She graduated from Southwick high school and also from Washington State University, Northern Idaho College of Education and the University of Idaho. She came to Kendrick in July of 1923 and taught all of her 28 years in this district. She married the late Wm. B. Deobald and has three children, Lois and Gay and one son, Bill; 8 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren.

Still an active member of the community, Mrs. Deobald loves to grow roses, bowl, crochet and knit.

George Merrick began his teaching career as a teacher and coach at Hansen, Idaho, a small town between Twin Falls and Burley, Idaho; later teaching at Carey and Bellevue, Idaho before coming north to Deary where he was elementary principal and teaching the 7th and 8th grades. George came to the Kendrick School District in 1951 where he taught until his retirement in 1968. His wife, the late Doris Merrick was also a teacher in the Kendrick schools.

Heart attack claims Fix Ridge farmer Elmer Heimgartner

Elmer Heimgartner, 68, who farmed on Fix Ridge between Genesee and Juliaetta, died of a massive heart attack at 7:10 p. m. Friday, May 24, at Deaconess Medical Center at Spokane. He had been ill five days.

Heimgartner was living in the home of his birth at the time of his death, although he had lived on Potlatch Ridge in Nez Perce County for a few years. He was a 1934 graduate of Juliaetta High School and he attended the Genesee Community Church.

He was born October 19, 1916, on Fix Ridge, the son of Robert and Bessie Heimgartner. He was married to Lola Lerew at Lewiston Sept. 25, 1937. He enjoyed horse riding, camping, and especially his grandchildren.

Survivors include his wife at the Fix Ridge home; three daughters, Jeannine Sather of Joseph, Oregon, Donna Corkill of Kendrick, and Shirley Lindstrom of Osborn, Idaho; four brothers, Leslie, Lawrence, Roy and Wayne Heimgartner, all of Juliaetta; three sisters, Lillie McCall and LaVern Harri, both of Clarkston, and Betty Surbough of Othello, Wa. He also left 11 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a brother, Everett.

The funeral was held at 2 p. m. Tuesday, May 28, at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel with the Rev. Roger Herndon of Genesee Community Church officiating. Burial was at the Fix Ridge Cemetery.

If desired, the family suggests memorials be given to the Genesee Community Church or the Genesee Ambulance Fund.

\$1 telephone fee effective June 1

The Federal Communications (FCC) has ordered Telephone Companies to begin charging residential and single line business customers a \$1.00 per month subscriber line charge, effective June 1, 1985. This charge applies to single-party and multi-party line customers. In addition, the charge for all multi-line, multi-party business customers is being increased to \$6.00 per month. These subscriber line charges are designed to recover a portion of the cost of connecting telephone customers to the nationwide telephone network that in the past were recovered through interstate long distance charges.

Due to change in the telephone industry and increasing telephone competition in long distance telephone service, the FCC determined that it is no longer appropriate to recover certain local network costs through long distance charges. We anticipate that the subscriber line charges authorized will be offset by reductions in charges by long distance service providers.

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"SALMON POISONING" REPORTED IN SOME IDAHO DOGS

Several reports of "salmon poisoning" in dogs have been received by the Department of Fish and Game anglers, particularly steelheaders, need to be aware of the disease which is often fatal to the animals, according to anadromous fishery coordinator Herb Pollard.

The disease originates with the salmon poisoning fluke, a small flat worm which lives in fish of the trout and salmon family for part of its life cycle and which commonly occurs in trout and salmon in coastal areas of the Pacific Northwest, Pollard said.

While it is not common in resident trout in inland areas like Idaho or eastern Oregon, it often occurs in steelhead and salmon returning to the upriver areas, he added.

"Dogs should not be allowed to eat any raw part or even lap up the blood of a steelhead or salmon," Pollard warned. Humans are not affected if the fish is properly cooked," he emphasized.

Symptoms in dogs include high fever, bloody diarrhea and depression, but because salmon poisoning has not been common in Idaho and symptoms are similar to prevovirus which is very common, diagnosis may be missed, Pollard said.

When the symptoms appear, the dog should be treated with sulfa or

tetracycline. The drugs produce a high rate of cure and once treated, the animal will be immune, he added.

"There is no vaccine or preventative treatment available. Infested dogs have a strong immunity to later exposure," Pollard said.

Dog-to-dog transmission of the disease may also occur, says Boise veterinarian Dr. Larry Eld, so isolation of infected animals and disinfection of runs and cages is advisable.

