Wm. C. Turner, 77, Claimed by Pneumonia Mar. 22

William C. Turner, 77, a retired Juliaetta lumberman and civic leader, died of pneumonia at a Yuma, Arizona hospital Tuesday, March 22. He and his wife had been wintering in the south west he was taken ill.



Mr. Turner was born August 16, 1910, in Harlem, Montana, the son of Clyde and Mary Turner.

In 1940 he moved to Sisters, Oregon, to work for the Hitchcock Lumber Co., and the following year he married May Allgood. To this union were born two children, Darlene Zulaski of Donald, Oregon and Ted R. Turner of Hines, Oregon. May preceded him in death in 1974.

During World War II Bill left the Hitchcock Lumber Co. to serve in the U. S. Marine Corps, returning to Sisters, Oregon in 1945 to employment with the same company. In 1950, he moved to White Swan, Wa., as Hitchcock Lumber had purchased a lumber mill in that city, known as White Swan Lumber Co. In 1954 he moved to Heppner, Oregon to work at Heppner Pine Mills for the same company, and worked there until 1960 when he moved back to White Swan. In 1965 he moved again for the same company, this time to serve as manager for Gem State Lumber Co. in Juliaetta, Idaho, remaining in this position until his retirement in 1978.

He was a member of the Kendrick United Methodist Church and the Kendrick Camper Club.

On February 8, 1976, he and Alberta Schupfer were married at Kendrick, Idaho. She survives him at their home in Juliaetta.

Other survivors include his two children, Darlene and Ted; two step-daughters Marilyn Eichner, Kendrick and Beverly Morris, Buenos Aires, Argentina; two brothers, Henry of Pinehurst, and Robert of Harrah, Wash.; three sisters, May Fishel of Vancouver, Wash., Mary Heddington of Tule Lake, Calif., and Lorrene Lawrence of Gresham, Ore.; 4 grandchildren, 6 step-grandchildren, 9 step-great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

The body will be cremated in Yuma, Arizona. Memorial services will be held Saturday, March 26, at 10 a. m. at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston. The family requests any memorials be given to the Kendrick United Methodist Church or the charity of your choice.

School Financial Status Reviewed At March Meeting; Override Levy Vote Set

Tuesday, March 15, the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 was held at the school. Under old business, the board adopted an AIDS policy that is a hybrid of Blaine County's AIDS policy, the only school district in the state of Idaho that has had an AIDS case enrolled. The Kendrick policy adds some further safeguards to the original policy.

Under new business, the board hired 2 half-time elementary school custodians because of the retirement of Mel and Verna Gibbins. Aleana Polunsky was hired immediately to fill the 1/2 time position with cleaning emphasis and Jim Tanata will start to work Friday, June 17 in the 1/2 time position with maintenance emphasis.

Kathleen Jenny, the school district's music teacher reviewed with the school board her curriculum and classroom activities from grades 1 through 12. She expressed pride in the junior high and high school band programs. She also mentioned a reality that music teachers all over the state of Idaho are having to face with the new additional state requirements for graduation. "High school bands are chiefly composed of younger and younger students, (freshmen and sophomores), because the juniors and seniors are having to take further courses for high school graduation and college entrance requirements," she told the board.

Financial Outlook Reviewed

The district's financial status was reviewed as well as the district's enrollment projections based on an annual computer program print-out that is released from the State Department of Education. This enrollment projection is designed to help boards and districts make decisions that relate to finance, since 80 per cent of any school district's funds come from the state based on enrollment and 20 per cent comes from local property taxes.

Kendrick's enrollment projection shows continued decrease in enrollment of 5 to 10 students for the next 3 or 4 years. February 15 is the earliest point in a school year that a district can get a clear picture of how the finances are going to finish out the fiscal year (July 1), and how the cash flow is going to be into the first 2 months of the new year. February 15 is the point in the

school year that districts get their 3rd of 5 state apportionment (80%) checks and it is the first point in a school year that the state computer has "crunched" out the enrollment figures for that given school year with all the divisors at the various grade levels to determine the numbers of classroom units a school district receives based on ADA (average daily attendance). The board was given a six-month spreadsheet that showed the cash flow in the maintenance and operation budget as well as plant facilities, tort and bond and interest budgets.

