When bases were loaded with Kub runners and no outs, a Kamiah batter hit the first pitch down to third baseman John Gravelle, who touched his bag for one out, then fired the ball to first baseman Brenden Millard for the second out, who then returned the ball to Gravelle at third base to tag the advancing runner for the third out. The Tigers executed their first triple play!

Along with heads up defense, the Tiger bats were racking up the hits; besides his single, Jim Woods hit his first home run of the season; Brian Parks had 2 doubles and a single; Ron Hewett doubled and singled; and Brenden Millard doubled. Gravelle, Hewett, and Parks shared the job on the mound.

But, as the momentum shifted, it was a tough game for Kendrick when Kamiah went ahead in the last inning to hand the Tigers a loss of 14-13.

The Potlatch Loggers pitching seemed to control the April 16 league game. They only allowed Kendrick one walk and six hits while striking nine Tigers out.

Of the six hits, Brian Parks tripled; John Gravelle doubled and singled; Rob Vincent, Scott Morey, and Tom Woods all singled.

Rob Vincent hurled the full seven innings, allowed seven walks, eight hits, and striking out seven Loggers. The Tigers lost the game with the score 10-4.

Then at 1:00 there will be a public reading to follow with an informal session of discussion and autographing at 1:45 in the school's cafeteria.

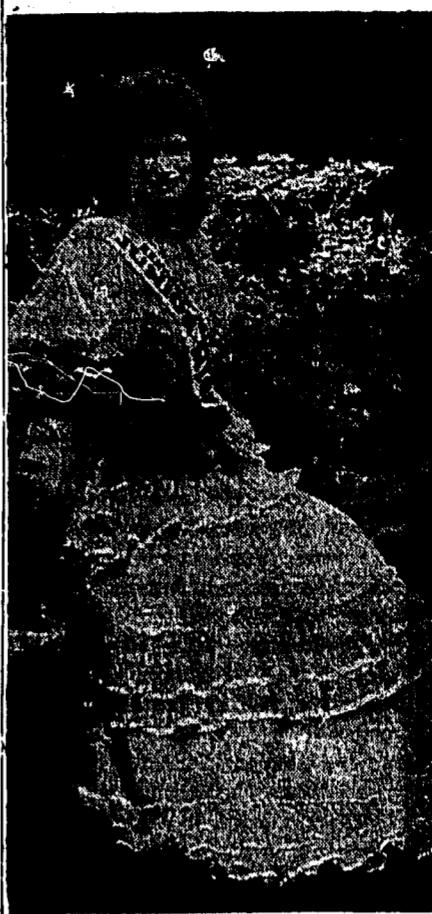

With the final days of her term as Kendrick-Juliaetta Junior Miss quickly passing, Denise Corkill looks back at a year which has been full of personal growth and changes.

"I didn't think that I was going to win," Denise said. "Even after they announced all of the runners-up, I didn't think that I was going to win. I was so surprised, that I just started crying."

Soft-spoken Denise underestimated herself. Although she described herself then as being quiet and shy, the qualities of a Junior Miss shine through. She dares to be herself—without the "stop, look at me" personality. You can tell that she is a mature and caring person.

The highlight of Denises' reign was the Idaho State Junior Miss Program. Although the first few days of the week-long rehearsals before the program were difficult for the quiet girl from Kendrick, "I realized that everyone else there was having as hard a time as I was, and after that, it was easy." She even felt disappointed when the week was over and it was time to go back home. "I wanted it to go on for another week," she said with a laugh.

But now her choices of college is ranging farther from home, and include either Whitman at Walla Walla, or the College of Idaho at Caldwell. She plans to major in either business administration or management, because, as she says, "I've always liked to keep things organized, and in order."

The most difficult part of the Jr. Miss Program, Denise said, was the creative and performing arts portion. She will be performing for the audience again this year, but with a difference. "I picked a piece that I liked, and it's easier, too," she said with a smile.

Denise feels that the year as the Kendrick-Juliaetta Junior Miss has "helped me to grow, both inside and out." She finds that it is easier for her to meet and talk with people, and it has given her an added independence.

Denise said that she was sorry that the year has come to an end already. "I don't know how it will feel to be a has-been," she said with a laugh.

