Milton Benjamin, Retired Southwick **Farmer Passes**

Milton Nathan Benjamin, a retired Southwick area farmer, died of congestive heart failure Sunday, Feb. 7 at St. Joseph's Regional Medical Center at Lewiston. He was 84.
