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

Obesity in Animals

Obesity is a common problem in animals and although it occurs most in household pets rather than livestock, it can be a problem in any have little trouble maintaining a trim physique, while other seem to add weight with every morsel they

Obesity is nothing more than an accumulation of body fat that usually occurs from too much food and too little exercise (sound familiar?). Obesity can be caused by abnormal metabobolic states that occurs with certain diseases and glandular dys. functions, but the most common cause is taking in more energy than the body needs

Overweight animals are more susceptible to health problems. Excess weight can put adverse strain on joints and muscles, may hide the effects of other conditions, and is associated with a shortened life-span Obese animals are less active, which lessens the quality of their life and decreases an owner's enjoyment of heir pet.

Obesity can cause or worsen many problems including arthritis, heart disease, lung, disease, liver disease, and diabetes. Overweight animals are more prone to heat stress, often have a lowered resistance to infectious diseases, and have more propatients pose a problem for surgeries because they have an increased anesthetic risk and have an increased amount of tissue to contend with,

The easiest way to tell if an animal is overweight is to feel its ribs. Some animals with heavy hair coats or muscular bodies can hide thinness or obesity quite well. Generally speaking, the ribs should be easily felt. In obese animals the ribs can be difficult to feel. This is only a general rule of thumbs. Some animals with excess weight may have easily felt rib cages.

Reducing the weight of an animal can be accomplished by decreasing caloric intake and increasing exercise. Pets should be be given a routine physical examination to check for any metabolic or physical problems that may be harmful. Weight reduction programs should be tail-

ing on the species, the amount of excess weight, breed, age, sex, and health of the animal. Many dogs, for instance, benefit from a program

that including withholding all food for a short period of time followed weight is reached.

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
