

Bird are fascinating

Birds are fascinating creatures to rear and the large variety of birds means there is a type of bird that is right for almost anyone. The term "caged bird" is usually reserved for the ornamental varieties while the term "poultry" is used to describe birds raised for meat and eggs. Some types of birds don't fall neatly in either category or may have characteristics that would allow them inclusion as an ornamental and a meat bird, such as some pigeons and ducks.

Chickens are perhaps the best known birds mainly because of the meat and eggs they provide; however, there are many breeds of chickens that don't produce meat efficiently nor lay eggs productively. These birds are reared primarily for their plumage, ability to catch insect pests, or other characteristics. Unfortunately, some breeds of chickens are promoted for their ability to fight.

Pigeons also have many varieties. Some pigeons are raised for meat while others just for show. Homing pigeons and racing pigeons are a sharp contrast to tumbler pigeons who can no longer fly.

Ducks, geese, and other waterfowl help control pond weeds and are also excellent bug catchers. Some large geese have a disposition that makes them a good watch dog or guard goose.

Some caged birds are easy to care for and some species breed well in captivity. The smaller varieties such as finches, canaries, and parakeets are gregarious. Some of the larger varieties such as parrots, macaws, toucans often do quite well when reared as an only bird.

Each species of bird has their own special requirements for food, housing, ambient temperature, etc. Someone purchasing a bird they have no experience with would be wise to research the needs of the bird before buying.

Birds suffer from many diseases.

Infectious diseases such as those caused by bacteria, viruses and fungi are not as common as they are in mammals but can be much more serious. A contagious disease can destroy a flock of birds in a matter of days.

Birds have many internal and external parasites such as roundworms, lice, mites, and tapeworms. Parasites are especially a problem in young birds.

Non-infectious problems are relatively common in birds. These include egg-binding, broken wings, and toes, dietary problems, feather problems, and lack of exercise. Diet is always an important consideration when dealing with birds; their metabolism is so high that a short period without an adequate diet can make them quite ill.

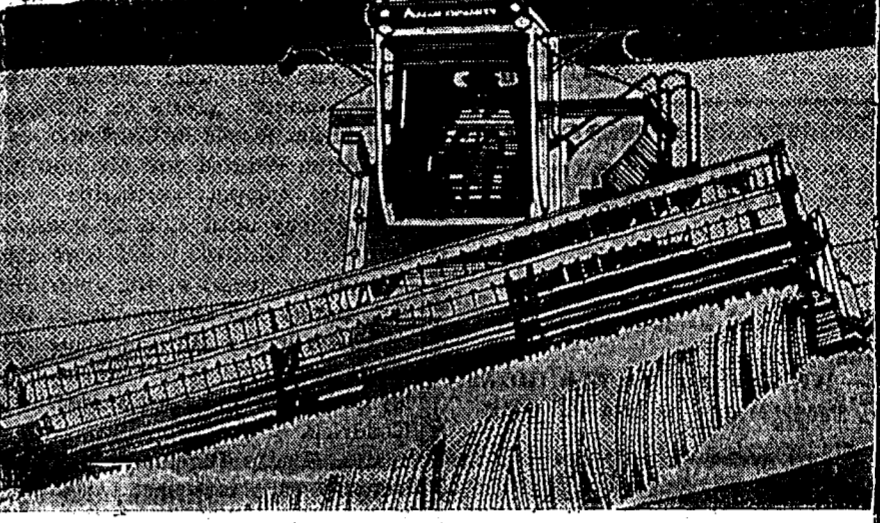
