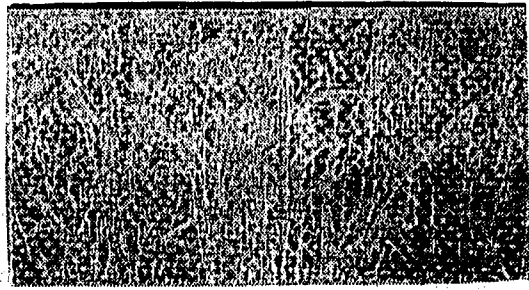

American West; Steve Siporin, Folk Arts Coordinator of the Idaho Commission on the Arts; Madeline Buckendrf, Director of the Idaho Oral History Center; Lalai Boone, Moscow folklorist and author of From A to Z in Latah County and the Idaho Place Name Dictionary; Diane Pettit, journalist for the Lewiston Tribune; Keith Petersen, Latah County Historian and N. Idaho Consultant with the Idaho State Historical Society; Leila Old,

Director of the Historic Costumes Collection at the University of Idaho School of Home Economics; and Lorraine Micke, Curator at the Latah County Historical Society.

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Choosing nutritious fast foods

 All fast foods are not created equal. While some concoctions merit the label "junk food," others can satisfy your nutritional requirements.

"It is possible to eat healthfully at fast food establishments," said Dr. Bonnie Worthington-Roberts, University of Washington (UW) professor and director of nutritional sciences. "The problem with fast foods is that many contain too much fat and sodium. By limiting your fat intake and avoiding unnecessary salt you can safely meet your nutritional needs in a fast food restaurant."

One nutritious food now offered at some fast food restaurants is the baked potato. The potato gives your body complex carbohydrates for longer-lasting energy. "You can't beat a baked potato that is moder-

ately flavored and seasoned," Worthington-Roberts said.

A potato dripping with cheese or sour cream, however, contains too much fat, as does the popular french fried potato. If french fries are ordered leave them unsalted. "More and more fast food establishments will fill special requests such as 'no salt'," Worthington-Roberts said. "They are less likely today to automatically salt a whole batch of fries."

The taco is another good choice because it contains food from all 4 food groups: meat and protein, dairy, vegetable and grain.

Worthington-Roberts also recommended chili for the health conscious because the beans are such a good source of protein.

Pizza can be a nutritious meal, if ordered with care. "Thick crust pizza is healthiest because it fills you up on carbohydrates instead of fat-filled toppings," Worthington-Roberts said. "Top it with vegetables rather than cheeses and meats."

Soups, salads and pita bread sandwiches are other nutritious options. In keeping with the trend toward healthier eating, more fast food establishments now offer these choices:

1) "Your best bet is to keep variety in your diet," Worthington-Roberts said. "The bigger the variety, the more likely you'll meet your nutritional needs. If you never opt for soup or the salad bar or if you never deviate from one restaurant, your nutrition will suffer."

Worthington-Roberts maintained that extensive nutritional knowledge

A day of fishing 'on the house' is planned by the Department of Fish and Game to give all comers a chance to get acquainted with one of Idaho's most popular outdoor activities. July 27 is apt to be the day when a license will not be required. Fish and Game commissioners during their meeting in Boise (April 4-5) declared their intent to set the date at their May session.

The "Free Fishing Day" was approved by the 1985 legislature.

"Folks who haven't tried fishing can find it is good family fun and they should gain more appreciation for a valuable Idaho resource," said Bill Goonight, chief of Information and Education.

Except for free fishing, all other regulations will be in effect, "and we hope to have department personnel out in force to explain the rules and help make July 27 a rewarding day," Goonight said.

—Approved 6 new nongame projects, including a feasibility study for reintroduction of the kit fox in southern Idaho and research to determine past and present distribution, status, and management techniques involving Swainson's hawk.

—Amended vendor policy to increase vendorships from 450 to 600 around the state in a year.

—Made it unlawful, effective April 5 through June 30, to use dogs, bait or scent to hunt black bear in that portion of Management Unit 61

The action was taken to protect at least four grizzly bears, denning in the area and to reduce the chance of hunters being injured.

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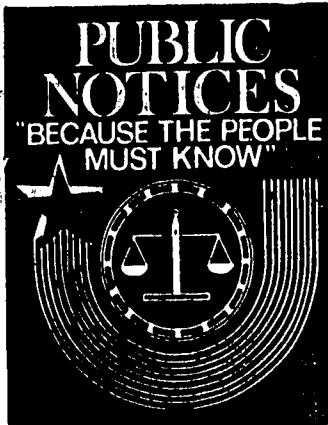
