The garbage rates in the city of Hill and Valley Garden Juliaetta increased 40 cents a month effective January 1st, it was reported by city clerk Nancy Fey. lems. A consistent sign of feline leukemia is anemia. Cats can be tested to determine if they have feline leukemia and there is now a vaccine to help control this deadly disease. Cattle can become affected by an anemia caused by an organism that lives inside red blood cells. This disease, called Anaplosniosis, is transmitted from cow to cow by ticks, flies, and misquitoes.

Any animal that has a disease that produces an anemic state will usually show signs of generalized weakness and pallor. Usually there is an increased heart rate because the body is desperately trying to deliver red blood cells to oxygen-starved tissues. Shortness of breath is also a sign of anemia as well as exercise intol-


