Animal Topics

Anemia

Anemia is a condition where the body's capacity to carry oxygen in the bloodstream is greatly reduced by a loss of red blood cells or hemoglobin.

Red blood cells carry oxygen from the lungs to the rest of the body. The oxygen is carried in the red cells by a large molecule called hemoglobin. Hemoglobins will release its load of oxygen when it is carried into a tissue area that is low in oxygen. Hemoglobin will not release its valuable load in areas that have adequate oxygen levels. Thus in a normal animal, oxygen is delivered where it is needed most.

Like a furnace, an animal's metabolism has to have a constant supply of oxygen to run properly. If the body's oxygen delivery system in the cardiovascular system has problems, then the animal becomes ill. Red blood cells and their hemoglobin are critical components of this oxygen delivery system. Anemia is the term we use to describe problems with red cells and hemoglobin.

Anemia is like a headache, there are many things that can cause this condition and treatment is most successful when the underlying cause of the condition is known. Some virus will cause anemia, particularly in horses and cats.

Equine infectious anemia is a viral caused disease that can infect a horse for life. Most states in the U. S. have entrance requirements for horses that includes a negative EIA test before entry. There is not an effective vaccine against AIE and once a horse contracts the disease there is also not an effective treatment to cure the problem. Horses with EIA lose weight, become depressed and have an intermittent fever.

Cats can become afflicted with a virus called Feline leukemia virus that will cause a number of prob-

lems. A consistent sign of feline leukemia is anemia. Cats can be tested to determine if they have feline leukemia and there is now a vaccine to help control this deadly disease.

Cattle can become affected by an anemia caused by an organism that lives inside red blood cells. This disease, called Anaplasmosis, is transmitted from cow to cow by ticks, flies, and mosquitoes.

Any animal that has a disease that produces an anemic state will usually show signs of generalized weakness and pallor. Usually there is an increased heart rate because the body is desperately trying to deliver red blood cells to oxygen-starved tissues. Shortness of breath is also a sign of anemia as well as exercise intolerance.
