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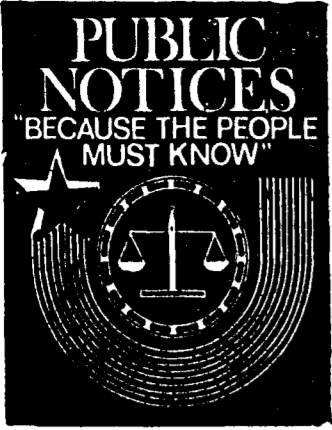

**Dual Careers Challenging,
Say UI Husband-Wife Team**

Pursuing dual careers is no picnic, but it can be done without disastrous consequences. Ted and Marilyn Murray are living proof of it.

The Murrays are counseling psychologists at the University of Idaho Student Counseling Center. Both have doctorates, both share domestic responsibilities equally, and both agree mutual support is the key to making their relationship work.

Speaking at a luncheon program at the UI Women's Center earlier this week, the Murrays reflected on their careers, their marriage and the stages they've gone through over the years.

They met 14 years ago while pursuing their doctor of education degrees and, as Marilyn put it, "We considered ourselves co-equal students. Whatever competition there was between us was friendly. Neither of us thought of ourselves as the 'star' of the relationship and the other just a supporting player."

Remembering their early days at UI, Marilyn said she and Ted went through almost a complete role reversal of traditional husband-wife responsibilities.

"I was working full time at the Counseling Center while Ted mostly stayed at home in our tiny trailer. There were some negative elements about it. I came home from work, dropped on the couch and expected Ted to have a drink and dinner ready for me."

Ted noted that after their first child was born, their relationship entered another stage. Both began working half-time and for awhile felt they were co-equals again as they had been in graduate school.

"Frankly, while Marilyn was working full time and I wasn't, I really felt less than her equal. I think it's hard on a dual career relationship when one person's career advances faster than the other's," Ted said.

He said he felt there was difference between a "two-career marriage" and a "two-paycheck marriage."

"In the first, both partners try to climb their respective career ladders equally. In the second, there most likely is only one 'career' involved, although that's not slam against the paycheck or the possible job satisfaction that may be forthcoming," Ted said.

Marilyn said children definitely increase whatever stress may already exist in a two-career relationship, particularly when the parents are "older."

"Our youngest child is just 2, and Ted and I are both approaching 40, an age when most parents' with children are already into their teens. The point is that our stamina for coping with young children just isn't

Animal Topics

Parasitical Trivia—

Trivia seems to be popular these days; therefore, I'll list some trivia about animal parasites. Veterinary parasitical trivia, as it were.

Fleas spend most of their lives off the host while lice never leave their hairy homes.

The common liver fluke of cattle requires a snail to complete its life cycle. The snail this fluke needs has to have a shell that coils to the right (a right-handed snail). No other type of shell will do.

Pinworms lay their eggs around the tail-head of horses and cause an anal itch. Dogs and cats don't get pinworms. "Scooting" in dogs is not caused by worms.

An important stomach worm in cattle actually "hibernates" in the winter. This parasite goes through 4 larval stages before becoming an adult. When the temperature decreases in the fall the larva enter the

what it would be if we were 10 years younger. So we share domestic responsibilities."

Ted said he and Marilyn keep their expectations realistic. They know they can't be perfect parents, perfect counselors and perfect housekeepers all in one, so they don't add to their stress level by trying to be all things at once.

"If something is an irritant for one of us, the person feeling irritated either takes care of the situation or shuts up about it. If I don't like to see a few dirty dishes in the sink when I come home, I wash them myself. I don't keep hassling Marilyn about why can't she pursue a career and take care of the dishes at the same time," Ted said.

The Murrays felt there has been little scientific research about the consequences of two-career marriages because the subject is difficult to assign to a particular field of study, and because there aren't many funds available to make the research possible.

Said Ted, "Frankly, I feel another big reason is because members of the 'New Right' are fighting this kind of research. They think the results would conflict with their concept of family values. This despite the fact recent statistics show nearly 55 percent of American families are now two-paycheck families, mostly out of necessity."

wall of the stomach and will stay dormant for months. When the weather again becomes warm enough for the worm to complete its life-cycle the arrested larva come out of the stomach wall and become adults. The adults produce eggs that are deposited on the pasture with the feces to be picked up by another host. No one knows how the worms can tell when it's time to enter the stomach wall or when it's warm enough for their eggs to survive on pasture. I like to think they send scouts out everywhere in a while to check things out.

Blood worms in horses are the number one cause of colic (gut pain). Blood worm larva occasionally plug up small arteries that supply the gut. When an intestinal artery is ob-

structed the portion of the intestine it supplies can stop functioning if another artery doesn't re-establish adequate blood supply.

Rocky Mountain spotted fever is not caused by ticks. It is caused by a microorganism that reproduces in the tick and is injected into a susceptible individual when the tick feeds.

