The Grange organization is strictly American. It originated here, developed here and spread the length and breadth of the nation—but not to foreign shores. It originated in 1876 by 7 founding fathers led by Oliver Hudson Kelly from his office at 4 1/2 St., Washington, D. C. Kelly was assisted by William Saunders, John Thompson, Aaron Grash, William Ireland, John Trimble, and Frances McDowell. With faith in God and mankind and in the future they laid the first stepping stone to a fraternity which was to become a vital force in preserving and expanding American agriculture.

The National Grange owns its own building in Washington, D. C. located just around the corner from the White House.

The Grange is a rural-urban organization. Its policies and programs are generated by total community and national interest—not by agricultural interest alone.

Kendrick got past Genesee 14-10 in last Thursday's game. Ron Hewett led the Tigers in hits with a double and three singles with five RBIs; Brian Parks had a double and two singles; Tom Woods, three singles; and Jim Woods, one single. Rob Vincent pitched the full seven innings, allowing 10 hits, 10 walks, and striking 6 Bulldogs out.

On Saturday the Tigers took both games of a double header against Prairie. In the first game Kendrick won 12-5 with John Gravelle pitching and Brian Parks relieving in the last inning. Robert Jones blasted a double and two singles with 5 RBIs while Parks hit two doubles and a single. Jim Woods and Tom Woods both had doubles; Rob Vincent, a single.

Parks pitched a five-inning no-hitter for Kendrick in the second game, striking out seven and walking two. Parks also smacked a solo home run in the first inning; John Gravelle and Tom Woods each had a double while Rob Vincent and Dallas Vallem each singled. The final score was 9-2.

The Tigers whipped Culdseac in Monday's game with Rob Vincent, Tom Woods, and Ron Hewett sharing the job on the mound. Kendrick had a slugfest with 19 hits. Robert Jones led the sluggers with three singles and a double. Other Tigers who doubled were Ron Hewett, Brian Parks, and Rob Vincent. And for singles, Kendrick never let up. Brenden Millard had three singles while Rob Vincent had two. Each of these Tigers also enjoyed a hit; Ron Hewett, Dave Curry, Lonnie Powers, Justin Ladd, Jim Woods, Scott Marey, and Tony Henson. When it was all over, Kendrick won 18-7.

Kendrick is now 2-2 in league play and 7-4 overall.

Leona was a communicant of St. Mary's Catholic Church at Genesee, a 50-year member and past president of the church's Altar Society, and a charter member of the Cabrini Chapter of the Catholic Daughters of America. She had received her 25-year pin as a volunteer for the American Cancer Society and also was known for her work with shut-ins.

She was a charter member and past president of the Nez Perce Co. Cow-belles and a member of the Happy Valley Extension Club and the Genesee Civic Club. She also served as a 4-H leader.

Her hobbies were crocheting, quilting, ceramics and antiques. She also presented readings, often on humorous subjects, to area organizations.

She was born January 30, 1909, at Uniontown to Nick and Lucy Wagner. She was christened Apollonia, (German for Leona).

She graduated from St. Scholastica Academy in 1927. She married Stanton Becker January 13, 1930, at Genesee.

Survivors include two sons, Donald and Dale, both of Genesee; a daughter, Ann Nilsson of Cavendish; two sisters, Martha Weber of Lewiston and Marie Linehan of Genesee; 14 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by two brothers and a sister.

Rosary will be recited at 7:00 p. m. Thursday at St. Mary's Catholic Church at Genesee. Funeral Mass will be celebrated at 9:30 a. m. Friday at the church, with the Rev. Fr. Robert Finucane officiating. Burial will follow at St. Mary's Cemetery.

The eruption of spring brings with it a cornucopia of puppies and kittens, a phenomenon which is the focus of two appeals from members of Friends of Animals, Inc., the national animal protection society.

