As it was said in last week's article, that most observers agree that the school consolidation issue will be a "front burner" item in the 1989 legislature. Whether it passes this coming session or not, something that one wants to keep in mind is that any bonded indebtedness a district presently has, will remain with those property owners until it is retired. This is why the superintendent made the statement that he hoped that patrons could "stick with us because better times are coming down the road." when the school bond expires

in 7 years. However, should the legislature force consolidation, that elementary school obligation will be with the local taxpayers and we would also have to pick up the maintenance and operation levies of a new district. Consequently, we would see an increase in taxes in whatever district they consolidated us with and if it was Moscow, (should the Eagle, Idaho legislator's plan prevail), it could increase taxes from 30 to 100%. Observers of the legislature feel that one of the indicators legislators will be monitoring closely is the voting record of school over-rides. An increase in over-ride failures would be a signal that people want school consolidation.