"Probably the best preventative measure is to keep a close watch on your dog if it is with you on a fishing trip," Pollard said.

Get your social security number before it is needed, is advice

If you plan to apply for a Social Security number, you should remember to apply at least 2 weeks before you need the number, Ila Andrews Social Security field representative in Pullman, said recently.

It takes this time to process the application, evaluate the evidence, search the files at Social Security headquarters, and to issue and mail the Social Security number card.

When applying, you must have evidence of age, identity, and citizenship or legal alien status. In addition, a person 18 or over applying for the first time must apply in person.

The best evidence of age and citizenship is a public record of birth issued before age 5. If this is not available, religious records established before age 5 may be considered. Only if these are not available can other evidence be submitted.

Evidence of identity can be any document showing identification data such as a physical description, photograph, or signature. Examples include driver's license, voter's registration, school record, report card, identification card, marriage record, draft card, military ID, building pass, adoption record, court order for name change, clinic, doctor, or hospital record, or organization membership.

If you are applying for a duplicate card to replace one that you lost, then you must provide evidence of your identity.

Also, a person who wants to change her or his name in Social Security records must provide evidence of your identity. Also, a person who wants to change her or his name in Social Security records must provide evidence of identity under both the old and new names.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency are acceptable.

Spring is critical time for young, wild animals

Spring days bring a reminder from the Department of Fish and Game about young, wild animals—don't bother them even if they appear to be lost or abandoned.

They are usually only a short distance from a parent. A doe, for example, moves away from her fawn while she feeds or when humans approach, but the fawn is expected to stay put until she returns.

The does may not come back if she is disturbed by human scent. Should the young animal be removed from natural surroundings, it becomes more susceptible to disease and it can be dangerous and difficult to manage as it grows.

Department officials warn, too, that it is illegal to take or molest wildlife, including birds.

"Unit of Intent" responses help game harvest survey

Big game tags issued by the De-

partments of Fish and Game this year again include that familiar "unit of intent" question and hunters will be helping big game management if they fill in the blank, according to state wildlife manager Lloyd Oldenburg.

There is no cause for persons to fear disclosure of a favorite area when they indicate the unit in which they intend to hunt, Oldenburg said.

"Also, their answers in no way pin them down to a particular unit," he added. "We use the information only to help us get a better response in our annual telephone survey to gather harvest results."

The survey crew usually finds that the unit listed on a tag is the one that was hunted, resulting in a more accurate survey with fewer telephone calls, Oldenburg said.

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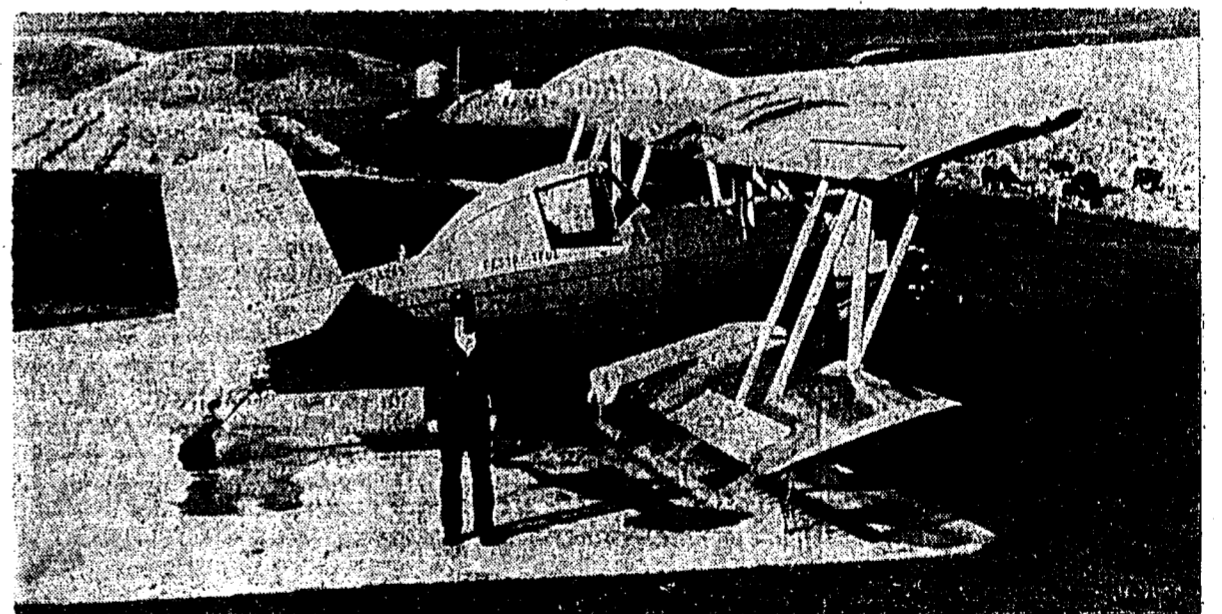

