Bladder Infection in Cats-

Bladder disease in cats is characterized by the formation of mineral crystals in the bladder. These crystals, often called sand, irritate the lining of the bladder, can form bladder stones, or can partially or completely obstruct the urethra.

Female felines have a fairly short and large diameter urethra that allows much of the sand to pass without causing an obstruction. The mineral crystals still irritate the lining of the bladder and urethra, however, high energy food in a short amount so infections and inflammation of the lower urinary ttract often occurs.

Male cats have a long urethra that is relatively narrow thereby predispsoing them to urethral blockage. For this reason, bladder disease in male cats is usually more serious and requires attention much sooner than the same problem in females.

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

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
