Kendrick's Water **Crisis Over**

Another water crisis came and went for the city of Kendrick without any apparent bad effects. On Thursday, May 19, the city received word from the State Health Dept. in Lewiston that the coliform count in the water samples submitted by the city exceeded that which are allowed by state standards and advised local water users to boil or disinfect all water from the Kend-

rick system before drinking it. Immediately after the warning, the city began to chlorinate the reservoir and also shut down the water supply from a spring it had been drawing from. It was felt that the spring was contributing to the high coliform count. The State Health Department officials have warned that springs always have the possibility of increased coliform.

A week ago Monday, May 23, the State lifted the warning after tests showed that the city water supply again met health standards for pur-

Mayor Darrel Brocke said the city is installing new chlorination units which will treat the water from the spring.

The city uses about 44 million gallons of water each year. The spring contributes about 10 million gallons and the rest is drawn from the main well in the west end of town and from the well near the site of the old city hall.
