He was an avid reader. He was a communicant of the Catholic Church. Survivors include three sisters, Elizabeth J. Hein of Lewiston, Theresa L. Wallace of Spokane and Margaret M. Nye of Baker, Oregon, and a brother, Thomas E. Whalen of Houston, Texas. He was preceded in death by two sisters.

A rosary was recited at 7:30 Monday evening at Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home in Lewiston and the funeral was at 11 a. m. Tuesday at St. Stanislaus Catholic Church at Lewiston with the Rev. John Kindall officiating. Burial was at the Julietta City Cemetery.

## Milton Benjamin, Retired Southwick Farmer Passes

Milton Nathan Benjamin, a retired Southwick area farmer, died of congestive heart failure Sunday, Feb. 7 at St. Joseph's Regional Medical Center at Lewiston. He was 84.

He worked at the former Potlatch Corp. mill at Potlatch, Idaho for a time before beginning his 52-year farming career in 1925. He was known as an excellent machinist and his farm was a meeting place for neighbors, for whom he made machinery, including cultivators, snow plows and haying equipment.

Although a car accident in 1949 left him partially paralyzed, he remained active until his retirement in 1977. In 1980, he moved to Julietta.

He was born Feb. 28, 1903, at Harrisburg, Idaho, to the Rev. Geo. W. and Jessie Benjamin. Because of his father's calling, the family lived in several communities. In about 1916, they moved to Julietta, Southwick and then back to Julietta. After high school graduation there in 1920, Benjamin moved to Potlatch.

He married Elvira Henderson at Moscow May 21, 1924. In 1925, they moved to the Southwick farm, which had been his wife's grandparents' homestead.

Benjamin was active in community life, serving on the Southwick school board for many years, helping with the town's telephone service and in building the first roads at Southwick.

He was a member of the Wesleyan Church at Clarkston, where he served as lay leader, taught Sunday school until 1986 and on occasion, acted as lay minister. He donated many hours to building the present church.

His wife died October 8, 1982.

He is survived by a daughter, Alice Fry of Southwick; two sons, Verlin of Julietta and Ronald of Asotin; two brothers, Murray of Princeton, Idaho, and Richard of Kendrick; two sisters, Ruby Clear and Erma Jean Jones, both of Clarkston; 13 grandchildren and 28 great-grandchildren.

The funeral will be at 10 a. m. Thursday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Jim Koons of the Wesleyan Church officiating. Burial will follow at 12:15 p. m. at Southwick.

The family suggests any memorials be contributions to the Kendrick-Julietta Ambulance Fund of the Wesleyan Church.

## Tiger Girls Upset Genesee To Win District Hoop Crown; Open at State Thursday

Coach Terry Webb accomplished just what he said he was going to do—get his KHS girls basketball team to its peak at tournament time. The work and effort paid off last week in Lewiston as the Tigers rolled to four wins and the District II, Class A-4 championship, winning a berth in the State tournament that begins Thursday, Feb. 11.

Coach Webb and his squad left Kendrick Wednesday morning at 8:00 a. m. for Boise. The team will play its first game Thursday afternoon at 5:30 (local time) against Maranatha Christian, the number 2 team from District 3. Maranatha is

a small Boise school. To allow students and parents to attend the tournament, school will be dismissed at regular time on Wednesday and will not resume until Monday, Feb. 15 (school will be held on Monday, which was scheduled to be a President's Day vacation.)

There will be no student buses except the one taking the players, going to Boise.

## Genesee Out-Gunned 79-72

Kendrick's team moved through the preliminary games at Lewiston with ease, knocking off Nezperce in the first contest and then edging out Culdesac 53-46 in the second match to set the stage for a dramatic two-game confrontation with the Genesee Bulldogs, winners of the Whitepine League conference and the tournament's number 1 seed.

Kendrick and Genesee, both undefeated clashed Wednesday night at Jenifer Jr. High and both squads put on a brilliant display of top-notch, "run-and-gun" basketball before a packed, delighted crowd of fans, who saw Kendrick battle back from an early 8 point deficit to win 79-72.

It was a game well-suited for the Tigers and their talented guard Renee Hewett, who hit an all-time high 37 points to lead the Tigers to victory. But Hewett got help from sophomore Karen Clemenhagen, who hit eight of 13 shots from the floor to contribute 17 points for the evening.

Genesee, using the height advantage of 6-0 Deni Herman and 5-11 Renae Griggs, plus the sharp shooting of Carrie Vestal, moved out to an early lead. The Bulldogs outscored Kendrick 22-16 in the first quarter, and were still ahead 40-35 at half time.

The constant pressure of the Tiger attack started to show in the third quarter and two free throws by Hewett tied the game at 54-54 with 53 seconds left in the third period, and then Traci Anderson hit from the circle to put Kendrick ahead for good at 56-54.

The Tigers kept up the running offense in the final period and just out-hustled the Bulldogs as the Tigers scored 23 points to Genesee's 17 for the win.

