THE PARSON'S CORNER

ONE WAY

The farmer knows that there is only one way to get a stalk of wheat—plant a grain of wheat. The scientist knows that there is only one way to come up with water—combine hydrogen and oxygen. If you breed sheep, the only way to produce more sheep is to mate sheep with sheep. And if you are going to get to God the Father, become saved, you must go by way of Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "... no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me." (John 14:6). "I am the door: by Me if any man enter in, he shall be saved..." (John 10:19).

There are many people who believe in Jesus, but the question is which Jesus? Many different books, philosophies, and religions teach about Jesus, ranging from saying that He is an angel that became a perfect man to that He is the spirit-brother of Lucifer and a polygamist. But there must be only one true Jesus. The Bible describes Jesus as never being created, but as the Creator. (John 1). This means that He is God Himself as He claimed to be in John 5:18, 14:7&9. To say that Jesus at some time was created (like an angel or spirit offspring, making Him a creature) is to describe another Jesus other than that in the Bible.

This is a severe problem today in the struggle for the salvation of man. Many say they believe in Jesus, even using Bible terminology, and calling themselves Christians without believing in the Jesus of the Bible. Although many of these are sincere loving people, calling upon any other Jesus besides the one of the Bible is to call upon a source unable to bring one into heaven.

Using the Bible as the standard we must first ask, is He God Almighty, eternal, having always existed, and not one god of many gods? Next is He the Jesus who shed His divine blood for the washing away of sins? These two questions are critical as far as one's salvation is concerned, for Jesus said it Himself "... Take Heed that ye be not deceived: for many shall come in My name, saying, I am Christ; and the time draweth near: go ye not therefore after them." (Luke 21:8) Many well-meaning people are following after the wrong Jesus, we must be careful not to be one of them.
