Tigers Top Deary, Grangeville for Hoop Win 5, 6

The Kendrick Tigers had little trouble this past week racking up victories 5 and 6 in as many games as the boys team trimmed the visiting Deary Mustangs 79-47 Friday night, then went to Lapwai's Christmas tournament Monday night and crushed the Grangeville Bulldogs 71-32. Lapwai defeated Nezperce the same evening and will meet the Tigers Tuesday night.

Deary Outgunned

Coach Brent Monroe saw his Tigers score 23 points in the first quarter last Friday night while holding the visiting Deary Mustangs to an ice-cold 4 points and then roll on to an easy 79-47 win for the KHS squad's fifth victory.

Kendrick used the power of Jack Meyer and Robert Blair on the inside and got lots of help from guards Troy Hewett and Mark Harris on defense as they were out in front 40 to 15 at the half.

Monroe had his team exert the pressure of an effective man-to-man defense to stymie the Mustangs on offense and the Tigers were able to force many turn-overs during the contest.

Blair led Kendrick with 21 points with Meyer close behind with 20. Brian Parks added 12 points, Rob Vincent 9, Troy Hewett 8 and Tom Gibbins 6.

Derrick Eggers of the Mustangs scored 22 points in the losing effort. The little Tigers took the Jr. Varsity game 45-27.

Grangeville Swamped 71-32

The Grangeville Bulldogs had no answer for the power of the Tiger attack Monday night in the opening round of action in the Lapwai Christmas Tournament and went down to a 71-32 defeat. The was the 6th win for the boys from KHS.

Kendrick used its tall men—Jack Meyer and Robert Blair to dominate the back boards as the Tigers scored 18 points in the first quarter and then exploded for 27 points in the final quarter of play to turn the contest into a rout.

The Tigers started out the game using a man-to-man defense, then went into a zone defense and forced the Bulldogs to shoot from the outside, which they didn't do well.

Kendrick hit 30 of its 64 attempts from the field for a respectable 47 percent average and was an even 50 percent from the foul line—11 to 22. Grangeville, reflecting the pressure of the Tiger defense managed only 14 of 70 shots from the field for 20 percent.

Jack Meyer scored 26 points and 11 rebounds, Robert Blair scored 12 points, but pulled down the ball 20 times, Troy Hewett scored 10, Mark Harris 3, Brian Parks 14, Rob Vincent 3, and Tim Gibbins 2.

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IDAHO AMONG THE TOP FEW STATES IN CANADA THISTLE INFESTATION

A recent survey of Canada thistle infestation throughout the United States indicates that Idaho ranks either first or second in the extent of its woes with this weed.
 Lloyd Haderlie, weeds researcher at the UI Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Aberdeen, said Wyoming may have more affected acreage, but because of a difference in the way its infestation was reported, the two states cannot be directly compared.
 County weed supervisors in Idaho estimated that about 2.3 million acres in this state are infested with Canada thistle.
 The next most infested state was Washington with an estimated 1.9 million acres, then North Dakota with 1.6 million and Montana with 1 million.
 Wyoming authorities estimated the number of acres of the weed itself—rather than the number of crop or range acres at least partially infested. It total was 138,000 acres. Haderlie said comparable figures were not available for Idaho.
 Haderlie sent the survey to Departments of Agriculture in each state. It included questions on whether the weed was considered noxious, in what number of counties it was found, and how much acreage was infested.
 Noting the difficulty of compiling representative figures on weed infestations, Haderlie said the survey results "are probably as accurate as we're going to get. I think it's reasonable to say that Idaho is one of the top few states in the nation in Canada thistle infestation."
 He said he believes Idaho ranked as high as it did because "it is certainly well adapted to Canada thistle."
 "I think one of the main reasons is because of the Snake River and its tributaries," he said. "The seed floats down the rivers—and there have been several studies done to show that Canada thistle seed is still viable after spending a great deal of time in water."
 The weed poses the greatest pro-

blems in wheat and barley, followed by rangeland, said Haderlie. He noted that it is found in all Idaho crops, but least frequently in those that are intensively cultivated.
 Canada thistle, a perennial weed, has an extensive root system that provides an energy reserve as rich in sugar as sugarbeets. The weed grows later in the season than other weeds, and propagates readily from seedlings and from root sections as small as one-half inch.
 Canada thistle can send up new shoots from a depth of several feet, and roots that are unable to send up shoots can still survive up to five years in the ground.
 In addition, it does not require a period of dormancy, so it can sprout whenever conditions are right, making it difficult for growers to time herbicide applications for vulnerable periods.
 "Within three weeks after a seed germinates—in spring, summer or early fall—it can have a root that is perennial," said Haderlie. "We have found that these roots can spread as much as 8 yards in one summer."
 Highly effective herbicides are available, Haderlie said, but the degree of control depends on the conditions under which the thistle is growing.
 The weed is most easily controlled in crops that are harvested by the first of September, said Haderlie.

extension professor and extension soils specialist, says one of the effects of soil acidity is its influence on the availability of plant nutrients, especially phosphorus.

Trials using lime and phosphorous treatments on winter wheat and spring peas have been made. The results show that lime and phosphorous can both increase yields when soil is acid.

McDole said, in addition, when the

two are applied together, there is a further increase in yields, indicating an interaction between lime and phosphorous in the soil.

Now the increased yields from both lime and phosphorous appear to give marginal economic returns to the grower, he said. "As the use of nitrogen fertilizer continues, the need for lime will undoubtedly increase." The results of McDole's work are discussed in a technical paper he

presented at a recent meeting of the American Society of Agronomy.

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
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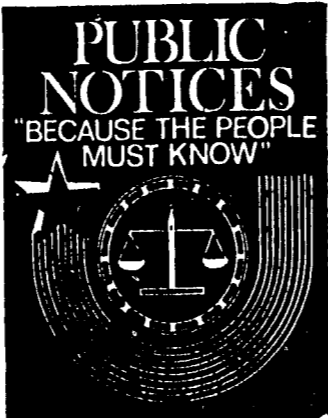
