**Tigers Top Troy, Culdesac For 13-2 Record**

Kendrick High School's boys basketball team ran its season record to 13-2 this past week by adding victories over Culdesac on Monday, Jan. 21, and then ripping the Troy Trojans Friday night at Troy. Kendrick disposed of Culdesac on the Tiger court 54-37 and then had little trouble with the Troy team 70-41.

The Tigers control the Class A-4 Whitepine league with an 11-0 record.

**Culdesac Beaten**

The Tigers were never in trouble last Monday night against the visiting Culdesac Wolves as they cruised to a 54-37 win. Kendrick was ahead 13-9 at the end of the first quarter and took a 25-18 lead into the dressing room at halftime.

Jack Meyer scored 16 points for the Tigers. Meyer hit seven of 13 field goal attempts and sunk two free throws. The Tigers led in rebounding with 43 with Meyer pulling down 10 of those. As a team the Tigers hit 25 of 63 floor shots for a 39 percent mark. From the free throw line the Tigers made only 4 of 19 for a 21 percent average.

The Kendrick JV team won in a run-away 59-28.

**Trojans Topped 70-41**

The Tigers banged the boards from the floor at a 55 percent rate (27 of 49) and hit 15 of 21 free throw attempts for a 71 percent average, and came out of last Friday night's contest with the Troy Trojans with a 70-41 victory. This league win was the 11th for the Tigers who have yet to lose to a A-4 team.

**Kendrick Peas Bound for Africa**

John Harris of Brocke and Sons, Seedsmen, Inc., moves out part of the 40,000 pounds of dry green peas which have been donated for the starving people of Ethiopia by Kendrick area growers. The Kendrick peas will join similar gifts of wheat donated by growers in the Colfax area for the relief of the drought-stricken African nations.

The initial idea for this project came when area farmer Ted Meyer contacted George F. Brocke, Jr., to ask if there was a way he could donate some of his harvest to the needy. Brocke soon found that other farmers, businessmen and private citizens were equally anxious to help.

Within a few weeks enough peas and cash donations had been raised to pay the freight to Olympia where they will be loaded on a ship bound for Africa.

Brocke and Sons donated the processing and handling in Kendrick and then also trucked the peas to Toppenish, Washington without charge where they were prepared for overseas shipment. From Toppenish the peas were taken to the Port of Olympia and loaded on ships under the sponsorship of "World Concerns", a reliable relief agency that is also arranging the wheat from Washington.

Geo. Brocke said this week that adequate donations were received to pay for the transportation costs to Africa.

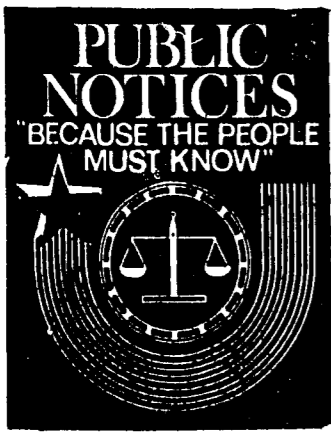

**Idaho Shade Tree Book  
Published by University**

Everything you need to know about Idaho shade trees is included in a new book from the Forestry, Wildlife and Range Experiment Station at the University of Idaho.

"What's Wrong With My Shade Tree" examines diseases and insect problems that can affect shade trees and provides a guide at the front of the book that allows homeowners to identify and control most problems that can occur with the bark, leaves or needles of trees.

Written by Arthur D. Partridge, professor of forest pathology for the UI College of Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences; Donald P. Hanley, extension forester of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics at Washington State University; Daniel L. Miller, research forester for Potlatch Corporation; and Donald A. Stinton, a former graduate assistant in UI's College of Forestry, the book was designed to identify and control common shade tree problems in Idaho.

The booklet includes photo illustrations of major shade tree problems and describes ways to control damage caused by herbicides, frost, dogs and insects such as caterpillars, spiders, borers or diseases including Dutch Elm disease, scales, rust mold or blight.

Key recommendations in the book include cautious pruning, proper wound care, careful watering, fertilizing and applying pesticides. But the major recommendation is to give proper care to trees.

"Care, not money, assures a healthy, attractive tree for many years," the book says and gives numerous tips on tree care.

The 54-page booklet costs \$4 and is available from the Editor, Forest, Wildlife and Range Experiment Station, University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho 83843.

**Obesity in Animals**

Obesity is a common problem in animals and although it occurs most in household pets rather than livestock, it can be a problem in any species. Some animals (like people) have little trouble maintaining a trim physique, while other seem to add weight with every morsel they eat.

Obesity is nothing more than an accumulation of body fat that usually occurs from too much food and too little exercise (sound familiar?). Obesity can be caused by abnormal metabolic states that occurs with certain diseases and glandular dysfunctions, but the most common cause is taking in more energy than the body needs.

Overweight animals are more susceptible to health problems. Excess weight can put adverse strain on joints and muscles, may hide the effects of other conditions, and is associated with a shortened life-span. Obese animals are less active, which lessens the quality of their life and decreases an owner's enjoyment of their pet.

Obesity can cause or worsen many problems including arthritis, heart disease, lung disease, liver disease, and diabetes. Overweight animals are more prone to heat stress, often have a lowered resistance to infectious diseases, and have more problems with flatulence than animals that are not obese. In addition, obese patients pose a problem for surgeries because they have an increased anesthetic risk and have an increased amount of tissue to contend with.

The easiest way to tell if an animal is overweight is to feel its ribs. Some animals with heavy hair coats or muscular bodies can hide thinness or obesity quite well. Generally speaking, the ribs should be easily felt. In obese animals the ribs can be difficult to feel. This is only a general rule of thumbs. Some animals with excess weight may have easily felt rib cages.

Reducing the weight of an animal can be accomplished by decreasing caloric intake and increasing exercise. Pets should be given a routine physical examination to check for any metabolic or physical problems that may be harmful. Weight reduction programs should be tailored to the individual animal depend-

ing on the species, the amount of excess weight, breed, age, sex, and health of the animal. Many dogs, for instance, benefit from a program that including withholding all food for a short period of time followed by reduced rations until a desired weight is reached.

Abrupt loss in weight and abrupt increases in exercises can be harmful to any animal. Pets needing exercise should start out slow and gradually be allowed to increase their activity. Similarly, it should take 10 to 15 weeks to make an obese animal trim.

Charles A. Lorang, the son of Genesee pioneers, died at Seattle Dec 30 of congestive heart failure. He was 82.

The youngest of 10 children, Lorang was born Sept. 9, 1902, to John and Mary Lorang. He attended Genesee schools and moved to Spokane in 1916. He graduated from Gonzaga High School in 1920, and then from Northwest Business College, both at Spokane.

He worked at Spokane for the Old National Bank and Federal Land Bank. He later moved to Seattle, where he was chief accountant with Associated Shipbuilders. He retired in 1962.

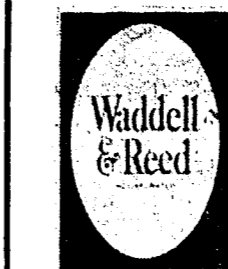
