Registration Necessary for May School Election

On Tuesday, February 16, the Kendrick School Board of Trustees took action to run a reduced two-year school override levy of \$75,000 for the 1988-89 school year and \$65,000 for the 1989-90 school year, on May 17 from 12 noon to 8 p. m. The override replaces the one-year \$95,000 override that is currently in effect. Since this board action, several questions have been asked the Superintendent of school, Eldon Taylor, by the patrons.

Question: Are there any changes in the election procedures this year over other years?

Answer: Yes. The most dramatic change is the requirement that voters must be registered before they are permitted to vote in a school election. House Bill 194 of the '87 Legislative session requires school electors have the following qualifications: (1) Be 18 years of age and a United States citizen, (2) Reside in the state and in the school district 30 days preceding the election, (3) In the case of a trustee election, the elector must be a resident of the same trustee zone as the candidate or candidates for school trustees for whom the elector votes, (4) Be a registered voter governed by the provisions of title 34, Idaho Code.

In addition to the registration process of which the County Clerks are required to furnish the school districts lists of registered voters paid for by the school districts, school electors will still fill out an elector's oath form attesting that he or she possesses the qualifications described above at the polling place before they are allowed to vote. The elector may be required to furnish to the election official proof of residence which proof shall be established by either an Idaho motor vehicle operator's license or any other document definitely establishing the elector's residence within the school district or trustee zone.

Question: If you voted in last year's school election, are you registered to vote in this year's school election?

Answer: No. This new law did not go into effect until July 1, 1987 after the last school election. Registration has not been a requirement under previous election laws for schools. If you voted in the last general election in November 1986, your name will be on the county's voter list. Likewise if you register for this year's primary election May 24 (the following Tuesday after the school election) you would be registered for both the school election and the primary election. If there is any confusion as to the status of your registration for the school election, please contact your precinct registrar or your county clerk's office.

Since Kendrick Jr. School District No. 283 is in parts of three counties (Nez Perce, Latah and Clearwater), you could go into the county courthouse's auditor/recorder office at Lewiston, Moscow, or Orofino, respectively, depending upon which county you reside, and register.

To make it easier for patrons to register at the community level, the following precinct registrars are: Nez Perce County, Precinct No. 34 (Leland, Cameron, Southwick)—Ruth Heimgartner, Rte 1, Box 20, Juliaetta, 276-4580;

Clearwater County (Teakean), Precinct No. 8—Juanita Reece, 4368 Cavendish Road, Rte 1, Box 1068, Kendrick, Idaho, 476-4203;

Latah County: Precinct No. 23 (Juliaetta) Donna Burmeister, Juliaetta, 276-3281;

Precinct No. 24 (Kendrick): Dave Clayton, 289-5941; and Precinct No. 25 (Linden), Rose Ann Holt, Kendrick, 289-5331.

The polling places for the three counties will be:

Latah: Juliaetta Elementary School and Kendrick High School;

Nez Perce: Cameron Lutheran Church, and

Clearwater: the Albert Lawrence home.

Polling hours will be from 12 to 8 p. m.

Recreation District Seeks Juliaetta Projects

The Kendrick-Juliaetta Recreational District board members met Thursday evening, March 24 at the Kendrick City Hall. The board was meeting with the Juliaetta City to help determine whether there are any possible recreational projects in that city which could be helped by the recreational district. Also present at the meeting were Melanie Bacon and Frank Stockard, both of Juliaetta.

The funds are available and dedicated to some projects for Juliaetta. It was decided that the Juliaetta council will appoint an ad hoc committee to prepare proposals and project to submit to the recreational district. These will be reviewed by Juliaetta council and then submitted to the district.

A Reminder—Kendrick Water, Garbage Rates Increased April 1

City Clerk Sharon Harris would like to remind Kendrick residents that both water rates and charges for garbage pick up will increase with the April 1 billing in the City of Kendrick. The increases were approved at the Tuesday, March 3 meeting of the city council.

