

Boyd-Freer Nuptials at Genesee Church



Tracy Lee Boyd, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas G. Boyd, Genesee, was united in marriage to Mr. David James Freer, son of Mrs. Earl Sanders of Coeur d'Alene and James Freer of Spokane on Friday, December 28th at 7 p. m. in the Genesee Community Church. Reverend Melford Knight, Wapato, Washington, officiated at the double ring candle-light service with Reverend Roger Herndon, pastor of the church, assisting. The bride's parents, Beverly and Tom Boyd were married by Reverend Knight in the same church on June 6, 1951.

The altar was decorated with a circle of tiny evergreen boughs. An arrangement of boughs, pink carnations, baby blue iris, heather and baby's breath surrounding a white wedding candle, flanked by burgundy tapers, centered the altar. An evergreen swag, with satin bows of white and light burgundy, was arranged on the wall. Bouquets of evergreen boughs, pink carnations, blue iris, heather, and baby's breath centered with burgundy tapers were arranged on the church windows. Brass candelabra held candles of burgundy set in evergreen boughs, flanking the altar. Candle lighters were Jeff Boyd, the bride's brother and John Freer, brother of the groom. The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore her mother's wedding gown. It was of antique white slipper satin and chantilly lace, fashioned with a cathedral length train. The veil, of fingertip length, was of double layered illusion net trimmed in chantilly lace. It fell from a cap trimmed with tiny seed pearls. The bride wore a single strand of pearls, a gift from her mother, and the traditional blue garter. Her bouquet was of orchids, pink rosebuds, daisies, and pink carnations set with antique white bows trimmed in soft burgundy and gold.

Newborn Animals and Cold Weather

Newborn animals require special attention during times of cold; which is especially true for baby pigs. Piglets need to be kept warm and draft-free for their first few days of life, even during mild weather.

Lambs and calves born in frigid weather survive quite well if their mother or the herdsman take proper care of them. Livestock born outside need to be dried as soon as possible. The mother does this by licking the baby until it is relatively dry. Allowing prospectant mothers to give birth in sheltered areas that are dry and draft free greatly enhances the survivability of the newborn.

It is important that the newborn receive nourishment soon after birth. Warm milk helps to increase the bodies internal temperature but also provides needed energy for the body to keep itself warm. The first milk that cows and ewes produce is a protein rich secretion that has protective substances that help the baby ward off disease. This first milk is called colostrum and it is very important that the newborn receive colostrum within 8 hours of birth.

Lambs and calves that become severely chilled shortly after birth may not be able to survive. These animals are reluctant to stand and are not interested in sucking. Their nose is often reddened and may be crusty.

Their joints may be puffy, painful, and swollen. Their ears droop and if they stand they arch their back in a humped-up position.

New born that are severely chilled can be warmed rapidly by placing them in hot water for 30 minutes to an hour. The temperature of the water should be 105 to 110 degrees Fahrenheit. Heat lamps and blow dryers can also be used to warm chilled animals. Caution should be used to prevent burns from placing heating devices too close to the skin.

The body parts most susceptible to cold injury are the extremities. When cold becomes extreme small blood vessels near the surface of the body constrict to allow more blood to flow to central parts of the body. This local decrease in circulation protects the internal temperature but makes the extremities more prone to cold injury. This is important in sick animals that are reluctant to stand or move around and in newborns that cannot stand or suck because of cold stress.



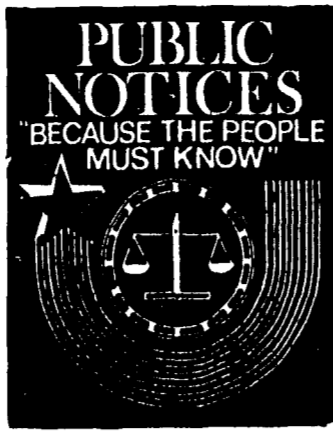
