Part of Social Security Benefits May be Taxable

Up to half of the Social Security benefits received by people in 1984 may be subject to Federal income tax, but mainly only for those who had substantial income in addition to their benefits.

In fact, only one person in ten will actually pay any tax on any part of his or her Social Security benefits.

Every person who received or reported any Social Security benefits in 1984 will receive Form SSA-1099, Social Security Benefit Statement, before the end of January. The form will show the net amount of Social Security benefits received in 1984 and this is the figure a person should use to figure if any of his or her benefits are subject to tax.

IRS Notice No. 703 will be included with Form SSA-1099. This is a worksheet that people can complete to see if any of their Social Security benefits may be subject to Federal income tax.

Up to half of a person's benefits may be subject to tax if his or her combined income—taxable income plus non-taxable interest plus one-half the Social Security benefits—exceeds a base amount. The base amount is:

- \$25,000 if a person files as a single taxpayer.
- \$32,000 for a married couple filing jointly; or
- \$0 for a married person filing a separate return if he or she lived with his or her spouse any part of 1984.

The amount of benefits subject to tax if combined income exceeds the base amount is the smaller of:

- One-half of the amount over the base amount; or
- One-half of the Social Security benefits.

If combined income does not exceed the base amount, no Social Security benefits are subject to tax.

People can get the answers to questions about entries on Form SSA-1099 by calling the toll-free number 1-800-200-1099 which is also shown on the form. This toll-free number will be in operation after January 7, 1985. Questions about figuring taxable income or figuring taxes should be directed to the nearest IRS office that is shown on the back of Notice 703. In Idaho, the number is 1-800-424-1040 and the same in Washington.

A free publication—Publication 915—explains the entries on Form SSA-1099 and how to figure if benefits are taxable. Free copies can be obtained by calling the IRS office, or the Social Security Office.

Weight Reduction Program Begins January 18

A twenty lesson weight reduction series will begin January 18, according to University of Idaho and Latah County Extension Home Economist. The series is designed to cover topics relevant to the serious dieter.

During the series the group will learn a computerized analysis of diets, learn to recognize stress and ways to cope, try some behavior modification techniques, set up a regular exercise program; and learn how to cook to lose weight, plus learn how to eat away from home on a diet; these and many other topics.

Classes will start January 18, 1985 and run to May 31, 1985. The sessions will be held each Friday at 12 noon in Room 2-B of the Latah County Courthouse.

Fee for the class is \$15 plus \$5 for those requesting CEUs, to cover materials. A 25c per pound refund will be given to participants at the last class.

Wheat Growers Face Not-So-Rosy 1985

With export demand for white wheat continuing to lag, the 1985 outlook Pacific Northwest wheat industry is not promising, in the opinion of economists at the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University. In a year-end report that is being published this week, the economists said "significant increase in the price of white wheat in 1985 are not likely."

The 1984 wheat crop in the Pacific Northwest totaled 350 million bushels—a decrease of 15 million bushels from 1983. However, white wheat harvests in Michigan and New York were good, contributing to a further increase in U. S. white wheat stocks.

"Farm-level wheat prices in the Pacific Northwest have dropped about 30c per bushel from year-earlier levels, but the loan rate appears to have established a price floor, preventing further declines in the market," the economists said.

White wheat exports declined in 1984 and no great improvement is expected in the export market in 1985," they added. "For the first time in several years, Pacific Northwest export prices have stepped below comparable export prices for soft red winter wheat at the Gulf. This places white wheat in the status of 'cheapest wheat,'" they said.

The economists continued: "Although record carryover stocks of white wheat next May are forecast, a large percentage of that carryover will likely be tied up in either the farmer-owned reserve or the Commodity Credit Corporation's stocks. Widespread participation in the 1984 farm program has allowed Pacific Northwest producers to place wheat under loan, providing a price floor and temporarily removing those supplies from the market."

The Soviet Union will again make large purchases of U. S. grain in 1984-85, the economists said. USSR purchases are expected to account for 8.5 million metric tons of wheat and 12 million metric tons of feed grain.

U. S. wheat production in 1984 totaled 2.57 billion bushels—a 6 percent increase over 1983. "The large crop, combined with 1.4 billion carryover stocks will result in total available supplies this year of over 3.9 billion bushels," the economists said.