Minimum water rates will now be \$5.00, up \$1.00 from the previous \$4.00 minimum. Garbage pick up service will be \$6.00 per month, an increase of 40 cents per month over the former charge of \$5.60.

The city plans to dedicate any increased revenue generated from the water rate increase for the replacement of the existing water lines in town, some of which are in poor condition.

Lisa Gravelle Was Part Of All-State High School Music Concert in Moscow

Lisa Gravelle, the 16-year-old daughter of Paul and Carolyn Gravelle of Juliaetta, returned Saturday evening from 3 days in Moscow, Idaho, where she participated in clinics, rehearsals, auditions that culminated with the Idaho All-State High School Gala Concert Saturday afternoon.

Lisa plays the flute and is judged by music teachers to be among the best 500 high school musicians in Idaho. According to Robert Miller, director of the Lionel Hampton School of Music at the University of Idaho, "These kids are the cream of the crop, both musically and scholastically."

Lisa's conductor for the All-State band was Raymond G. Young, head of the Department of Music at Louisiana Tech University at Ruston, La. He holds bachelor and master music degrees from the University of Michigan. He has been honored as Louisiana Bandmaster of the Year and as euphonium soloist with the Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra in Japan. He also served as director at the University of Southern Mississippi. His bands have been featured in nationally televised Sugar Bowl and Senior Bowl shows.

The All-State band played "Florentine March" by Julius Fucik, "Music for Hamlet" by Alfred Reed, "Thus Do You Fare My Jesus" by J. S. Bach, and "Morning, Noon and Night in Vienna" by Franz von Suppe. The concert concluded with the combined orchestra/chorus/band playing "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" arranged by Howe-Neilson-Wilhouksy.

The concert was recorded live by the Sound Preservers Company of Olympia, Washington, and will be available in stereo records or stereo cassettes.

The Idaho All-State event takes place every two years, the next to be in 1990.

Sue A. Craig, 79, Passes March 28

Sue A. Craig, 79, a Kendrick homemaker and an active member of the local Senior Citizen program in the community, died of congestive heart failure early Monday morning March 28, at the Lewiston Care Center, where she had been a patient for only a few days.



The daughter of Marcus L. and Anna M. Robeson, she was born June 30, 1908, at Princeton, Idaho. As a child she moved with her family to Agatha, Idaho, on the Clearwater River.

She had made her home in the Leland and Kendrick areas since the 1920s.

On March 30, 1933, she married Oral R. Craig at Lewiston. He died August 22, 1968.

Mrs. Craig was a member of the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens at Kendrick and a charter member of the Kendrick Garden Club. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Even though she was not in the best of health, Sue was an active and involved part of the Senior Citizen programs in this area. She served as a reporter for both the Golden Sunset Seniors and for the activities of the Kendrick Meal Site. She was also well-known for her love of flower gardening and even as she grew older and her health failed, Sue's home and yard were neat and well-cared for, thanks to both her ambition and the loving care of her children.

Survivors include two sons, Neal Craig of Kendrick and Ron Craig of Lewiston; two daughters, Avia Weyen of Kendrick and Laurene Wallace of Cle Elum, Washington; two sisters, Madge Anderson of Lewiston and Harriet Evans of Moscow; 16 grandchildren, 30 great-grandchildren, and 5 great - grand-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by two sons, a daughter, three brothers and a sister.

The funeral will be held at 10:30 a. m. Thursday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Doug Littleton of the Kendrick Assembly of God officiating. Burial will follow at the Leland Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials may be given to the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Fund or the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens.

Juliaetta Pet Owners Asked Not to Let Dogs Roam

Juliaetta City Clerk reported this week that the city has received several complaints about dogs being allowed to roam within the city limits. The complaints are expected to increase as spring approaches and people begin planting gardens and caring for lawns and flower beds.

Mrs. Fey reminded Juliaetta residents that the city does have an ordinance that prohibits people from allowing pets to roam or run in the city without supervision.

