Harley Perryman, Cedar Ridge farmer, Passed June 10

Harley Vern Perryman, a Kendrick-Juliaetta native, who farmed and lived his entire life within the immediate area, died Monday, June 10, apparently from a stroke.



He was admitted to Gritman Memorial Hospital at Moscow May 15 and later was transferred to Paradise Villa Convalescent Center. He had been in failing health for four years.

He was born October 11, 1904, at Juliaetta to Arthur and Evaline Dumbould Perryman. He attended elementary school at Juliaetta, later moving to Kendrick where he graduated from high school.

For many years he was a partner with his father and brother Clarence in a cafe at Kendrick.

He married Ida Morey at Clarkston November 28, 1933.

In 1942 the couple bought a farm in the Cedar Ridge - Gold Hill area where he farmed until his retirement.

He was an avid sportsman, loving to hunt and fish and loving the outdoors, seldom spending a year without bagging an elk in earlier years and was a talented landscape artist.

He served on the Cedar Ridge School Board for several years and was chairman of the area's road district many years. He also served on the Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service Committee for Latah County for eight years.

He joined the Presbyterian Church as a youth.

Survivors include his wife at the family home; one son, Gene, also of Kendrick; a brother, Quentin Perryman of Marion, Indiana; a sister, Thelma Kramer, of Appleton, Wisconsin; four nephews in Wisconsin; a niece in Indiana, and one cousin, Art Dumbould, at Culesac. His brother Clarence preceded him in death.

The funeral was held at 10:30 a. m., Thursday, June 13 at Shorts Funeral Chapel at Moscow. Burial followed at Wild Rose Cemetery on Big Bear Ridge.

ABOUT YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY Back Checks Limited—

If you delay applying for Social Security retirement or survivor benefits for some time after you become eligible you may miss out on some checks, Ila Andrews, Social Security field representative in Pullman said recently.

This is because the number of months for which back payments can be made is limited.

In general, anyone who applies for retirement or survivor benefits after they reach 65 can get back benefits for up to 6 months before the month they apply, but not before the month of their 65th birthday.

If you apply for reduced benefits before 65 generally you cannot get benefits for any month before the month you apply.

When you apply for benefits because you are disabled—workers, adult children, widows, and widowers—sometimes can get benefits for up to 12 months before the month you apply if you are eligible in all other ways.

You can save time when you apply for benefits if you have the necessary documents ready, Andrews said. This includes your Social Security card or record of the number, birth or baptismal certificate, W-2 forms or self-employment tax returns for the past 2 years, and marriage and death certificates, if appropriate.

Grasshopper spray household product

Moscow—If you have put flea collars on your pets or sprayed your roses for bugs, you are familiar with malathion and Sevin, the 2 insecticides being used to combat grasshopper infestations in southern Idaho, say University of Idaho entomologists.

Gene Carpenter an associate professor in the College of Agriculture said malathion is found in many home and garden products. "Approximately one in five products licensed in Idaho for use around the home contain Sevin" he said "and 14 percent contain malathion. Such products are used on ornamentals,

Both insecticides are registered for use on range crops, he said, and most field and vegetable crops.

Sevin was developed almost 30 years ago by Union Carbide and has been an important ally in combating pests since its introduction, said Garrett Wright, extension associate. Malathion was developed by American Cyanamid in 1950.

They are currently being used in southern Idaho to prevent another serious infestation of grasshoppers in area crops. The insects were recently determined to be over an acceptable threshold and posed a danger to this years harvest.

Animal Cancer

Cancer. The very word brings on visions of a dreaded wasting disease that is difficult to diagnose and requires exotic and harsh methods to treat. In actuality, many types of cancer are easily recognized and some respond well to treatment.

A synonym for cancer is neoplasm which literally means new (neo) growth. (plasm). A neoplasm is simply an abnormal waste of tissue that exceeds the growth of normal tissue and persists in an excessive manner.

Another synonym for cancer is "tumor" which indicates a swelling in any part of the body. A neoplasm can be as small as one abnormal cell or may spread to all parts of the body. Many tumors don't spread readily and are called benign. A benign tumor grows slowly, rarely spreads to other parts of the body, can often be easily removed and doesn't often reoccur after removal.

A malignant tumor exhibits rapid growth, often spreads through the body, is difficult to surgically remove, and tends to recur after removal. A benign tumor only kills an animal if it damages a vital function, but a malignant tumor always kills unless treated. Some malignancies respond well to treatment.

There are many methods of treatment for neoplasm and the type of treatment depends in part on the specific type of tumor, its location in the body, the health of the animal, and the size of the neoplasm. Surgical excision of a tumor is the most often used method when the neoplasm is well circumscribed and accessible to the surgeon. Other methods of treatment include chemotherapy, radiation therapy, freezing the tumor (cryotherapy) and application of localized heat to destroy a neoplasm.

Dogs and cats often get tumors of the mammary glands. These often respond well to treatment. Cats are commonly afflicted with a cancer of the blood cells called leukemia virus.

Horses frequently get skin tumors that are often easily removed. A new product on the market for use in horses will stimulate their immune system to fight a particular kind of skin neoplasm (equine sarcoma). This product works best when the tumor is small and requires re-
