Chickens are perhaps the best known birds mainly because of the meat and eggs they provide; however, there are many breeds of chickens that don't produce meat efficiently nor lay eggs productively. These birds are reared primarily for their plumage, ability to catch insect pests, or other characteristics. Unfortunately, some breeds of chickens are promoted for their ability to

Pigeons also have many varieties. Some pigeons are raised for meat while others just for show. Homing pigeons and racing pigeons are a sharp contrast to tumbler pigeons who can no longer fly.

Ducks, geese, and other waterfowl help control pond weeds and are also excellent bug catchers. Some large geese have a disposition that makes them a good watch dog or

guard goose. Some caged birds are easy to care for and some species breed well in captivity. The smaller varieties such as finches, canaries, and parakeets are gregarious. Some of the larger varieties such as parrots, macaws, toucans often do quite well when

reared as an only bird. Each species of bird has their own special requirements for food, housing, ambient temperature, etc. Someone purchasing a bird they have no experience with would be wise to research the needs of the bird before buying.


