### Frank Eveland, Retired Rural Mail Carrier, In Spokane Hospital

Frank Eveland, who was a rural carrier at the Kendrick Post Office for a number of years, was admitted to Sacred Heart Hospital in Spokane last Wednesday where he is undergoing chemotherapy for acute leukemia, his son Marvin reported this week.

Serving the Kendrick rural area as its mailman for a number of years Frank became a well-respected and well-liked member of the community and the sudden onset of this illness is a shock to his many friends. His son Marvin, who is a teacher at Kendrick High School, said his father's spirits are good and he would enjoy hearing from his many friends. Frank is in room 744 at Sacred Heart Hospital. Marvin said visitation is very restricted at this time.

#### Could Use Blood

As part of the treatment Frank is going to receive in addition to chemotherapy, Frank (he is listed on hospital records as Frances), will be receiving tremendous quantities of blood. This is going to be a very great expense if the blood is not replaced by donations. Frank's friends are asking that anyone who can, to consider donating blood in his name. ### Lydia Richardson, Formerly of Fix Ridge Passes March 10

Lydia Emmaline Clark Richardson, died March 10, 1988 at Tarzana, California. Cause of death was due to infirmities of age.

Lydia was born on Fix Ridge near Juliaetta, Idaho, February 28, 1896, to Columbus and Sophronia Johnson Clark. She attended school at the Union School and the Fix Ridge School, graduating from the eighth grade at Fix Ridge. On May 3, 1916 she married David Mathew Richardson, son of Edgar (E. M.) and Elizabeth Dreasler Richardson at Moscow, Idaho. They farmed on Fix Ridge until 1923.

The Richardson, Clark, and related families of Johnson, Ross, and Olney were among the earliest pioneer families on Fix Ridge.

Late in the fall of 1923 they, with their small son Estel, went to Southern California to escape the cold of winter. Mr. Richardson found work there, and they never returned to Idaho to live. However, Lydia always felt that Fix Ridge was home. Her friends and relatives there were always important to her. She missed only two or three of the annual Fix Ridge picnics.

She took a very active part in the raising of her grandchildren and her great-grandchildren. She remembered the birthdays of each of her children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, their spouses, and their anniversaries without writing them down.

She loved crafts and needlework and made Christmas tree ornaments for each member of her family. She was an excellent seamstress, and as recently as two months ago she sewed a dress for herself.

For the past twenty-three years she lived at Granada Hills, Calif. In the later years of her life she traveled all over the United States to be with members of her family during a time of illness, for weddings, graduations, or any event where she could be of help or add to the joy of the occasion. She was a real lady, and loved her family well.

She is survived by a brother, Ira Clark, of St. John, Washington; four children—a son, Estel Richardson of Martinsburg, West Virginia; a daughter, Columbine Brown of Granada Hills, California; a daughter Nancy Johnson of Long Beach, California; and a son, Wesley Richardson of Princeton, Idaho; thirteen grandchildren, twenty-four great-grandchildren, one foster great-grandson, and many nieces and nephews. Her husband Dave, three brothers, two sisters and three great-grandchildren preceded her in death. She was a member of the Canoga Park Seventh Day Adventist Church.

## Final Month of Low Income Energy Assistance Program

Community Action Agency (CAA) of Lewiston announces that the Idaho Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is now in its final month of the 1987-88 season.

LIHEAP is a federally-funded program that makes a home heating benefit available to households meeting low-income eligibility guidelines. Community Action Agency administers the program in Nez Perce, Latah, Lewis, Clearwater, and Idaho counties.

After March 31 only a limited amount of emergency heating assistance will be available.

Persons who desire more information or wish to apply should contact CAA by March 31st. The phone number is 746-3354.

This year about 3,500 households in North Central Idaho have received assistance through CAA's program. According to the Idaho State Office for Economic Opportunity in Boise, applications from the state as a whole are lower than last year's levels, so there are ample funds available. This will not be the case next year, however, due to the budget cut passed by Congress last December, and a probable further decrease in the LIHEAP appropriation, such as the 16 percent cut suggested in the Reagan administration's most recent budget proposal.

### A Good Year

#### For Turkeys

The 1987-88 winter period was a good "year" for turkeys in Idaho. Wild turkeys were trapped from strong, existing populations and moved into 13 new areas in a continuing project designed to enhance turkey numbers in the state.

"There was a total of 269 birds captured and relocated in this year's efforts," according to Neil Johnson, who heads the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's wild turkey program.

Johnson indicated that some sportsmen were worried the transplant programs would deplete stocks of "local" birds, but quickly pointed out that turkeys were not even found in Idaho until they were brought into the state by the department some 20 years ago. He further explained that trapping rarely catches adult toms, which are the only turkeys hunters can harvest.

"Furthermore," Johnson explained, "it is important that we take advantage of the enlarged populations of turkeys that have built up during the last three mild winters. The larger numbers not only mean they are easier to capture but also reduces the competition for food in the areas from which they are taken and at the same time creates whole new populations of birds."

### THE PARSON'S CORNER

#### HIGHER LAW

The woman who was caught in the very act of adultery was told by Jesus, "... go, and sin no more." (John 8:3-11) Do we as Christians believe that Jesus meant what He said? Perhaps He said it to give us preachers a good text. I know of a husband who found out right after he was married, that his wife was a chronic liar. When she was under pressure she would lie to avoid looking bad. She regressed into doing this as a result of her mother reprimanding too harshly when she failed. This husband would come home from work and ask if she had done a certain task, and because she wasn't able to do it, she would lie about it, hoping to get it done the next day. As you can guess these lies caught up to her very quickly. Both the husband and wife were committed Christians, yet there was this sin. In another case a father was very harsh with his children. Abusive is a term that could be used. This was a result of the father carry-

ing bitterness towards his own father. This father was a dedicated Christian also. Does Jesus really mean we are to sin no more?

Jesus does in fact mean that we are to sin no more. Sin is not to be the life style of the Christian. Paul writes in Romans 8, "For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death." There is a strong law operating in the world and that is called the law of sin, just like gravity it is always there to pull us down. But as Christians we have access to a higher law, the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus, just like the law of "lift" that birds and airplanes use to overcome gravity. Both the wife and father in my stories have used this higher law to overcome sin. Christians are to be free from the law of sin. ### Less Surplus Food Available In Idaho

Changes in federal policies have substantially reduced the amount of surplus food available to low-income families in Idaho, according to state Department of Health and Welfare.

The Temporary Emergency Food Assistance Program has provided cheese, nonfat dry milk, butter, honey, corn meal, rice and flour since 1982. But no rice or honey will be shipped to Idaho in April, Health and Welfare said, and shipments in May will include only flour and corn meal.

In January, 10 truckloads of food were distributed to 18,000 families in Idaho. The state is expected to receive seven truckloads in April

and only two truckloads in May. Availability of specific items may vary in different communities, the department said.

Federal officials say changing farm policies have reduced food stockpiles. The U. S. Department of Agriculture also is legally required to give higher priority to other domestic and foreign obligations, including the National School Lunch Program.

Commodities locally, will be about the same for the next 3 months, then gradually decline in amount, according to Dian McKnight, the local coordinator.

McKnight said there will be distribution of cheese, milk and flour this week on Thursday and Friday, March 17-18.