Dogs and cats can get tape worms from fleas, from eating mice, rats, muskrats, and rabbits. Another type of tape worm found in many species of fresh-water fish can infest cats, dogs, pigs, bears, and man. Infections in man comes from eating raw fish or raw caviar.

An uncommon worm that is transmitted by face flies infects the eyes of animals. Eye worms have been found in cattle, sheep, goats, horses, dogs, cats, and deer.

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Use of Aspirin for Children Could be Serious Threat Warns Health Service

In the midst of the flu season, important new information has become available about the development—in teens and children with flu—of Reye syndrome, a rare but serious condition that kills 20 to 30 percent of its young victims and leaves many survivors brain-damaged.

The new information comes from a U. S. Public Health Service pilot study of a possible link seen in four earlier state studies between the use of aspirin in treating flu or chicken pox and an increased risk of Reye syndrome.

The Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Science has reviewed the pilot study and found "strong support" for the link.

Although personnel from the Food and Drug Administration, the National Centers for Disease Control will continue the study through next winter, the Institute of Medicine advised that the federal government not wait to inform and protect the public.

As a result, Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret M. Heckler has asked manufacturers to remove any recommended use in flu and chicken pox from aspirin-containing products aimed at children—and to add a warning to all aspirin-containing products against use for flu and chicken pox in children and teens.

The pilot study looked at the histories of drug treatments and other factors of 29 young people who got Reye syndrome last year. Use of aspirin for flu or chicken pox symptoms was the common thread shown

in 28 of the 29 (whereas ordinarily less than half the young people with flu or chicken pox would be expected to take aspirin.)

U. S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, M. D., has said that most childhood illnesses are self-limiting and usually don't require any medication at all. Doctors often suggest that a child with fever simply be made comfortable with cool compresses.

Of course, physicians continue to find aspirin useful and safe for adult, teen and childhood arthritis and other conditions.

Reye syndrome is a rare condition—a few hundred cases a year. It was named in 1963 for an Australian pathologist who described it as a swelling of the brain, combined with liver malfunction and blood chemistry disorders leading in most cases to death.

Improved recognition and early treatment of the disease has helped reduce the death rate, but still about one out of four reported cases are fatal.

It is crucial to take action quickly

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if Reye's symptoms occur—whether or not aspirin or an aspirin-containing product has been used. The first sign is generally persistent vomiting. The young person may be sleepy and lethargic, but still responsive. Within half a day, he or she can become disoriented, combative and delirious. Untreated, the teenager or child can go into a coma and die.

Thus, Reye is a medical emergency. A child with Reye syndrome symptoms must be taken immediately to a hospital, where blood and body fluids can be monitored and a respirator used if breathing fails. Surgery may be needed, in some cases, to relieve pressure on the swollen brain. Therefore, act promptly if you suspect Reye syndrome.

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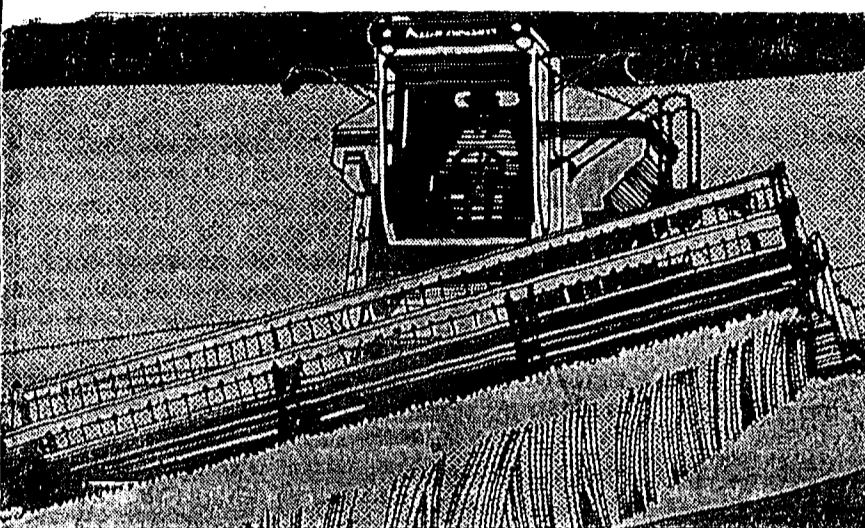
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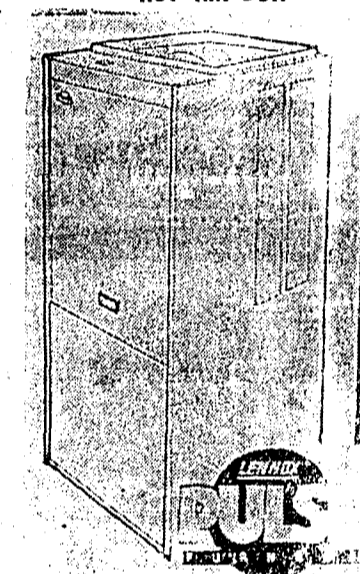
