**NEW NO-TILL DRILLS
GO ON DISPLAY**

Clifton Anderson Associate Agricultural Editor Moscow, Idaho—Farmers will be able to see new no-till drills in operation June 27, at a demonstration north of Pullman. A dozen drills, designed for seeding and applying fertilizer through crop stubble without prior tillage, will be demonstrated.

The planting demonstrations will be held from 2:00 to 5:00 p. m. at a field north of the Palouse Conservation Research Station. The research station will hold its annual field day Thursday, beginning at 8:00 a. m. and concluding with a luncheon at noon.

Roger Veseth, extension specialist working with the STEEP (Solutions to Environmental and Economic Problems) Project, said drills for no-till and minimum tillage farming systems have been developed by researchers, commercial firms and area farmers.

Drills will be demonstrated in the field and the implements' special features will be discussed. Growers will be able to observe the drills actual placement of seed and fertilizer in cross-section profiles of soil.

The planting demonstrations are sponsored by the University of Idaho, Washington State University, the UI-WSU STEEP Extension Program, the Soil Conservation Service, conservation districts of Whitman County, and the Pacific Northwest No-Till Association.

**"Passing it on":
Folklore conference
in Moscow June 28-29**

What is both local and national: personal yet public, populist and academic and old but constantly renewed? It is the wealth of stories, popular wisdom and tradition which people pass on to each other to better understand their families, towns or society, and which folklorists and historians call "folk culture."
On Friday and Saturday, June 28-29, a conference titled "PASSING IT ON: Interpreting Local Culture and Traditions" will offer a variety of workshops and panel discussions about specific aspects of folk culture, featuring both western and national experts in the field.
The special guest speaker at the conference will be Eliot Wigginton from Rabun Gap, Georgia, who in many ways initiated the current interest in folk knowledge and oral histories with his Foxfire books and educational programs. For nearly twenty years, Wigginton has been teaching high school students in Rabun Gap. He learned early that strong student interest is a prime motivator in the learning process. Through a combination of imagination and accident, he founded a magazine in his first year of teaching, Foxfire, written, edited, published and kept alive by the students. The students recorded the lore, yarns, and country wisdom of their parents, grandparents, and neighbors, not knowing that this was just the beginning of a national movement. Many years later Doubleday published a successful series of the Foxfire books. Wigginton has helped establish similar programs in other states, and this is his first workshop in Idaho. He still keeps students active in all aspects of the Foxfire program, and one of his students will be traveling to Idaho with him for the conference.
The two-day event will also feature a series of workshops designed to appeal to a variety of interests: interpreting historical sites to conserving textiles; from graphic design to editing oral histories for publication. Participants include Richard Hart, Director of the Institute of the North American West; Steve Siporin, Folk Arts Coordinator for the Idaho Commission of the Arts; Keith Petersen and Lorraine Mieke of the Latah County Historical Society; Troy writer Rob Moore; Latah County Historical Lillian Otness; and Idaho folklorist Lalla Boone.
The conference will focus on methods educators, historians, librarians, groups and individuals can use to interpret their own local history. Friday's session will include a panel discussion on organizing centennial and anniversary celebrations, and a series of afternoon workshops. Saturday's schedule is highlighted by a talk by Eliot Wigginton followed by workshops and a panel discussion on the value and uses of local culture and traditions. All events are open to the public. Animal Topics

SKIN DISEASES

Animals suffer from an amazing number of skin diseases; diseases that affect both young and old and occur in both small animals such as cats and dogs and larger animals such as cattle and horses.

Skin diseases have many causes, including allergies, mites, tumors, and infections. The skin is actually the largest organ of the body and because it is exposed to the environment is constantly being challenged by a variety of agents that can cause diseases.

There are a number of parasites that inhabit the skin. Fleas are a common parasite and cause an animal to itch incessantly, lose condition from constant irritation, and may even scratch or bite itself vigorously enough to cause an open wound (self mutilation). Some individuals become allergic to flea bites and will itch excessively and develop skin conditions after the bite from just one flea.

Mites, another parasite of the skin, cause diseases commonly referred to as mange. Some types of mange are very mild and easily treatable, whereas other types can be difficult to diagnose and exasperating to work with.

Ringworm is caused by a fungal parasite of the skin. Ringworm affects young animals more frequently but any age animal can become infected. Ringworm lesions are most often dry scaly areas that are roughly circular and contain broken hair shafts within them.

Warts are a common problem in cattle during the winter months. Warts tend to affect the head and neck regions and often disappear in the spring.

Sheep and goats are prone to getting skin abscesses. These abscesses are usually localized infections and most often occur around the neck and shoulders.

Some dogs suffer the embarrassment of acne. Canine acne usually occurs at puberty and is characterized by black-heads and pustules on the chin and lips. (Gee-whiz).

Skin tumors can occur in any breed of animal but is most notable in the horse. Grey horses have a relatively high incidence of certain types of skin tumors.

Skin diseases in animals can even have a psychological cause.

Some dogs will begin licking a particular spot on their legs until it becomes habitual; then the more they lick the more the area becomes irritated and so they lick it more to relieve the irritation which irritates it some more which promotes more licking.

Emergency closure ordered to protect wild chinook salmon

Stretches of the Clearwater and Salmon River drainages have been ordered closed to treaty Indian fishing for spring chinook salmon to protect severely depressed runs of wild fish, Department of Fish and Game director Jerry Conley announced.

His emergency conservation closure took effect at 12:01 p. m. (MDT) Thursday, June 20.

Fishing for hatchery-produced chinook remains open, however, on the Little Salmon River up to 100 yards above the mouth of Rapid River and for treaty Indian fishing on Rapid River from its confluence with the Little Salmon to 100 feet below the salmon weir and trap.

The closure takes in the Main Salmon from its confluence with the Snake up to and including the Middle Fork Salmon, along with Big Creek and its tributaries.

On the Clearwater system, the closure excludes only Clear Creek from its confluence with the Middle Fork Clearwater to the bridge below the Kooskia National Hatchery weir; also, the North Fork Clearwater from its mouth to 150 feet below the Dworshak National Hatchery fish ladder.

Harvest of even a few wild, naturally spawned wild fish will have a significant adverse impact on restoration of the resource, Conley stated.

Department of Health and Welfare introducing longer forms

People applying for Food Stamps, Medical, or cash assistance in Idaho will be completing new, more extensive forms.

The longer forms are in preparation for a statewide assistance computer network that is scheduled to go into operation in December of this year.

The new computer system, named EPICS, will store much of the information currently recorded manually by DHW staff. In the past, an assistance applicant was interviewed about his circumstances and the response was recorded in a case record. Under the new system, the applicant will answer a written questionnaire, provide appropriate verification, and the result will be stored in the EPICS computer system where DHW personnel can access the information as needed.

Persons who have applied for benefits under the old system will note that the new forms have more pages than the old forms. This is necessary because each question must be answered for every individual who is applying. The content of the questions and the type of information being gathered has not changed.

The DHW Financial Services staff is requesting the cooperation of all assistance applicants in the completion of the new forms. Applicants should plan to spend extra time during their appointments completing the requested information. For assistance and food stamp recipients who remain continually eligible for benefits, the new forms will need
