## Teachers re-hired by Genesee board

The Board of Trustees met at their regular monthly meeting April 8, 1985, at 7:30 in the office of the superintendent. The board acted on the following items:

1. Accepted the resignation of secondary special education teacher, Priscilla Crawford.
2. Approved the hiring for the 1985-86 school year of the following continuing contract teachers: Verla Peterson, Cindy Crawford, Mary Whitcraft, Cheryl Bielenberg, Vaughn Overlie, Kathy Walker, David Aiken, Rowena Smith, William Adley, and Linda Turnbull.
3. Approved a contract with Washington Water Power Co. for converting a boiler to natural gas.
4. Approved a contract with the U. of I. for cooperating with student teacher placements for the 1985-86 school year.
5. Approved a contract for landscaping the front of the building and the installation of plants and scrubbery.

In addition, the board heard reports and discussed the following items:

1. Anticipated projects for the Summer maintenance program.
2. Installation of radios on the buses for the 1985-86 school year.
3. Implementation of a discipline policy for the 1985-86 school year.
4. An insurance program sponsored by the Idaho School Boards Association.
5. Status of the high school library program by district librarian Vaughn Overlie.
6. Anticipated revenue for the 1985-86 school year. May 2, 1985 was set as the date for a public meeting to present the proposed budget to patrons of the district.
7. May 21, 1985 is the date for trustee elections. Martin Stout's Zone 5 is up for election. Polls will be at the foyer of the gymnasium for Latah County patrons, and the Ralph Baumgartner residence for NezPerce County residents. Polls will be open from 11:00 a. m. until 8:00 p. m. An anticipated override levy was discussed for the same date but no decision was made.
7. Reviewed a request by social studies teacher, Carol Coleman to assist with travel expenses of students to the state Idaho History Day Contest. Ten students from the Genesee high school were finalists in the competition and will go to Boise on April 27, 1985 to compete in the state competition. The board agreed to provide a chaperone and travel expenses.

## Because "it's a nice town"— Genesee receives \$3,000 bequest

The regular Genesee City Council meeting of April 8, 1985 was called to order at 7:50 by Mayor George R. Wilson. Present were Councilmen Michael Martinez, Michael Johnson, David Wagar, and Ronald Zenner. Also present were the city clerk, city supervisor and city attorney.

Visitors at the meeting included Dave Baumgartner of Springers Insurance, Kurt Blume of the Rural Fire Department; Jay Nelson, Latah County Commissioner, and Nancy Grieser.

County Commissioner Nelson was present to discuss the fact that the current Latah County Building Inspector, Del Owens, has retired. Latah County has contracted with the City of Moscow to handle the unincorporated portions of Latah County, but each city is responsible for their own inspections at the present.

The City of Genesee will begin at once to contract with an inspector. Springer's Insurance and Farm Bureau each submitted a bid for the city insurance policies. The council took the bids under advisement and will study them and make a decision at a special meeting to be held Monday, April 15, 1985 at 7:30 p. m. at Genesee City Hall.

Kurt Blume was present to discuss the fact that since the new telephone system for the fire department was installed last year, the Rural Fire Department and the City of Genesee were to be dividing the monthly bill for the telephones so each would pay half of the bill. This has not been done and the Rural Fire Department has requested reimbursement from the City of Genesee.

Michael Johnson, Fire Commissioner, will work with the Fire Department to make arrangement for payment of the reimbursement and future bills. Nancy Grieser was present to discuss the Child I. D. project she has been working on with several Genesee organizations. Through the various groups Mrs. Grieser has contacted, around \$300 has been raised to be used to purchase booklets in which information about each child will be recorded. Mrs. Grieser will continue to work with Councilman Johnson and Police Chief Lobello on this project.

This week the City of Genesee received \$3,000 from the Estate of Hazel May Ouse. The money was left to the City of Genesee because, "Genesee is a nice town." The money will be included in the 1985-1986 budget.

## Tigers pound Lapwai, Culesac in baseball

The Kendrick High School baseball team tucked another win under their belt Tuesday afternoon, defeating Culesac 13-5 in a non-league game.

Ron Hewett, John Gravelle, and Tom Woods shared the pitching job on the mound, allowing a total of five hits, four base on balls, and striking out nine batters.

The Tigers roared with 17 hits. Once again, Brian Parks lead Kendrick with his bat, roping a ball to centerfield for a 3-run home run in the first inning, followed by two doubles. Ron Hewett also had two doubles while both Brenden Millard and Lonnie Powers each doubled.

And singles poured off the Tiger's bats again: by Robert Jones, Tom Woods, Scott Morey, Tony Henson, Jim Woods, Lonnie Powers, James Morey, Rob Vincent and John Gravelle with two.

The Tigers now enjoy an overall winning record of 3-2.

Over a hundred Tiger fans watched the Kendrick High School baseball team defeat Lapwai Monday afternoon with a 3-5 victory.

