological Sciences Department. The Coeur d'Alene School District teachers involved were Warren Olson, English; Sandy Kravik, history; and Carol Jones, biological sciences.

The project is expected to foster stronger links between the university course content, with the exception of education, and the public school faculty. It is hoped that through in-service meetings with other teachers, those involved in the project can increase the cooperation between faculty at higher education institutions and their counterparts in the public schools.

Dawson said more will be known about the success of the program when the evaluation process is complete sometime early in 1985.

"The Departments of Biological Sciences and English have both indicated desire to continue the program. We don't know what the format will be yet."

Decisions as to the scope of such continuation can't be made until funding possibilities have been explored, he said. The grant funding the Program for this fall was one-time.

COLD TEMPERATURES WITH ANIMALS

Exposure to severely cold temperatures can cause many problems with animals. Animals which are accustomed to winter conditions can withstand long periods of sub-freezing weather without ill effects; yet even these animals may get cold injuries under certain circumstances.

The key to preventing cold injuries in outside animals is to keep the animal dry, sheltered from the wind, and to provide plenty of good quality feed. This applies not only to livestock but also to dogs, cats, chickens, rabbits, etc. An important part of feeding animals is providing ample amounts of fresh, clean water; a task that becomes increasingly difficult as the mercury plummets.

The body parts most susceptible to cold injury are the extremities—legs, feet, ears, tails, and teats. When temperatures get extremely cold the small blood vessels in the extremities constrict to allow more blood to flow to central part of the body. This shunting of blood is a way of maintaining a "core temperature."

An animal will maintain a core temperature at the expense of superficial body parts. Maintaining a core temperature is the bodies way of protecting vital organs such as heart, liver, and brain from temperature fluctuations.

If circulation is decreased or halted in an extremity then it is more prone to cold injury. This can happen with a sick animal that is reluctant to stand or move around during cold weather.

Born new animals require special attention during times of cold. This is especially true for baby pigs. Piglets need to be kept warm and draft-free their first few days of life, even during mild weather. Calves and lambs are often born

ABOUT YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

In January 1985, some changes will become effective for Social Security. Here are some of those changes:

The first concerns divorced spouses' benefits. Beginning in January, a divorced spouse can receive benefits at age 62 whether or not her or his former spouse receives them. The former spouse must be eligible for local Security benefits, e.g., age 62 or older, regardless of whether he or she has retired or applied for benefits. They have to be divorced for a least two years. The marriage must have lasted for at least 10 years and then divorced spouse cannot be married.

This provision avoids the necessity during periods of cold weather, yet they suffer few ill effects if they are dried off quickly and fed some warm milk. Their mothers dry them by licking them vigorously which not only stimulates the newborn but also helps the mother identify the baby as her own.

During prolonged periods of cold weather cattle and sheep do not digest their feed as efficiently as they do during warm weather. Because of this decreased digestibility and the need for more energy to keep warm, animals need to eat much more feed during cold spells.

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for some divorced spouses to wait several years beyond their own retirement or otherwise fails to apply for benefit before they can begin to draw benefits. The two year requirement is designed to avoid any incentive for divorce solely for purposes of taking advantage of this new provision.

Also in January, there will be some increases in Medicare. The Part B medical insurance monthly premium that you pay or that is withheld

from your check, is going up from \$14.60 a month to \$15.50 a month. Part B medical insurance helps pay for part of the treatment you received from a doctor, home health agency, emergency room, or physical therapy, and so forth. Part B pays 80% of the allowable charge after you pay the first \$75. The \$75 deductible applies to the whole year.

Medicare Part A hospital insurance also a deductible which will

increase from \$356 to \$400 effective January, 1985. You pay the deductible then Part A pays the rest of the hospital charges. The deductible is good for a sixty day period. This means if you enter the hospital and its been over 60 days since you were last in the hospital, then you have to pay a deductible again.

If you remain in the hospital for more than 60 days, then you pay \$89 a day from the 61st through the 90th days. This will increase to \$100 a

day effective January 1985. Also for hospital stays beyond 90 days the patients costs will go up from \$178 to \$200 a day. Medicare hospital insurance will then pay the rest of the charges.

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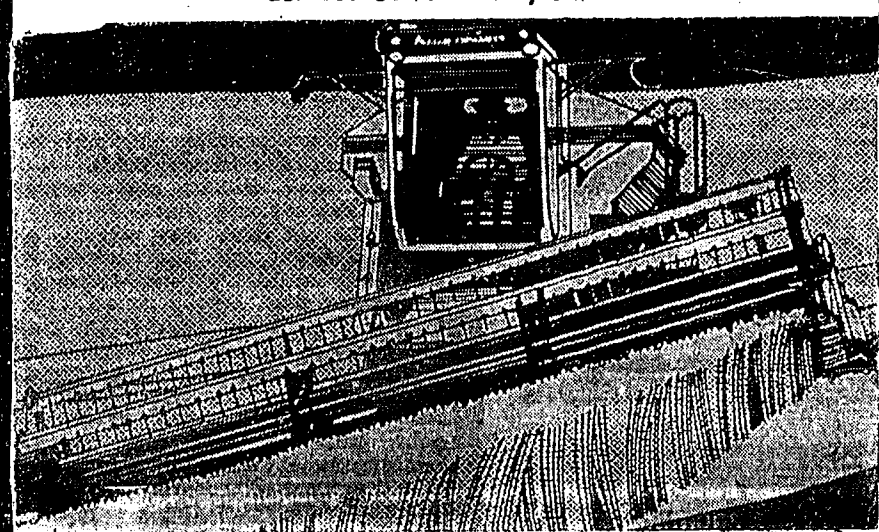
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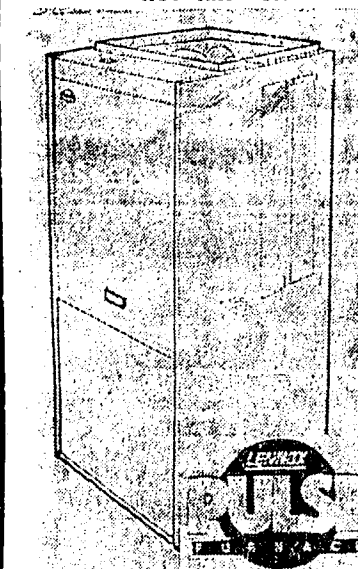

**UI SCIENTISTS GIVE PAPER
AT AGRONOMY MEETING**

Moscow—Winter precipitation often causes the fall applications of nitrogen to winter wheat to be leached from the soil before the wheat plants are ready to use it in the spring.

Studies being conducted by L. K. Lutchter, a University of Idaho scientific aide, and R. L. Mahler, assistant professor of soil science, show that applying nitrogen and herbicide together in the spring as

a liquid resulted in better weed control and higher yields than application of the nitrogen in the fall and of the herbicide in the spring.
These results were reported in a technical paper presented at a recent meeting of the American Society of Agronomy.
