



Rabbits need a high protein diet of neat little pellets. to produce such an abundance of meat, but they have unique digestive characteristics that enables them to utilize protein efficiently. Rabbits combine the digestive aspects of rumimant animals like cattle and non-ruminant animals like pigs to efficiently utilize their feed.

Rabbits require little space. A cage approximately 3 feet by 4 feet with a nest box is all that a doe and litter require. Cleanliness is important, so cages usually have wire floors, enabling urine and feces to fail through. Metal feed troughs and porcelain watering bowls are commonly used because they are relatively easy to keep clean.