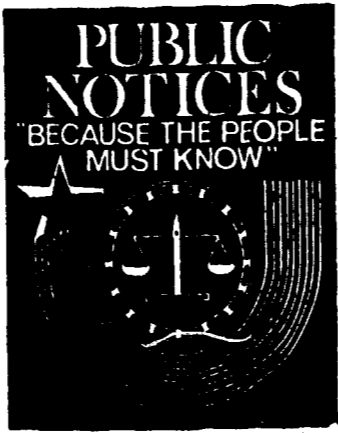
Alice Herrington, president of the group, appealed to all those who have a female dog or cat to have it spayed to avoid producing unwanted animals. "There are not sufficient homes to house litter after litter of puppies and kittens. And in nine cases out of ten the people who take a pet at the request of a

friend abandon the animal in a few months," she said.

A survey conducted by friends of Animals found that about 14 million abandoned dogs and cats are killed each year in dog pounds and shelters and an equal number die homeless on the streets, according to Ms. Herrington.

The second appeal was for the public to stop "impulse acquisition of pets." "The responsibility of pet care is expensive, time consuming, and troublesome," Ms. Herrington warned, and all factors should be considered by the entire household prior to adopting or purchasing a pet.

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

Animal Topics

THE HEART

The heart is the workhorse organ of the body and has to function properly to maintain the health and integrity of the rest of the body. The heart does a tremendous amount of work; a heart at rest in a 150 pound animal pumps approximately 1 1/2 gallons of blood a minute, that's about 2,000 gallons a day! The same heart during moderate exercise may pump 6 gallons of blood a minute.

Most heart problems are progressive with signs of disease that gets worse over the long period of time and require long-term treatment. Occasionally a heart problem occurs suddenly and unexpectedly requiring emergency treatment, such as cardiac arrest.

Signs of heart disease are quite variable depending on the types of

problem, the duration of the problem and the overall physical condition of the animal affected. Cardiac disease may affect the liver, kidneys, and other organs so signs of heart disease may also include problems seen when other organs begin to fail. Some breeds of animals are more prone to heart problems.

Horses are an athletic animal and seldom have heart problems. Selective breeding weeds out the congenital problems that decrease the performance of a highly trained and hard working horse.

Heart problems in cattle tend to be age related. Young calves can suffer from White Muscle disease where a deficiency of selenium promotes the replacement of a healthy heart muscle with fibrous tissue. A calf affected with White Muscle can die quickly because the heart cannot pump properly. Older cattle occasionally get Hardware disease where a piece of metal, usually a nail or wire, travels from the stomach to the heart. The heart becomes infected and cannot work adequately.

Animals with cardiac problems usually tire easily and sometimes faint when the animal exercises or becomes too excited. Many animals usually cough up a white frothy phlegm. Some animals may have difficulty breathing after mild exercise.

Other signs of cardiac illness include abdominal distension, thinness, loss of appetite, frequent urination, vomiting, diarrhea, excessive water intake, restlessness at night, and severe weakness or collapse.

INLAND EMPIRE NATURAL RESOURCE YOUTH CAMP

The Inland Empire Natural Resource Youth Camp is a camp designed to help young leaders understand the interrelationships among the soil, forest, wildlife, range, water, and recreational resources. One week of training provides the basic knowledge to make objective decisions concerning resource management use.

UI BEAN BREEDER RELEASES TWO NEW DRY BEAN VARIETIES

 Kimberly, Idaho—The University of Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station has released a new small white bean and a new Great Northern variety.

Plant breeder John Koler said the new varieties offer yield advantages over existing varieties but sufficient quantities of seed will not be available to the public until next year.

The small white bean, UI 158, is an upright plant whose pods are held off the ground, making harvesting easier and limiting the pods' susceptibility to discoloration on the ground late in the season.

It is resistant to bean common mosaic and curlytop disease and also has some resistance to rust.

In yield tests conducted in the U. S. and Canada, UI 158 consistently yielded 100 to 300 pounds more than other public and private varieties.

The new Great Northern variety, UI 425, outyielded other varieties by 100 to 440 pounds per acre. UI 425 grows on a short, fairly upright vine and offers resistance to bean common mosaic and moderate resistance to curlytop.

The Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station has released 29 varieties of dry beans since 1930 and jointly released another 11 with other agencies.
