



PORCUPINE QUILLS

Springtime! The grass is growing, the trees are budding, the birds are coming back, and animals begin to face more problems.

One of the most common springtime problems is porcupine quills. Porcupines are becoming more active and protecting their young at the same time that dogs are roaming more in search is springtime wonders. Although dogs are pierced by porcupine quills most often, other animals such as cattle and horses are also occasionally stricken by quills. An overly curious colt and a slow moving porcupine can mean a snoot full of quills.


