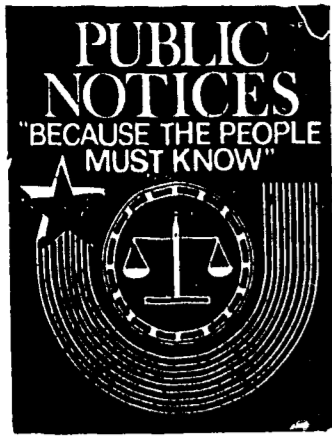

Animal Topics

Selenium is a mineral that is needed in the diet for good health; however, selenium is only needed in very small amounts—one of the so called micronutrients. All animals require selenium in their diet, but deficiencies of selenium are of the most concern in cattle and sheep.

Some areas of the United States are deficient in selenium in the soil. A notable area is the Great Northwest. Selenium is a volatile component of the earth's crust and when our area was being formed by volcanic activity most of the available selenium was wafted into the upper atmosphere and blown eastward with the prevailing winds. Plants grown on selenium deficient soils are deficient in this important nutrient and livestock that eat these plants also become selenium deficient.

There are several diseases that respond to selenium supplementation. "White Muscle" disease is perhaps the most widely known problem resulting from an inadequate intake of selenium. Selenium deficiency can cause a muscular dystrophy that affects both skeletal and cardiac muscles. The disease is more prevalent in young, rapidly growing animals and may be precipitated with a sudden increase in exercise.

A common scenario is to see problems in lambs and calves in the winter after they have overexerted themselves running and playing on a rare sunny day. A few hours later they walk stiffly, may lay down on their side and refuse to get up, and

may have trembling limbs. It is not uncommon for these animals to die by the following day. "White muscle" disease will also affect foals and piglets.

Other diseases caused by selenium deficiency or that respond to feeding selenium are retained placentas, reproductive inefficiency, poor weight gains, bone marrow abnormalities, and mulberry heart disease in pigs.

Diagnosis of selenium deficiency in cattle and sheep can be done with a blood test that determines the amount of a selenium-dependent enzyme in red blood cells.

Prevention of selenium deficiency is easiest to accomplish by feeding adequate levels of selenium in a salt/mineral mix. Newborn lambs and calves can be given an injection of selenium and vitamin E to help prevent "white muscle" disease. The injection will form a depot in the tissues that supplies selenium to the animal for 30 to 40 days.