Hewett's 37 points led all scorers, with Karen Clemenhagen's 17 adding to the final. Carrie Denton put 9 points on the board, Traci Anderson 8, and Leah Heimgartner 8.

Deni Herman's 26 points were high for the Bulldogs with Carrie Vestal getting 20, and Renae Griggs 10.

## Tigers Win Championship

It takes two losses to eliminate a team in a double bracket tournament such as the one in Lewiston last week, so the Tigers had to face the Bulldogs again Friday night after Genesee had beaten the Deary Mustangs Thursday night in the losers' bracket. In the game for the District II crown, both teams stayed with what had always worked for them best—Genesee using its height and strength and the Tigers depending on speed and hustle. Once again it was the speed and determination of the Tigers, plus another roaring 3rd quarter that gave them the 50-43 win and the District championship.

Genesee, as it had done in the clubs' first tournament meeting Wednesday night, jumped out to an early lead, going up 22-12 on Renae Griggs' jump shot from the circle midway through the second quarter. But Kendrick tallied the final six points of the quarter and were behind 18-22 at the half.

Again it was Renee Hewett who sparked the Tiger rally in the third period as she scored two baskets on drives, then pumped in a three-pointer, hit a follow-up shot, stole a pass that resulted in a lay-in and finally nailed a jumper just before the quarter ended and Kendrick had a 42-30 lead.

Genesee never quit trying though, and with the inside work of Herman and Gregg, fought back and at one time cut Kendrick's lead to 46-43 before Hewett popped one in to make it 48-43. Herman's shot with 1:25 left in the game closed the gap to 48-45. Vestal missed a shot and Hewett drove the full length of the court for the final points of the game.

Hewett's 22 points were high for both teams, Karen Clemenhagen added 6, Traci Anderson 2, Leah Heimgartner 4 and Carrie Denton 16.

## Tiger Boys Dump Nezperce 70-59

The Indians of Nezperce High School, who have only won two boys basketball games this season, didn't improve their record Saturday night as they traveled to Kendrick and were sent home with the short end of a 70-59 score.

"It was a pretty ragged game," reported Clark Bradley, the Kendrick coach. Kendrick turned the ball over 17 times during the game.

Brenden Millard paced the Tiger win with 24 points and 15 rebounds. Ron Hewett had 17 points and Chad Snee collected 16. Aaron Heinen scored 3, Tom Flowers 4 and Sean Syverson 6.

Kendrick took an 18-11 lead at the end of the first quarter and had increased it to 40-23 at the half.

Kendrick is now 6-4 in the White Pine League and 10-7 on the season.

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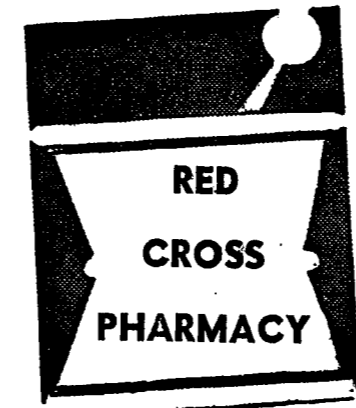

**"UNWANTED" PETS**

A disturbing number of abandoned pets have been showing up lately. Many have been abandoned near county garbage disposals while others are dumped off on the back roads. Often these animals are newly weaned puppies and kittens that are confused, scared, and ill equipped to survive as wild animals.

Out of kindness and pity many county residents begin caring for these abandoned and mistreated animals. These are nice folks who shouldn't be thrust into the responsibility of taking care of animals abandoned by irresponsible and unconscionable owners.

Stray dogs and cats can pose a threat to other animals and are common pests; in addition, these strays can cause a public health problem of diseases transmissible to man. People who dump pets saddle anyone else having a concern for animal welfare with the responsibility of controlling the stray problem.

There are some constructive things an individual can do to help alleviate the problem:

—Support your local humane shelter. It takes money for them to operate. They can use donations and voluntary help.

—Become informed and educate others of the problem. No one wants a sick pet or child because someone dumped a stray; nor does anyone want livestock or wildlife harassed and injured by feral dogs or cats.

—Have your pet neutered and urge others to do the same.

It is a popular concept that a female pet should have one litter before being spayed to be a "complete" dog. This is untrue and homes must be found for the puppies or kittens or else they must be "disposed of."

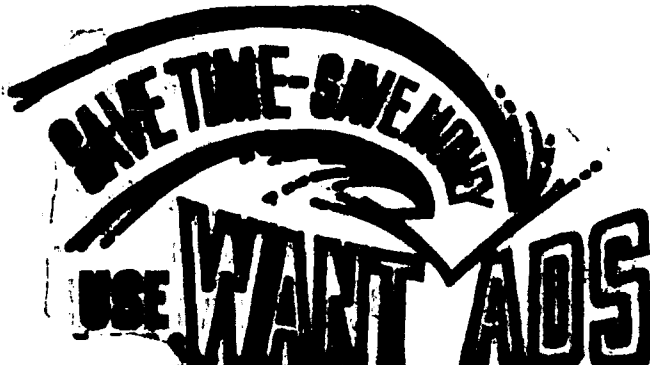
