Question: Does everyone have to reregister for the school election on May 17?

Answer: No depending upon your own individual voting history. If you voted in the last general election (Andrus vs. Leroy for governor) in November 1986 and have not moved in the interim, your name is on the county computer precinct

Yes, if you only voted in the last in 1986 or the presidential election in 1984. If you are unsure or confused about your voting registration status, make a simple telephone call to your precinct registrar and they can tell you over the phone if you are on the county lists. If you are on Allen died previously. the lists you may vote, if not then you will have to re-register meeting

the qualifications of: 1. 18 years of age or older;

2. Citizen of the U.S.:

3. Resident of school district for 30 days and registered voter of the orials to the Deary Ambulance Fund. State of Idaho.

Question: Is this up-coming override levy of \$75,000 for fiscal year 1988-89 and \$65,000 for fiscal year 1989-90 on top of the \$95,000 voters voted on last year?

Answer: No. The \$75,000 over-ride levy for 1988-89 fiscal year reduces and replaces the \$95,000 over-ride levy that expires June 30, 1988. Likewise, the \$65,000 will replace and reduce the \$75,000 over-ride on June 30, 1989. The 1987 legislature permitted school districts to run 2 year over-ride levies to allow them to do longer-range financial planning than the previous yearly over-rides.