Because of the \$95,000 override that the taxpayers approved last May to catch up for 2 years previous the best prediction at this point is that the district will end June 30 with \$9000 in the black. The superintendent pointed out that the school district did have one piece of good financial news that was that last year's legislature changed the tables of divisors that make up the classroom unit calculations which gave the district 8 more of a classroom unit which translates into dollars at the tune of \$20,000. The former tables had been in effect for approximately 5 to 7 years and this piece of good news was the pivotal point that pushed our predictions into the \$9,000 to \$10,000 positive figures instead of \$9,000 to \$10,000 negative side of year end cash flow in the maintenance and operation budget. Glen Utzman, the district's CPA, as well as attorney was present for the meeting as the discussion went into the decision of what should be the size of an override levy this May.

As of July 1, 1987 the law in Idaho changed whereby a district may have an override levy in effect for 2 years. There was a lengthy discussion on the state of our local economy, the possible longer range financial planning of taking advantage of the provisions of the new law and the difficulties of setting figures to keep on the positive side of a balanced budget with the local situation of a slightly decreasing enrollment. The analogy was made that it was like trying to shoot upward at a moving target that is slowly falling.

The discussion then covered some of the rhetoric coming out of the legislature concerning school consolidation and the remarks made by a legislator from Eagle. The discussion primarily was concerned with the quality of education a student of ours would have if they had to ride a bus from the far points of Latah or Nez Perce counties to Lewiston or Moscow in a consolidation model the Eagle legislator proposed by 1990 for those school districts not having 50 or more students per graduating class. It was further stated that while a school board's first consideration is the quality of a student's education, one can clearly see the economic implications on small towns within 5 to 10 years if such a plan was adopted. Idaho could end up with numerous ghost towns and a shoestring of 8 or 9 population centers around the perimeter of the state.

The superintendent commented that if the taxpayers can stick with us there are better times ahead because we are starting to work our way out of the financial crunch, but we are in a very vulnerable period. Glen Utzman agreed that in 7 1/2 more years when the bond levy at Juliaetta Elementary is retired, the taxpayers will again enjoy one of the lowest tax rates again in the state.

It was commented that if his consolidation proposal would go through the farmer, businessman and homeowner of this district would forever be subject to the tax rate of the larger school district (Moscow, Lewiston, or Orofino, depending upon which county the taxpayer lives in) as well as be expected to pick up the bonded indebtedness of the existing district until the obligation is retired.

Concluding this lengthy discussion, the board approved to go to the voters with a 2-year supplemental override asking for \$75,000 for the 1988-89 school year and \$65,000 for the 1989-90 school year. This would be a \$20,000 decrease from this year's \$95,000 override for the first year and a \$30,000 decrease for the second year of the override.

The election will be held the traditional 3rd Tuesday in May—May 17th. A simple majority would be required to pass this reduced override levy.

Lisa Gravelle, a sophomore student at Kendrick High School and the daughter of Paul and Carolyn Gravelle of Juliaetta, will be performing in concert with the Idaho All-State Band Saturday, March 26 at 3:00 p. m. at the Moscow Jr. High field house.

Lisa was among the high school students from all parts of the state who was selected as a member of the All-State Band. The group is sponsored each year by the Idaho Music Teachers Association.

Miss Gravelle is a flutist. Tickets for the concert are \$3.50 for adults, \$2.00 for students and \$10 for families.

Social Security Numbers Must Show on Income Tax

Do you have children or other dependents you plan to claim on your 1987 Federal income tax return? Yes? Then you should remember that a Social Security number must be shown on your tax return for each dependent age 5 or older, Ila Andrews, Social Security field representative in Pullman, said recently. This is required by the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

If a child or other dependent does not have a number, then one should be applied for without delay. It is easy to apply, Andrews said. All a person has to do is complete an application and provide evidence of date of birth, identity, and U. S. citizenship or lawful alien status. This can be done by mail or in person. However, a person 18 or older who has never had a Social Security number must apply in person. A parent applying on behalf of a child must also provide evidence of his or her identity.

For a person born in the U. S., a birth certificate can provide evidence of both birth and citizenship. For children, school, medical, day-care, church, or similar documents can be used to establish identity.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Photocopies and notarized copies are not acceptable. The documents will be returned.

For more information about applying for a Social Security No., you may call 1-900-200-4636 toll-free 24 hours a day. If AT&T is not your long distance carrier, you must first dial a 5 digit access code—10288—before dialing 1-900-200-4636.

To request an application, you may call 1-800-632-5121 in Idaho or 1-800-562-6350 in Washington, or contact the Social Security office at SE 1205 Professional Mall Blvd., P. Box 459, Pullman, WA 99163.
