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"A steelhead talks economics"—

As we close down a very productive steelhead fishing season, there are a few things which we should think about besides 'grilled filets'. According to Bert Bowler of the Idaho Fish and Game Department, there were approximately 75,000 angler man-days of steelhead fishing last fall and this spring... an angler man-day is equal to 4 hours per day. This adds up to approximately 300,000 hours of fishing annually.

This year, however, even with erosion and weather being moderate, we still lost about 3 weeks of fishing because runoff from the lower tributaries muddied the water on the lower Clearwater River. This condition has caused the few fishermen who still try to fish, to literally fight for a spot on the river above Peck and on the North Fork.

The lower tributaries that muddy the river are also important spawning streams for a natural population of "A" stock steelhead (5-10 lbs.). According to Al Espinosa, U. S. Forest Service Fisheries Biologist, there has been a 30% to 50% reduction in spawning due to sedimentation in these tributaries. The "A" stock fish move up river in September and October, hold over until spring, and then continue moving up the creeks to spawn when water flow increases. Unfortunately, this is also when sedimentation increases.

Among the main causes for excess sedimentation, are agricultural practices, logging operations and roads. Combined with highly erodible soils, and a 25 to 30 inch annual precipitation rate, it is obvious that we have a problem.

Currently, there is a State Program in the development stage which deals with the agricultural aspect. The Agricultural Pollution Abatement Program may be helpful in solving some of the sedimentation

problems evident in this and other areas. This program is primarily funded through tobacco and alcohol taxes, and offers assistance to farmers who wish to participate in newer farming technologies and conservation practices. The problems are: the amount of funding available, and the current poor financial condition of the farmers. Conservation practices cost money to implement, and can reduce yields, in some cases both temporarily and permanently. This, combined with the fact that some of these newer practices have not yet been tested over a long period of time, causes some farmers to be reluctant when it comes to trying them. The overall success of conservation practices however, is becoming more evident every day and more farmers are deciding to try these farming methods. Funding, if made available for erosion and sediment control, can help the steelhead population in this area.

The Clearwater Soil and Water Conservation District, along with the Nez Perce Conservation District is working closely with the Idaho Division of Environment toward finding workable solutions for the sedimentation problem on the Clearwater River.

Project to Inventory Weather Data

Moscow—Everybody talks about the weather but the University of Idaho is doing something about it. Myron Molnau, UI professor and state climatologist, and Dave Arnold, a scientific aide to Molnau, are cooperating with the National Environmental Data Referral Service (NEDRES) in an attempt to inventory the location and source of atmospheric data in the western states.

"There are many and diverse uses for atmospheric data," says Molnau. "Many people require it for problem solving in industries such as mining, forestry, agriculture, construction trades, transportation, and so forth. In order to solve these problems in a timely and economical manner, data must be available and readily obtained. NEDRES provides information about the largest number of atmospheric data sources in the western United States and prepare them for entry into NEDRES." The states include, Montana, Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, New Mexico, and Arizona.

A questionnaire is being sent out to state and private agencies for information. "We will take almost any type of listing that people have whether it be by station or by county," said Molnau. "Data especially needed are locational information, periods of record, and data format and source. We will do all the necessary translating into the NEDRES format and supply as much of the necessary information as we can from records at UI."

Molnau said they are not looking for data itself but "data about data." We want to know where stations are located, who is collecting what and for how long continuous collection has occurred."

NEDRES combines knowledge of many organizations and specialists with computer-communications technology, says Molnau. The database is accessible on a major information retrieval system from any location served by commercial data communication networks. A summary report of the project will be available in the summer of 1986.

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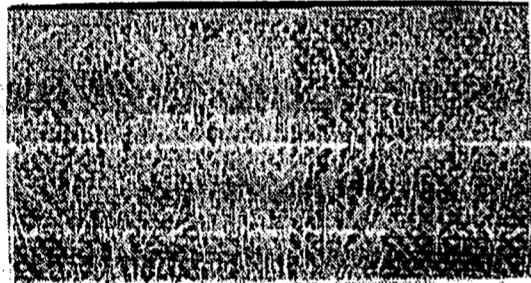
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**Julietta Tigers take 3 wins