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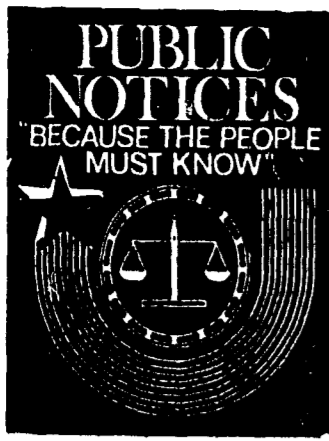

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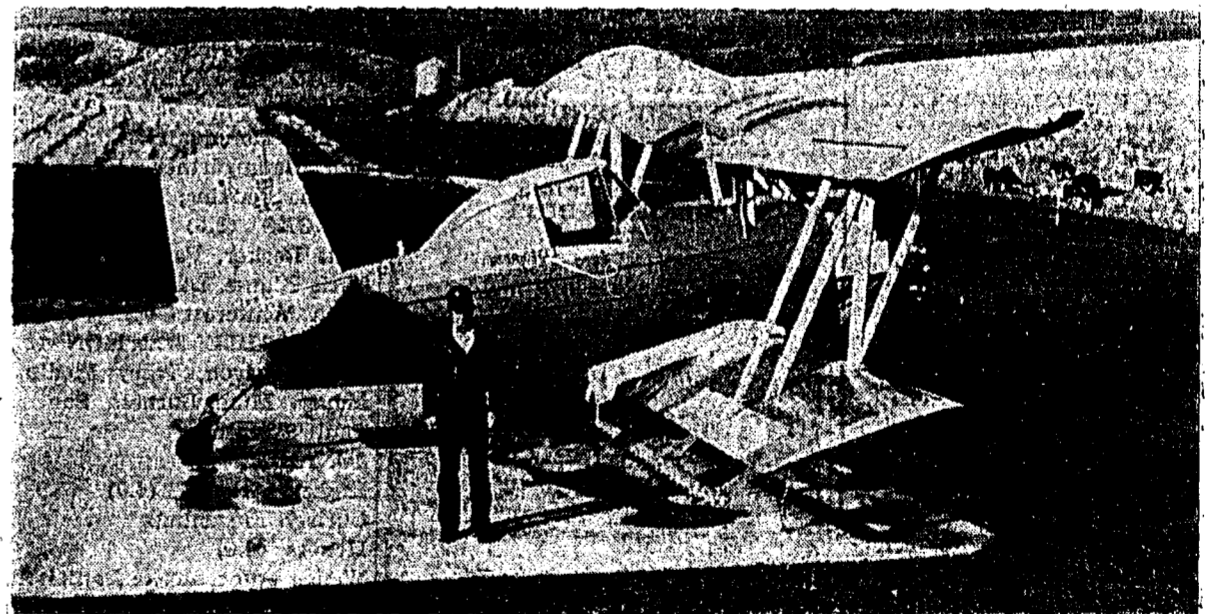

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Animal Topics

PORCUPINE QUILLS

Springtime! The grass is growing, the trees are budding, the birds are coming back, and animals begin to face more problems.

One of the most common spring-time problems is porcupine quills. Porcupines are becoming more active and protecting their young at the same time that dogs are roaming more in search of springtime wonders. Although dogs are pierced by porcupine quills most often, other animals such as cattle and horses are also occasionally stricken by quills. An overly curious colt and a slow moving porcupine can mean a snoot full of quills.

Another spring hazard is skunks. Skunks have little fear of anything except a larger skunk. A young dog getting very close to a curiously unafraid cat-like shape can benefit

from a sudden education that will last a lifetime.

Ticks are another springtime problem. Ticks will attach themselves to any animal but young ticks prefer small animals and adult ticks prefer larger beasts. Dogs and cats attract a younger and less experienced ticks while people attract an older, more mature, and perhaps a better adjusted parasite.

Warmer weather also means an increase in the insect population, which unfortunately means more flies. Flies lay eggs in soiled wool and open wounds. The eggs become maggots—a revolting situation. Horn flies and face flies cause such irritation to livestock and irritable animals don't produce meat and milk as efficiently. Flies can also spread diseases.

Poisonous plants are sometimes most poisonous during their fast growing stages. There are many plants that are toxic to livestock but they seldom pose a problem because animals don't often eat these toxic plants if there is enough grass available.

Lawn mowers and weed choppers can be very hazardous to pets. Rocks and sticks become deadly projectiles when a lawn mower sends them flying. The heavy monofilament line on a weed chopper can cut off tails as well as weeds. The safest thing to do is lock your pet up or have someone else watch your pet closely while your attention is diverted to mowing the lawn or harvesting your crop of weeds.
