## Weed Control On CRP Land Is No Automatic Matter

Seeding land to grass or grass-legume mixtures does not naturally eliminate weeds, an extension weed scientist with the University of Idaho College of Agriculture tells owners of Conservation Reserve Program land.

"Only after establishment of a complete ground cover will the crop compete well against weeds," said Dr. Dan Kidder.

Kidder said many acres of CRP land have been taken over by weeds in the early stages and have required reseeding in order to establish an acceptable conservation cover.

"Annual weeds that germinate with the conservation cover may be so competitive that the crop will not establish," he said.

According to Kidder, it normally takes 20 to 30 years for grasses to outcompete weeds and to naturally establish on abandoned farmland. However, he said, clean, uniform stands can be achieved in one to three years with good management practices. Once a reasonably weed-free conservation crop is established, little maintenance is necessary in succeeding years.

Kidder said maintaining a weed-free cover crop is necessary in order to comply with the Idaho Noxious Weed Law and CRP contract requirements to maximize erosion con-

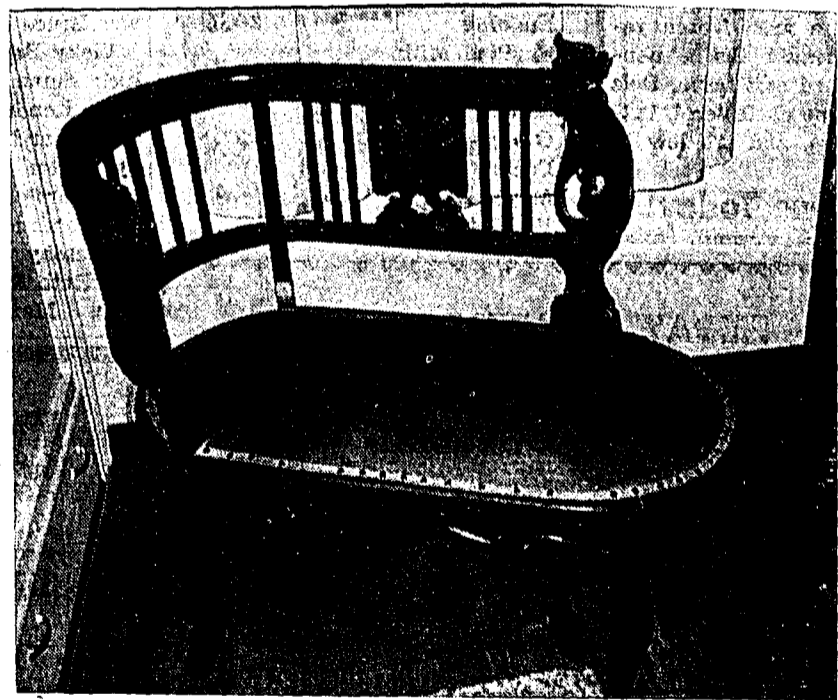

### Cowboy Polo Popularity Increases In Area

Cowboy Polo, a sporting event for horsemen and women, is becoming increasingly more popular in this area and several local riders are now participating.

An article in a local area daily newspaper this week, showed a Kendrick resident, Sandi Flowers, engaged in the sport. Here are some brief facts about the horseback game to help interested people better understand the sport. Cowboy Polo is a horseback game of skill whose object is to allow players to make points in their specified goal area. Two players are in each zone and there are five zones. The set of players are opposing and battle for the right to hit or keep a ball in an area closest to their zone or goal area. Personals and fouls are called in the set of rules. The rules are both for the safety of the horse and its rider.

Cowboy polo is a recognized sport throughout the northwest and beyond. Washington and Montana are especially active in this sport. In Montana, women are not allowed to participate. This rule may change in the future, as other states have excellent women players and compete against the Montana men's teams.

Anyone interested in watching the game played locally may go to the Lewis-Clark Saddle Club grounds in Clarkston on Saturdays (weather permitting) where the Inland Empire Polo Club practices. The team travels to Montana and Washington for tournament play.

This is a game for all ages and degrees of experience. There are often A and B teams. As in most sports, the B teams are made up of younger or less experienced riders.

Those interested in playing need to have the desire to practice, and be aggressive enough to chase a bouncing rubber ball on his horse. The ball goes "everywhere" possible and so must the horse and rider while staying in his or her own zone.
