Pre-engineering workshop set at University of Idaho

Once again this summer the University of Idaho College of Engineering in conjunction with the Junior Engineering Technical Society, JETS will sponsor a 2-week pre-engineering workshop for outstanding high school students who may be interested in a career in engineering or physical sciences. This will be held on campus for June 30 to July 12, 1985.

Students attending the workshop are instructed and exposed to topics including computer programming, computer graphics, engineering economic, statistics and the engineering problem process. Each year these topics are explored using a 'real world' problem which is examined and solved in the classroom. Two college credits are awarded upon successful completion of the course. The estimated cost for this year's program is \$260. Some limited financial assistance will be available on a competitive basis to particularly needy individuals.

The primary focus of the workshop is for students who have completed their junior year of high school and have a sound academic record, aptitude and interest in science and mathematics. Normally applicants should have completed 3 years of high school math, have a 3 plus overall GPA and some knowledge of a computer language; however, some tutorial assistance will be available in this latter area.

ABOUT YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY Earning Additional Benefits

A person who returns to work beginning to get Social Security retirement benefits may qualify for higher benefits because of the additional earnings, Ila Andrews, Social Security Field Representative in Pullman, said recently.

It is not necessary for the worker to take any action in such cases. Social Security automatically refigures the benefit after the additional earnings are credited to the worker's record. People should, however, tell Social Security if they expect to earn more than the annual exempt amount.

The annual exempt amount of earnings for 1985 is \$5,400 if you are under 65 and \$7,320 if you are over 65. There is no limit after age 70.

In addition, a worker's benefits can be increased by 3 percent a year one-quarter of 1 percent a month,

FELINE LEUKEMIA

Feline leukemia virus infections are a relatively common problem in pet cats. The name "feline leukemia virus" is somewhat of a misnomer because this contagious viral infection causes many other problems besides leukemia.

Leukemia is a disease characterized by an excessive production of white blood cells and a concurrent decrease in red blood cells. White blood cells circulate in the bloodstream and help the body to ward off infections, help fight tumor formation, and police the blood for foreign substances. White blood cells are produced in the bone marrow and a feline leukemia virus induced leukemia in primarily a bone marrow disease. It is almost uniformly fatal, although a few cases of partial or complete remission have been reported.

There are many other disease processes that are associated with feline leukemia infection. These "associated diseases" will impair a cat's immune system—the system that consists of lymph nodes, spleen and white blood cells. Impairment of the immune system limits the body's ability to fight infections from other viruses, bacteria, and fungi. Pneumonia, mouth sores, skin problems, anemia, gastrointestinal problems, and abortions may result. Fever, loss of appetite, and depression are often present. These "associated diseases" of the feline leukemia virus can mimic many other

problems.

There are some very reliable blood tests that can be performed to determine if a cat has an active feline leukemia virus infection. A positive blood test doesn't always mean a cat will die from the viral infection; in fact, a cat has a 40% chance of rejecting the virus and recovering from an infection. 30% of cats don't develop feline leukemia disease but retain the virus in their systems and become carriers able to infect other cats but never becoming sick themselves. The other 30% of positive cats develop persistent infection that eventually leads to death.

A vaccine has recently been developed that will protect a cat against the feline leukemia virus. It is a good policy to test some cats prior to using the vaccine. If a blood test indicates the cat has already been exposed to feline leukemia virus then the vaccine will do little good.

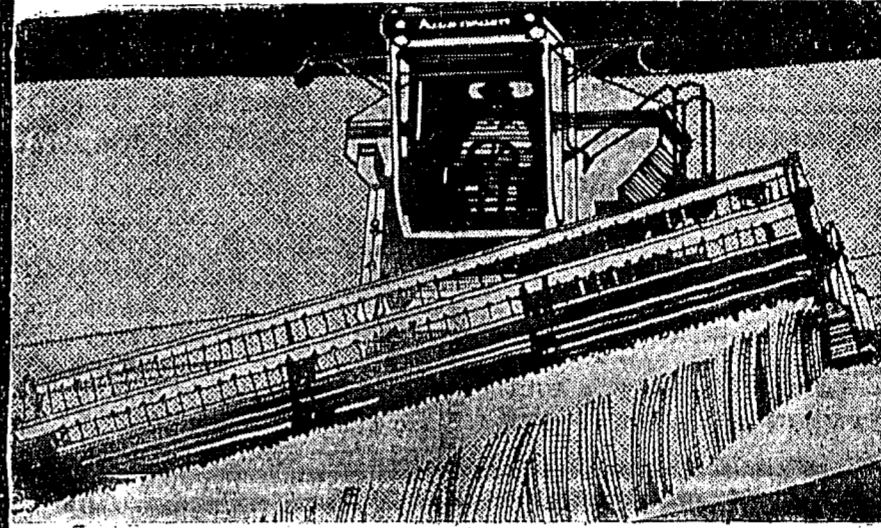


