

Spring chinook angling takes only hatchery fish

The chinook salmon fishing season on limited stretches of the Little Salmon and Snake Rivers does not

rule out the need to protect runs in other Idaho waters, according to Mone Richards, Department of Fish and Game.

"Only spring chinook from Rapid River Hatchery return to the areas open for sport fishing; about four miles on the Little Salmon and six on the Snake," the fisheries bureau chief said. "This does not mean that other runs are not in serious shape."

This year's spring run is larger than expected, with downstream dam counts much higher than last year, but runs of wild spring chinook have been "seriously depressed" for several years and need all possible protection, he added.

Other hatchery-supported runs into Idaho are in a depressed or rebuilding situation. Fishing is not anticipated on chinook returning to the new Sawtooth Hatchery, Idaho Power Company's Pahsimeroi facility, or U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service hatcheries at Dworshak and Koo-

skia, Richards said.

The Fish and Game Commission opened the spring chinook season on parts of the Little Salmon and Snake from May 25 "until further notice." At the same time commissioners emphasized that both fisheries relied entirely on stock from Rapid River Hatchery.

"Those fish being harvested are surplus to hatchery needs—a minimum of 2,700 adult chinook at Rapid River. The projected return is expected to exceed minimum requirements and allow some outplants in tributaries, Richards said.

Idaho youth gather at U. of Idaho for 4-H congress, FFA contests

Moscow—High school students from throughout the state will meet at the University of Idaho this coming week for the Idaho 4-H Congress and the State Future Farmers of America Judging Contest.

Over 250 4-H members will attend their annual congress and participate in workshops and discussions and elect new officers, said Corinne Rowe, state 4-H program coordinator. The congress will be from June 10-14, and is sponsored by county 4-H agencies, the UI, and the United State Department of Agriculture. The State FFA Judging Contest begins June 11 and will include judging of livestock, dairy products, agricultural mechanics, crops, dairy cattle, meats and poultry. The contest is coordinated by vocational education instructors throughout the state, high-school members, and the UI Agriculture Extension and Education Department. Over 600 members will attend the contest which runs through June 14. Laura Hobbs of Meridian is the current Idaho FFA president.

Both events will take place on the UI campus, and students will reside in supervised dormitory housing.

'85 big game regulations come in new format

Those Idaho big game regulations that opened out to the size of a road map have been replaced this year by an easy-to-read booklet that measures slightly over 6 by 10 inches.

On the edges of some of the 32 pages are tabs that line up with keys on the front cover for quick reference to general information, controlled hunt rules and seasons and regulations for each species.

Another section is tabbed for management unit boundary descriptions and the map that shows the units.

Significant regulation changes are highlighted. For example, page 2 shows the cutoff dates will be in effect for the sale of deer and elk tags on a general basis. The dates are: Benewah, Bonner, Boundary, Ko-

oteni and Shoshone counties—October 4 for deer and elk tags. Clearwater, Idaho, Latah, Lewis and Nez Perce counties—October 1 for deer and elk.

Remainder of state—October 1 for deer and October 15 for elk.

Tags can be purchased only at Department of Fish and Game offices after cutoff dates and they will not be valid until two days after

the date of purchase. The regulations list the following permit totals for controlled hunts (with 1984 totals in parenthesis): deer, 8,150 (8,225); elk, 10,190 (8,760); moose, 350 (294); antelope, 3,090 (3,185); bighorn sheep, 165 (148); and mountain goat, 50 (60).

Heat Stress in Animals

Looks like we may get some summer weather after all. Hot weather can promote many problems in animals, the most obvious of which is heat stress.

The most common cause of heat stress is leaving an animal in a parked car on a warm day. Outside temperatures don't have to be very high in order to make the temperature inside a car intolerable. A parked car in direct sunlight with the windows cracked can have inside temperatures well over 100 degrees in a matter of minutes—even when outside temperatures are in the 60's and 70's.

Temperatures inside a car can become dangerous even if the car is parked in the shade, depending on temperature and humidity. The safety approach is to leave your pet at home when the weather is hot.

Signs of heat stress may range from vomiting to glazed eyes. Common signs of heat stress include exuberant panting, rapid pulse, purplish gums, prostration, and muscular tremors.

Emergency treatment for heatstroke is to first get the animal out of the car and into a shaded area. Apply something cold to the chest and head such as ice packs, water from a garden hose, or cold towels. Let the animal lick small portions of water or give him ice cubes or ice cream to lick on. It's important that the patient be given only small amounts of water at a time until normal temperature is obtained.

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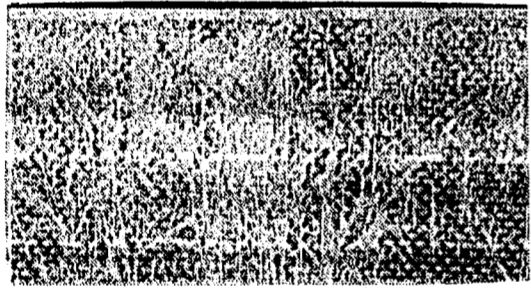
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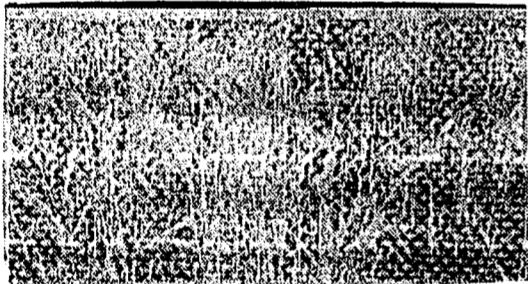
