

The task force will make recommendations to improve commodity delivery schedules, communications with local operators, and the type and form of food received.

In contrast to the half-dozen items offered when the program began 50 years ago, more than 60 items are available today. Many of the basic commodities, such as wheat, dairy products, beef and potatoes, are being processed by the federal and state government and local schools into pizza, cookies, chicken nuggets, frozen french fries, pastas and other foods which schools can more readily use.

To give schools the greatest degree of flexibility in their menu cultural surpluses, acquired through planning and preparation, the USDA has increased the varieties of individual foods. Schools can order several flours, for example: all purpose, whole wheat, bread, baker's hard wheat, baker's soft wheat, and durum. And each is available bleached or unbleached.
