As we grow up we are told instead we are told that Santa Claus represents the Christian spirit of Christmas. He represents love, caring, sharing, giving and concern for others. 

The ear mite's life cycle takes about three weeks. Eggs are cemented to the skin and hatch in about four days into a larvae. The larve feeds for a few days then changes into a nymph form. This nymph feeds for awhile then melts before a second nymph stage which will become an adult.

Diagnosis of the car mites is relatively easy. Pets will scratch vigorously at their ears; often stopping suddenly while walking or running to sit and scratch the base of the ear in an attempt to relieve the irritation. Often an animal will scratch the hair away from the base of the ear and continue to dig with his claws until a sore has been produc-