Kendrick played heads-up ball both defensively and offensively. The double play in the third inning made the crowd buzz. While bases were loaded with Wildcats and only one out, Tiger third baseman John Gravelle grabbed a hot grounder to touch his base for an out, then fired the ball to first baseman Brenden Millard for another out to end the inning and Lapwai's scoring threat.

Then, in the last inning, when Millard eyed a Lapwai baserunner sauntering into third base, he drilled the ball to teammate Gravelle at third to tag the runner out.

Tiger pitcher Rob Vincent hurled the full seven inning game, walking 8, hitting 3 batters, but striking out 7 Wildcats and allowing them only 2 hits.

Gravelle's double started the Tigers scoring in the first inning. And the Tigers never let up. Both catcher Jim Woods and shortstop Ron Hewett each smacked a double and a single. Singles kept rolling off the Tiger bats by Vincent, Millard, and second baseman Robert Jones. But the most impressive hitter was leftfielder Brian Parks with two singles and a 2-run home run. Altogether Kendrick racked up 11 hits.

In league play, the Tigers now have a 1-1 record.

## Do you know baseball?

ACE: A very good pitcher, usually a team's best. Also known as "stopper" since he can regularly stop the opponents.

In 1869 the first professional baseball club, the Cincinnati Red Stockings, won 56 out of 57 games with one tie, incredibly using only one pitcher whose name was Asa Brainard.

After that year, any pitcher who put together a string of victories or pitched impressive games was compared to Brainard and was called another "Asa," which eventually changed to a shortened form and changed spelling to what we now know as ACE.

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**Kit Fox may be due for nongame study**

The kit fox, a small, shy creature that has all but disappeared in Idaho, could be due for the attention it needs to restore it to historic surroundings along the Snake River plain, according to state nongame wildlife manager Mart Morache, Department of Fish and Game.

The department will be asking the Fish and Game Commission for approval of a study to determine the feasibility of reintroducing the animal, whose demise was brought on largely by loss of habitat and susceptibility to poisoned bait, Morache said.

Kit foxes, yellowish brown in color with a black-tipped tail, usually measure less than 30 inches in length and they are primarily nocturnal. They feed on rabbits, reptiles, rodents and insects.

"This is just one of several new projects the department has in mind for addition to its ongoing nongame management program," Morache said.

"At least 95 percent of the funding for nongame comes from many concerned citizens who voluntarily contribute through a checkoff on individual state income tax returns. Hopefully, they will not overlook this year's checkoff on line 54."

Among continuing programs, more than 2,000 nesting boxes have been placed along nesting routes for the Idaho state bird, the mountain bluebird, and many platforms are in place to provide nesting sites for ferruginous hawks.

The department's regional conservators educators report that hundreds of sick or injured raptors have been cared for at rehabilitation centers in each department region. In southwestern Idaho alone, at least 134 raptors have been taken in and about 61 percent have been returned to the wild after successful treatment.

"But much remains to be done," Morache said. "And, as we say, with continuing support from our friends, we can do it."

**How to avoid being bitten by a rattlesnake**

Moscow—It is a beautiful sunny day and you are out hiking in the Woods. Suddenly you realize you are standing face to face with a rattlesnake. What do you do?

According to University of Idaho zoologist Dick Wallace if you have heard or seen a rattlesnake, stop and try to figure out where it is, then just back up slowly and go around it.

"The rattlesnake has developed a reputation of being a big and nasty animal that likes to attack humans—this is far from the truth. A human being is an object. When you come upon a rattlesnake, they will dive for cover. Mainly when you have them cornered and they cannot dive for cover. Mainly when you have them cornered and they cannot get away then they will lash out at you and attempt to strike you," Wallace said.

Wallace feels that hikers should take certain precaution when hiking in snake territory. First he feels that the hiker should wear a boot that covers the ankle. Secondly, when climbing cliffs and grabbing hold of rocks, the hiker should look carefully before putting down a hand. Finally, the hiker should look around before getting off of a cliff when walking around.

With these few precautions and respect for the snakes, Wallace feels the hiker can enjoy a safe trip.

**Pennsylvania, Texas send wild turkeys to Idaho**

Pennsylvania and Texas have contributed 56 wild turkeys this year to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game continue a transplant program that started in 1982, state gamebird manager Gary Will reported.

Sixteen Eastern turkeys came from Pennsylvania and they are the first of their subspecies to be relocated in Idaho. They went to a site west of Lewiston, Will said.

Texas provided 40 Rio Grandes for three locations: the Wolf Creek drainage in northern Idaho, the Salmon area and Owyhee County, he added.

With the latest arrivals, Idaho has acquired 520 turkeys since 1982 and they have been released in 31 loca-

tions to start new flocks or add to existing populations. Birds from established flocks also have been relocated, Will said.

The 16-day general spring turkey season opens April 24 in 11 management units described in the printed regulations. Ten controlled hunts with a total of 100 permits open April 24 and May 2 and each runs for eight days. The season limit is one bearded or male turkey.