"NOISELESS" CREATURES

"Noiseless" creatures often make excellent pets and are usually easy to care for. "Noiseless" animal include fish, reptiles, insects, and rodents. Although many of these creatures can make certain noises they are usually very quiet.

Aquarium fish make no noise, never leave a mess on the carpet, and don't demand to be petted or fed at inconvenient times. Fish are pleasant to watch, are afflicted with few diseases, and require very little food and care.

Many people keep reptiles as pets. Reptiles include crocodiles, alligators, turtles, snakes, and lizards. Most people are reluctant to keep larger reptiles such as alligators and pythons, but many of the smaller reptiles make good noiseless pets, such as turtles, chameleons, and iguanas.

Spiders make unusual pets. Some of the larger species such as tarantulas are said to be quite affectionate. Pet spiders are very fragile and shouldn't be allowed to roam around the house.

Most insects have short lives and keeping them as pets is a temporary but often interesting experience. Much can be learned, for example, in the watching the metamorphosis of a caterpillar into a butterfly. A colony of ants in a "dirt farm" is educational, quiet, and easy to care for. Fleas, a rather ugly parasite, have been captured, cared for, and trained to perform in minicircuses.

Some rodents make good pets and adapt to cage life quite well. Hamsters, guinea-pigs, rats, and mice all are readily available. Rabbits can make good pets and can even be "house broken."

Farmers Home Administration Office in Moscow to close

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Moscow servicing Latah County will close on May 30, according to John Albee, District Director in Coeur d'Alene. The office was opened in 1960 and provided residents with farm and single family housing loans.

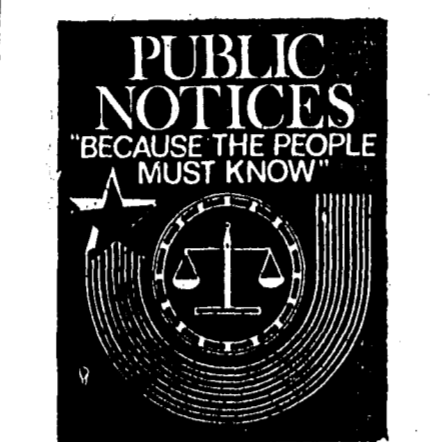
The Lewiston office will service Latah County along with Nez Perce and Clearwater Counties. The present loans will be serviced and new applications processed from the office at 3510 - 12th Street in the Lewiston Orchards, Albee stated. An office day will be held in Moscow on the first and third Tuesday to better service Latah residents. The first office day will be held on June 18, and the time and place will be announced later by the Lewiston office staff.

Service from the Lewiston office is provided by Wayne Hil, County Supervisor, Dwight Ferguson, Assistant County Supervisor, Charlene Kelley, County Office Assistant, and two part-time employees. Jack Suesz, County Supervisor of the Moscow office, will transfer to the Grangeville office to alleviate personnel problems in that office.

The office is being closed due to a shortage of employee allotments statewide, which also closed the Halley office. The number of farm loans in Latah County more than doubled following the 1977 drought and have been decreasing the last

few years as some of the borrowers have gone out of business and others have paid their loans in full. Emergency loss loans are presently available to farmers in Latah County until October 11, 1985, but very little activity has resulted due to the program eligibility requirements. The Agency provides a variety of farm loans including real estate, emergency loss loans, chattel, and operating loans. Also available are modest to low-income single family housing loans in areas under 20,000 in population. Repair loans are available at 1 percent to very low income families and grants to senior citizens who don't have repayment ability and are buying or own their homes.

All applicants are required to have adequate income to repay their loans but are unable to get credit from other sources. Borrowers are expected to graduate to conventional sources of credit or repay their loans ahead of schedule when they are able to do so, Albee said.

and repairs totalling \$9,707,307 were down 8.7 percent.