The Board's agenda will include: A presentation by the Director of Lands, Stan Hamilton. He will provide information concerning a proposed logging sale in the area of Round Lake State Park. No action will be taken.

Discussion and possible action on a request that the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation (IDPR) sponsor development of Three Meadows Group Camp on Dworsnak Reservoir.

Discussion and possible action on the future of Spring Shores Marina on Lucky Peak. Options include continued operation through a concessionaire under the management of the IDPR, or return of the leased area to the land owners. The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. The latter would allow the Corps to negotiate directly with a concessionaire.

Farm Production Cost Picture Improves as Inflation Moderates

Farm production costs increased an additional 3 percent in 1984, but the rate of increase was moderate as compared to the double-digit rate that prevailed during the 1977-81 period. The encouraging statistics were reported this week in a year-end economic report, issued jointly by the agricultural colleges of the University of Idaho, Washington State University and Oregon State University.

"Overall, the prices farmers pay for production items will likely increase by less than 2 percent in 1985. The wage rate increase should be 2 percent to 3 percent for the U.S., with somewhat higher rates for the Pacific Northwest. Lower interest rates on agricultural loans can be expected in 1985, but will lag several months behind changes in the financial market," the report said.

The economic forecast noted these developments affecting farm production costs:

—With ample supplies of fertilizer on hand, the fertilizer industry is not expected to increase prices in 1985. Fertilizer prices did increase 8.5 percent in 1984. Farmers' use of fertilizer increased 14 percent as cropland that had been idle under the federal government's payment-in-kind program went back into production.

—Prices of agricultural chemicals rose 2.4 percent in 1984. Government review and possible restrictions may affect prices of selected chemicals in 1985. On the other hand, expiring patents on several major herbicides will help keep prices down. Also serving as a check on price rises will be the industry's increased production of synthetic pyrethroids.

—Farm machinery sales will continue to be depressed in 1985. Many farmers are unwilling or unable to assume any additional debt for major machinery acquisitions. Although minimal increases will be made in the suggested retail prices of farm machinery in 1985, these increases will be offset by larger sales discounts and liberal financing.

—Fuel prices should remain unchanged during 1985. The range of power rate increases in the Pacific Northwest will be quite broad, but increases will average 6 percent to 8 percent. To control their costs, farmers will be interested in converting to more energy-efficient systems or improving the efficiency of existing

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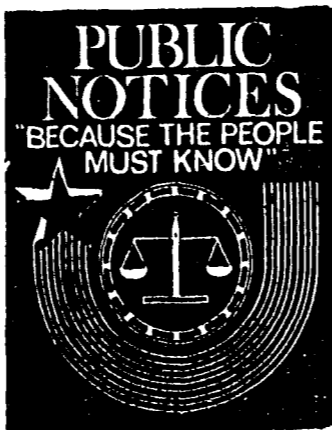

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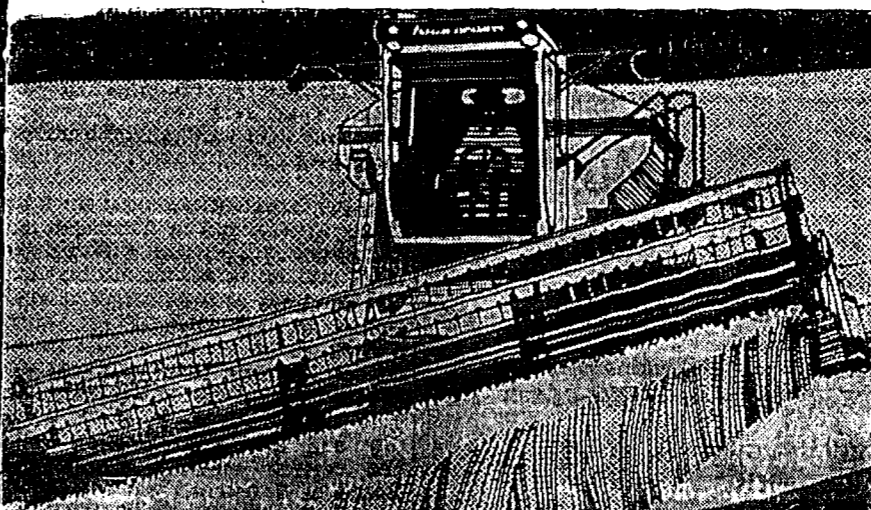
