THE PARSON'S CORNER

The Bible Under Attack

Once again the Bible is under attack. Some in very influential positions are saying that the Bible in its entirety is not trust worthy. Historically God has seen fit that those who stand against His Word do not stand for long. For example Sidney Collett in "All About the Bible" writes: "Voltaire, the noted French infidel who died in 1778, said that in one hundred years from his time Christianity would be swept from existence and passed into history. But what has happened? Voltaire has passed into history; while the circulation of the Bible continues to increase in almost all parts of the world..." Geisler and Nix in their book, "A General Introduction to the Bible" round off this example by pointing out "... only fifty years after his death (Voltaire's) the Geneva Bible Society used his presses and house to produce stacks of Bibles."

Higher criticism (those who use the "scientific method" and grammatical mechanisms to undermine the authenticity of the Bible) has, for example, attacked the Pentateuch with the basis that writing was nonexistent at the time of Moses. Thus saying that the first five books of the Bible were written by unknown authors J, E, P, and D, at a much later date. This is known as the "Documentary Hypothesis". In 1901 the Hammurabi Code (an ancient set of laws) was discovered on the 'black stele'. This 'black stele' shows writing pre-dating Moses by three centuries. In spite of this, the "Documentary Hypothesis" is still being taught in the majority of seminaries today.

In John 10:35, Jesus describes our Bible as 'The Word of God'. Meaning that the truths revealed in it have their origin with God and not with man. Thus it behooves us to recognize the Bible for what it is, God's word to us, and not side with the scorners whose unstated motive is to be unaccountable to God. Gamaliel said it well in Acts 5:38-39: "... And now I say unto you, refrain from these men, and let them alone; for if this counsel or this work be of men, it will come to nothing; but if it is of God, you cannot overthrow it; lest you be found even to fight against God." (Paraphrased).
