### Wrestling Team Did Well at District Match

When members of the KHS wrestling team woke up Saturday morning, they were greeted outside their homes with posters like "pin to win" and with toilet paper streamers draped on trees and bushes. That day they were wrestling at Clearwater Valley High School for the District II, Class A-3 wrestling title. (Kendrick is the only A-4 team in Idaho to have a wrestling program, so they must compete at the A-3 level.)

There were six teams participating: Grangeville, Kamiah, Clearwater Valley, Pottlatch, Kootenai, and Kendrick. The top three finishers in each weight class would qualify for the Idaho State Wrestling Tournament on February 4, 5, 6 at Nampa.

Kendrick was represented with Matt Gravelle (119), Jerry Fey (125), Charlie Stamper (130), Kevin Holmes (135), Keith Taylor (140), Solomon Kampf (152), Jed Dennler (160), Ron Wylie (171), and Mike Carroll (189).

Most of Kendrick's wrestlers made it to the consolation final round, however, only Kampf won his match by default to take third place for a state berth.

Wrestlers who took fourth place were Gravelle, Fey, Stamper, Taylor, Wylie, and Carroll. Coach Cummings can proudly point out that none of his wrestlers in this round was pinned either; they lost only on points.

Kendrick, being only in the first year of its wrestling program, is looking ahead with much promise for next year. As one referee, who stopped by to congratulate Coach Cummings on his team's efforts, said after the tournament, "If there were a trophy for most-improved, Kendrick no doubt would have it."

With a smile, the coach appreciated the compliment with "Thanks"; but eyeing his team of wrestlers, he could easily well have said, "You ain't seen nothing yet!"

In the meantime, we'll have to wait until next wrestling season to see. As for this season, consider the Kendrick wrestling program a big success.

### Tiger Girls Won Over Nezperce, Culesac In District Tourney

Coach Terry Webb's KHS girls basketball team scored two victories in the opening rounds of the District II, Class A-4 basketball tournament at Lewiston last week and face the finals this week at Jennifer Jr. High.

In the opening session last Thursday, the Tigers romped to an easy 79-19 victory over the inexperienced and young Nezperce High School team, and then in second round action the Tigers defeated the highly regarded Culesac Wolves 53-46 Saturday night to set the stage for a match with the Genesee Bulldogs. Both of these teams are undefeated in tournament play.

Over Nezperce 79-19

The Nezperce Indians had a record of 1 win and 16 losses going into the game against the Tigers Thursday night and outgunned Indians didn't have any surprises that night either, falling to the Tigers 79-19 in a one-sided contest.

Kendrick lead 15-4 at the end of the first quarter—and things just got worse as the game went along.

"I don't know what you can say about a game like this," said Terry Webb, the Tiger coach, who played his second five nearly half the game. "It's a good one to open with."

The Kendrick win set the stage for the Tigers to meet Culesac, as the Wolves downed the Troy Trojans 41-33 in the other opening night game.

Kendrick had a 15-4 first quarter lead and where out in front 32-9 at the half.

Kendrick scored 18 points in the third period and then poured in an unneeded 29 points in the final period of play to take the win.

Renee Hewett scored 24 point to lead all scorers that evening, Lisa Gravelle had 7, Jennifer Fey, 2, Amy Mead 4, Karen Clemenhagen 7, Heidi Zumbo 4, Traci Anderson 3, Leah Heimgartner 8, Carrie Denton 6 and Joy Woods 9.

### Defeat Culesac 53-46

The Tigers guaranteed themselves a place in the semi-finals Saturday night when they edged the Culesac Wolves 53-46. The KHS girls had to shake off a ragged start that included missing 9 shots from the foul line in the second quarter. The Wolves also had put a strong defence up against Tiger Renee Hewett who finally found the range in the second half and scored 20 points down the stretch.

Kendrick hit 13 of 27 shots from the field in the second half, including an 8-of-14 performance by Hewett.

"We just kind of loosened up in the second half," said Coach Webb, whose club enjoyed a comfortable lead but never could get out of reach from the Wolves.

Hewett ended the game with 25 points, Karen Clemenhagen had 8, Traci Anderson 4, Leah Heimgartner 10, Carrie Denton 4 and Joy Woods 2.

## Idaho Building Activity Declined in 1987, Says First Security Report

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 56 major Idaho locations for 1987 was \$411 million, or 6 percent below the previous year.

This is the report of the monthly report, according to W. Dirk Hammond, Manager, of the Kendrick office of First Security Bank.

The report is written by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, senior vice president and economist of First Security Corporation, regional financial services company.

New residential construction for the year, said First Security, was 3,548 new dwelling units totalling \$183 million, a decrease of 13.1 percent in number and a decrease of 8.7 percent in value compared with 1986. Included in the total were 2,036 single-family, 576 multi-family and 936 mobile home permits.

New nonresidential construction valued at \$123.2 million was down 5.2 percent from 1986, while alterations and repairs totalling \$104.8 million were down 1.8 percent.

The publication noted that total construction value for authorized building permit construction during December amounted to \$26.7 million, or 44.2 percent above the prior month in 1986. This included new residential construction for 98 dwelling units totalling \$5.6 million and new non-residential construction valued at \$16.3 million.

## Animal Topics

### Trichinosis

Trichinosis is a disease caused by a small, worm-like parasite that infects meat. This parasite is found worldwide and has been found in many species of mammals, including man.

Most animals that are infected with trichinosis show little outward sign of disease; however, when people are infected they may feel ill in a number of ways, including abdominal pain, fever, fatigue, headaches, and muscle aches.

Transmission of trichinosis is brought about by simply eating infected meat. People most often become infected by eating undercooked pork and swine become infected by eating such things as rats, mice and wildlife. Meat scraps in garbage has been an important source of infection to swine in the past, but laws that prohibit the feeding of uncooked garbage to swine has lessened the prevalence of swine trichinosis.

Prevention of trichinosis involves simply preparing meat properly. Assume all pork and all wild game is infected then cook it properly. Properly prepared meat will not transmit trichinosis.

The USDA recommends that pork (and wild game) should be cooked uniformly to a temperature of 170 degrees F. This will kill the parasite and render the meat safe. Microwave cooking, which may not be prolonged or uniform, may not kill the parasite. The meat needs to be heated thoroughly to 170 degrees.

Trichinosis can also be killed by freezing with the temperature and length of time required to kill the parasite dependent on the thickness of the meat. The USDA recommends that meat less than 6 inches thick be frozen to 5 degrees for 20 days; or -10 degrees F. for 10 days; or -22 degrees F. for 6 days.

These recommended freezing times do not apply to meat from Arctic or Alaskan regions (such as Alaskan grizzly bear or polar bears) because a strain of trichinosis exists in northern regions that is resistant to freezing. Meat from these northern regions is safe to eat, however, if cooked properly—uniform temperature of 170 degrees F.

Processed, ready-to-eat pork products made in federally inspected plants are safe to eat.

**CLOSET CHRISTIANS**

The butterflies in my stomach increased as my friend parked the car in down town Dallas. This was my first time to go street witnessing, and I was nervous. My friend however was a veteran at this, having spent time talking to the night people of down town Dallas about Jesus many times before. I stayed close to him as we walked around talking to various people. My eyes were really opened when we walked up to what looked like a woman at first glance, only to find that it was a man in "drag" (dressed and made up like a woman.) He was the first Drag Queen that I had ever met. (A Drag Queen is a male homosexual dressed like a woman looking for some action.) Many of the people we talked to listened with interest and took our literature, some growled and walked away.