Names of the 100 permit holders were drawn from a list of 788 eligible applicants. Donations from a checkoff on the application form provided almost \$1,200 for the Idaho Wild Turkey Transplant Program, Will said.

#### The Liver

The liver is the largest gland in the body and the second largest organ—the skin is the largest organ in the body. The liver has many functions, which includes carbohydrate storage and metabolism, manufacture of certain complex proteins inactivation of some hormones, secretion of bile, and detoxification of many drugs and toxins.  
 Liver disease can occur in any animal at any age. Because of the liver's variety of functions, liver problems many produce a wide variety of clinical signs. These may include abdominal pain, weakness, vomiting, diarrhea, bleeding disorders, slow healing of wounds, and pooling of body fluids.  
 The liver has a tremendous reserve capacity and regeneration capability. It has been estimated that 80 percent of the liver may be injured before problems are seen. This also means, however, that any sign of liver disease is serious because only a small portion of viable liver tissue is left to carry on important metabolic functions.  
 Parasites can cause liver damage. Roundworms in dogs, cats, and horses will migrate through the liver during a larval stage. Cattle are afflicted with liver flukes which can cause much liver damage.  
 Many plants will cause liver problems. These toxic plants are found in pastures, but seldom cause problems unless the pasture is being over grazed. Sheep are peculiarly resistant to many toxic plants that

will cause liver problems in cattle and horses.

Tumors can invade the liver and cause widespread destruction that is often irreversible. The liver can also become infected by viruses or bacteria.

Bile is an important secretory product of the liver that is involved in the digestion of fats. Obstruction of the bile ducts leading from the liver to the small intestine occurs mostly in dogs and cats.

There are many tests available to help determine if the liver is functioning properly. Increases in the amount of particular enzymes functioning properly. Increase in the amount of particular enzymes in the blood occurs when liver cells are damaged. Other tests can help evaluate protein and cholesterol metabolism and bile formation.

Another important laboratory tool is the use of a liver biopsy. A small sample is taken from the liver and processed so individual liver cells are visible under a microscope. This test can help determine the health of a liver and the prognosis for the liver to repair itself.

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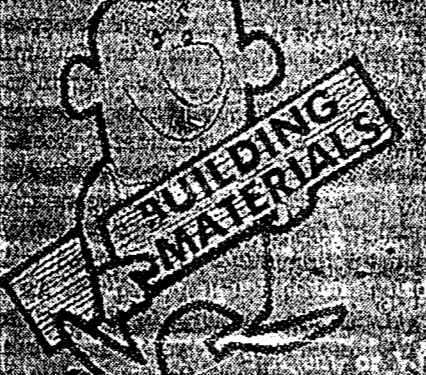
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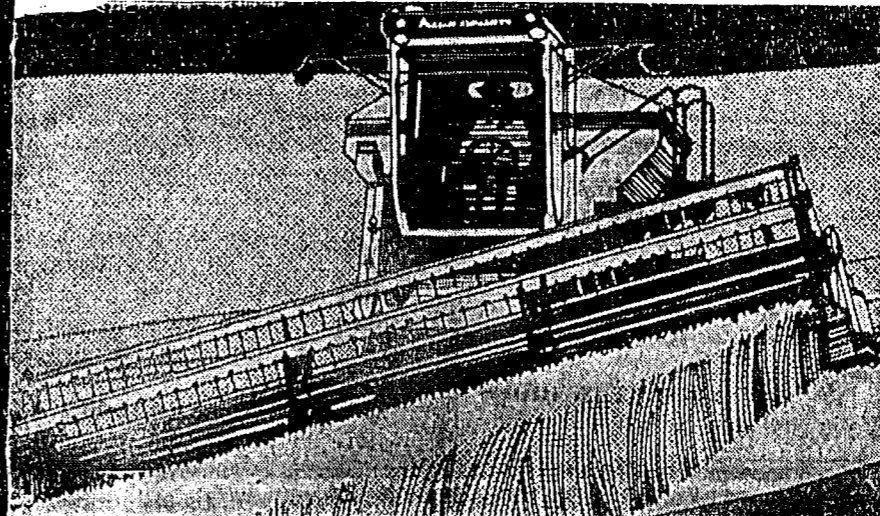
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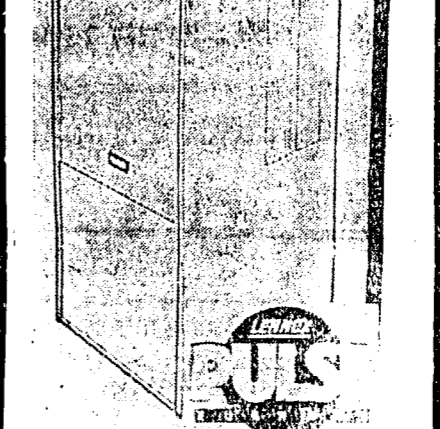
