produce a toxin which accounts for the clinical signs of disease.

In the case of overeating disease, the toxin that is produced causes damage to blood vessels throughout the body. The brain is very sensitive to changes in vascular integrity and is one of the first areas of the body affected by the disease. The kidneys are also radically affected by effects of the toxin which can be evidenced as a so-called pulpy kidney on post-mortem examination.

Overeating disease is prevented by administering a vaccine that protects an animal from the affects of the toxin produced by the bacteria. In response to the vaccine an animal's body builds anti-bodies that protect it against the toxin. A vaccinated animal may have a colony of the bacteria proliferating madly, but the toxin they produce is neutralized. The bacteria are robbed of their ability to cause harmful effects.

urine, frequent urination, depression, and frequent attempts to urinate without results. If blockage occurs then loss of appetite, vomiting, weakness, severe depression, and death may also be seen. Cats in stages of bladder disease may begin urinating in unusual areas.

Feline urinary syndrome is not caused by a single factor. It is the result of a combination of factors that can lead to the formation of sand in the bladder. These factors include obesity, inactivity, decreased water consumption, and high levels of dietary magnesium.

Most cats will recover from bladder disease if treated early. Feline urinary syndrome can recur, but is less likely to if the patient is und-

er proper dietary and medical management. Some drugs can help prevent the formation of mineral crystals in the bladder and special diets that a low in magnesium decrease the likelihood of new crystal formation.

Overeating Disease—

Overeating disease is a term applied to a digestive malady caused by bacteria. Overeating disease, also called pulpy kidney disease, is a worldwide disease of livestock.

Overeating disease occurs mainly in lambs but may also affect adult sheep, goats, calves, and in rare instances adult cattle. The bacteria that cause the disease are normal inhabitants of the digestive tract; however, the bacteria are present only in small numbers in normal animals.

The disease occurs when the bacteria that cause the problem suddenly and explosively increase in number. This occurs when a susceptible animal ingests a large amount of high energy food in a short amount of time. Thus the name of overeating disease.

Overeating disease usually affects the lambs or calves that are in the best condition. Single lambs sucking well fed ewes and animals in feedlots are very susceptible.

The usual sign of the disease is unexplained sudden death in an apparently healthy and vigorous lamb or calf. Affected animals may show little more than just a decreased appetite and dullness before succumbing. Convulsions may occur before death.

The bacteria that causes overeating disease is closely related to bacteria that cause tetanus, botulism, and black-leg. All of these bacteria

Bladder Infection in Cats—

A common problem in cats is bladder through tubes called ureters, logic syndrome (F. U. S.). F. U. S. affects both sexes; however, the clinical signs of bladder disease are usually different in the male or female because of a difference in urinary tract anatomy.

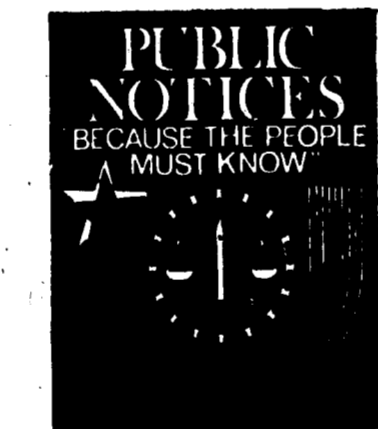
The kidneys empty into the bladder through tubes called ureters, one for each kidney. The bladder excretes stored urine through a single but larger tube called the urethra. The length and diameter of the urethra differs for each sex and, in part, the difference in clinical signs of F. U. S.

Bladder disease in cats is characterized by the formation of mineral crystals in the bladder. These crystals, often called sand, irritate the lining of the bladder, can form bladder stones, or can partially or completely obstruct the urethra.

Female felines have a fairly short and large diameter urethra that allows much of the sand to pass without causing an obstruction. The mineral crystals still irritate the lining of the bladder and urethra, however, so infections and inflammation of the lower urinary tract often occurs.

Male cats have a long urethra that is relatively narrow thereby predisposing them to urethral blockage. For this reason, bladder disease in male cats is usually more serious and requires attention much sooner than the same problem in females.

Symptoms of bladder disease include straining to urinate often accompanied with vocalization, bloody

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14.9 Million Kokanee Eggs Taken on Granite Creek

A near-record 14.9 million kokanee eggs were recovered in this year's spawn-taking operation on northern Idaho's Granite Creek, according to Evan Parrish, Department of Fish and Game.

The eggs went to hatcheries at Sandpoint, Mullan and Clark Fork where they will be reared to fry size and released next summer, the state fish hatcheries manager said.

Most of the fry are destined for Lake Pend Oreille in a continuing program to rebuild the kokanee population and another batch will go to Priest Lake, Parrish said.

Washington state got 1.8 million surplus eggs from the total take after the three Idaho hatcheries were filled to capacity, he said.

Release of as many as 20 million fry a year is not too far down the line. Bids for the Cabinet Gorge Hatchery near Clark Fork have been opened and are under review and wells already are being drilled at the site, Parrish said.

"When Cabinet Gorge comes on line, we can free up the other northern Idaho hatcheries for production of other species," he said. Cabinet Gorge construction is financed by the Bonneville Power Administration and Washington Water Power Company as mitigation for the loss of spawning grounds in the Clark Fork drainage.

The department will maintain and operate the new hatchery, Parrish said.

Eight-man crews, most of them from the department's Region 1, worked three days a week from late

Amendment Would Strengthen Civil Penalty Statute

An amendment to strengthen and clarify the law requiring mandatory civil penalties for certain wildlife violations is expected to be one of the Department of Fish and Game proposals to come before the 1985 Idaho legislature.

The measure is in response to a legislative auditor's report that more than \$54,000 in reimbursement damages were ordered by the courts and not paid and magistrates did not order almost \$78,000 in damages, as apparently required.

Existing law imposes a mandatory penalty, upon conviction, of \$1,000 for each caribou, bighorn sheep, mountain goat or moose illegally killed or wasted; \$500 for each elk; and \$200 for each deer, antelope, wild turkey, whistling swan and sturgeon.

October through December to take the eggs, Parrish said.

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The proposed amendment specifies that reimbursement damages must be imposed even if withheld judgments are granted.

Another provision would require that a judgement of reimbursement be entered rather than an order for reimbursement to ensure that such judgement must be enforced in the same manner as any other civil judgment.

Another provision would specify that if damages are allowed to be paid in installments, they must be paid within a year from the date the judgment is entered. A defendant's hunting, fishing or trapping privileges would be revoked until payments are completed.

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
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Stony Point
