## **Farm Groups Support Diesel Tax Exemption**

The American Farm Bureau and 15 other general farm and commodity organization have joined to support legislation that would reverse a controversial plan to require farmers to pay a tax they don't owe. A provision of the Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987 requires farmers purchasing diesel fuel for use on their farms to pay a 15-cent per gallon tax at the time of purchase and file for a refund or credit later.

The farm groups say it makes no sense for farmers, who are not required to pay the tax on fuel for off-highway use, to have to pay it up-front, then file and wait for a refund.

In communications sent to all Passes Feb. 24 members of the House and Senate and to the Secretary of the Treasury, the American Farm Bureau pointed out that many users whose purchases would not qualify them for quarterly refunds would have to wait until the end of the year to obtain their refunds.

A number of bills have been introduced which Farm Bureau and the other groups said would reverse the harmful provision by extending the exemption for the diesel fuel tax for at Peck. fuel used off the highways.




A malignant tumor exhibits rapid growth, often spreads through the body, is difficult to surgically remove, and tends to recur after removal. A benign tumor only kills an animal if it damages a vital function, but a malignant tumor always kills unlses treated. Some malignancies respond well to treatment.

There are many methods of treatment for neoplasms and the type of treatment depends in part on 'the specific type of tumor, its location in the body, the health of the animal, and the size of the neoplasm. Surgical excision of a tumor is the most often used method when the neoplasm is well circumscribed and accesible to the surgeon. Other met-A neoplasm can be as small as one hods of treatment include chemoabnormal cell or may spread to all therapy, radiation therapy, freezing parts of the body. Dogs and cats often get tumors of body, can often be easily removed the mammary glands. These often respond well to treatment. Cats are commonly afflicted with a cancer of the blood cells called leukemia. Leukemia in cats is caused by a virus (Feline Leukemia virus) and there is a new vaccine that will protect most cats against this virus. People cannot "catch" leukemia from a cat nor is there any known case of a human becoming infected with the feline leukemia virus.

Horses frequently get skin tumors that are often easily removed. A new product on the market for use in horses will stimulate their immune system to fight a particular kind of skin neoplasm (equine sarcoid). This products works best when the tumor is small and requires repeated iniections.

Cattle commonly get a tumor on


