Genesee Approved M & O; re-elects Martin Stout

Patrons of Genesee Joint School District No. 282 went to the polls Tuesday and approved a \$50,000 Maintenance and Operation override levy by a vote of 131 in favor to 43 against — a 75.3% margin of approval.

The District citizens also re-elected Martin Stout to another term of four years as a Trustee from Zone 5. Stout, a Genesee farmer, is currently the chairman of the Board of Trustees. He was unopposed on the ballot. Stout received 57 votes. Kurt Blume received 6 write-in votes and there were two spoiled ballots.

Kendrick District re-elects Parks

Luther Parks, a veteran of 5 previous terms as Trustee of Kendrick Joint School District, was given his sixth term of office Tuesday by the patrons of Zone 5.

Luther, unopposed on the ballot, received 39 votes. Write-in candidates Fred Sihlow received 25 votes and Ed Corkill received 2 votes.

KHS track season has been successful this year

Both the boys and the girls teams lost senior members last year, but a younger group of athletes have turned out to help build a strong team for the future. Valuable experience was gained by everyone this year which will benefit the teams' next season.

He was also active in church, community, school and youth activities. He liked the outdoors, hunting, fishing and skiing.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Billings; two sons, Eric and Kirk, at the family home; a daughter, Kersten Hansen of Moscow; his mother, LaVerne Hansen of Ashland, Wis., and a brother, Donald Hansen of Green Bay, Wis.

ABANDONED PETS

Lately some kind people have been bringing in a disturbing number of abandoned pets and I have heard reports of more. Most have been dumped off near county garbage disposals. These unwanted animals are usually newly weaned pups or kittens that some irresponsible and unconscionably owner has abandoned. If any of these mistreated pets survive, which isn't likely, they become a nuisance and a possible health hazard.

Stray dogs and cats can pose a threat to other animals, (livestock, wildlife, other pets) and are common pests; in addition, these strays can cause a public health problem of diseases transmissible to man. People who dump pets are not the only ones responsible towards strays—pet owners, pet stores, veterinarians, and anyone else having a concern for animal welfare is responsible for controlling the stray problem.

1. Support your humane shelter. It takes money for them to operate. They can use donations and voluntary help.

2. Become informed and educate others of the problem and their responsibility. No one wants a sick pet or child because someone dumped a stray; nor does anyone want livestock or wildlife harassed and injured because someone dumped a stray.

3. Have your pet neutered or

It is a popular concept that a female pet should have one litter before they are spayed. This is far from the truth. Two problems are created. One is that homes for puppies and kittens must be found or disposed of. The other is that the female is more difficult to spay and therefore a greater surgical risk after a litter.

Males should also be neutered. Males castrated at a young age do not chase after females in heat. Castrated males will defend themselves but usually don't go looking for fights. Both males and females make much better pets if they are castrated or spayed. They have much less tendency to roam, get into trouble, or attract other dogs and cats.

Each of us must exercise our responsibility in controlling unwanted pets. Be humane and do your part. Enjoy a happy pet and don't litter.

Campers enjoyed outing despite wind and cold

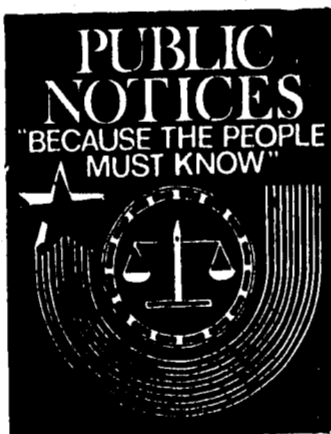