The clerk also reminded dog owners that they must license their dogs if they keep them in the city limits. The fee is \$5 per year and tags may be purchased at the city hall.

New Postal Rates Effective April 3

The long-expected, but certainly not welcome, increase in postal rates becomes effective Sunday, April 3. Kendrick Postmaster Don Chrystal said the following increases will go into effect at the local post office Monday morning.

First class letter mail will jump from 22c to 25 cents for the first ounce and 20 cents for each additional ounce through 11 ounces. Priority mail rate from 12 oz. to 2 lbs. will be \$2.40.

Dana Magnuson To Seek Latah Commission Seat

Dana Magnuson, owner and manager of Magnuson Insurance in Kendrick announced this week he will seek the Democratic nomination for the District 3 seat on the Latah County Commission this fall.



LaVerne Nelson of Moscow now holds this four-year post. Nelson has served two terms and has said he will not seek re-election.

If he emerges as the Democratic candidate, Magnuson will face a Republican challenger in the November election. Moscow tire dealer Roy L. Krauss last week became the first to file for the District 3 commission seat.

In announcing his candidacy Magnuson said he feels there is a need for more visible and effective representation of rural residents. He said he also has a desire to assist in making county government more modern, professional and efficient and he has a personal interest in participating in formation of public policy at all levels, especially as regards the cooperation and communication with other public entities such as the University of Idaho, cities, smaller taxing districts, and State and federal agencies.

"I regard running for the office of Latah County Commissioner as applying to the voters for a part-time job with full-time responsibilities," Magnuson said this week. "My own business is stable enough to allow me to leave it in the hands of a capable office manager for a part of each or all of some days," he added.

Magnuson has operated his independent insurance agency in Kendrick since 1978.

"My experience as a small businessperson in an industry which touches the lives of everyone, both directly and indirectly, together with my experience as a City Councilman and Recreation District Clerk-Treasurer, allows me to offer both competent and creative leadership to all the citizens of Latah County," he said.

Magnuson is into his second term as a member of the Kendrick City Council, and has been Secretary-Treasurer of the Juliaetta-Kendrick Recreation District since its formation in 1978.

He is a past-president and current secretary-treasurer of the J-K Lions Club. He has also sat on the County Planning and Zoning Appeal Board in 1987; was formerly a Nez Perce County Precinct Committeeman, and was a member of the Nez Perce County Democratic Central Committee.

Dana was valedictorian of his graduating class at Kendrick High School in 1965 and graduated from Pomona College at Claremont, California in 1969 with a Bachelor of Arts degree.

He lives in Kendrick with his wife Ellen and two children, Anna, 6, and Robert, 4.

George F. Brocke, Jr., is the treasurer of his campaign committee.

JUBILEE !!

Nonresidential Building Construction Shows Upswing, Says Bank Report

A surge in nonresidential building highlighted Idaho's new construction activity in February.

This is the report of the monthly First Security Bank Idaho Construction Report, according to W. Dirk Hammond, manager of the Kendrick office of First Security Bank. The report is written by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, senior vice president and economist of First Security Corporation, regional financial services company.

For the first two months of 1988, nonresidential permit construction valuation totalled \$18.9 million compared with \$4.2 million over the corresponding 1987 period. In February, according to the report, more than 90 percent of the statewide nonresidential permit valuation occurred in Kootenai, Boise and Idaho Falls. Despite the recent mortgage-rate decline, new residential building was essentially unchanged, but permit valuation for multi-family and mobile homes was sharply lower. Overall, said First Security, Idaho's construction industry in early 1988 has fared reasonably well.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 56 major Idaho locations in February was \$24,467,444, or 35.4 percent above 1987, noted the report. New residential construction for 146 new dwelling units totalled \$8,738,696, a decrease of 21.1 percent in number and a decrease of 9.7 percent in value compared with a year ago. Included in the total residential permits were 117 single-family, four multi-family and 25 mobile home permits. New nonresidential construction valued at \$10,775,124, was up 850.6 percent from last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$4,953,624 were down 31.8 percent, said First Security.
