

ABANDONED PETS

Lately some kind people have been bringing in a disturbing number of abandoned pets and I have heard reports of more. Most have been dumped off near county garbage disposals. These unwanted animals are usually newly weaned pups or kittens that some irresponsible and unconscionably owner has abandoned. If any of these mistreated pets survive, which isn't likely, they become a nuisance and a possible health hazard.

Stray dogs and cats can pose a threat to other animals, (livestock, wildlife, other pets) and are common pests: in addition, these strays can cause a public health problem of diseases transmissible to man. People who dump pets are not the only ones responsible towards strays -pet owners, pet stores, veterinarians, and anyone else having a concern for animal welfare is responsible for controlling the stray problem.

1. Support your humane shelter. It takes money for them to operate. They can use donations and voluntary help.


