## Public Meeting June 29 Will Discuss Possible Centennial Events for this Area

Just how the Kendrick and Juliaetta communities are going to be observing the centennial of their foundings will be the subject of a public meeting to be held Wednesday evening, June 29, at the Fire Hall in Kendrick. The meeting will begin at 7:00 p. m.

The State of Idaho is already preparing to observe its admittance into the Union of the United States in 1890. Kendrick was founded in October of the same year under the name of Latah City. Two years later, Juliaetta was established as a

town. So, as the state and the two communities approach their landmark anniversaries, plans must be made for proper observances—1990 may, at first seem a long time in the future, but it is only 18 months!

It was the realization of the need for planning to begin now, that has been in driving force for the calling to this June 29 public meeting.

At the last meeting of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association, held Jun. 9, Wayne Harris, president of that organization, appointed a centennial observance committee of Geo. Bröcke, Jr., Dana Magnuson, Harry Burmister, and himself. This committee was to meet and decide what initial steps were needed to begin planning for the centennials of Kendrick and Juliaetta.

This committee met Monday noon and decided that the first, and most needed move, would be a public meeting to make members of the communities aware of what was happening and to gain insight as to what was desired, suggestions, ideas, thoughts, and any other public input local people might have on this subject. In short, the first step must be to obtain a good sampling of public opinion and attitude. It will be impossible to plan and present a worthwhile program of events and projects without the help and cooperation of as many people and groups as possible.

Between now and the June 29th meeting, individuals and organizations might be thinking of what Kendrick and Juliaetta could do for the centennial. Everyone's ideas and thoughts are welcome—there are no plans now, so ideas and opinions are what is needed most.

Remember: the meeting is Wednesday, June 29 at 7 o'clock. Also remember that you are needed!

## U. of I. College of Ag. Awards Scholarships

## PUBLIC NOTICE—

### Lead Contamination Informative City of Kendrick Water System

This notice is being published in compliance with United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Rules and Regulations Part 141.34 Volume 52, Number 208 regarding public notice requirements pertaining to the chemical lead in public water systems.

The lead content of water provided by the City of Kendrick potable water system is currently well below EPA standards for lead contamination, according to the test of water samples that were taken at city wells. Because the tests have not revealed a conceivable level of lead in any of the well water supplies no additional steps are being taken by the city to reduce lead in the system.

Even though there is no evidence of lead contamination in Kendrick's well water supplies there is a potential source of lead contamination in the customer's own plumbing from the lead solder that was used to join copper pipe or from any old lead piping that might still be in service within the structure. Customers concerned that the level of lead present in their plumbing system may be higher than normal may have the water tested. These tests are the responsibility of the customer. Specific testing procedures may be obtained from the Department of Health. Unless tests from the customer's tap reveal lead above the maximum allowable by law, the City of Kendrick does not recommend that customers seek alternative water supplies.

The following U. S. Environmental Protection Agency notice is included:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done though your water may not be in violation of the current standards.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

If your home or water system has lead pipes or

If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or

If you have soft or acidic water, or

If water sits in the pipes for several hours.

The City advises concerned water customers that a number of steps may be taken to minimize exposure to water most likely to contain lead:

1. Using only water from the cold-water tap for cooking for drinking,

2. Running the tap for a few minutes to flush the system prior to using the water for cooking, drinking, or preparing baby formula. If there has recently been major water use in the household such as showering or bathing, flushing toilets, or doing laundry with cold water, flushing pipes should take 5 to 30 seconds; If not, flushing the pipes could take as long as several minutes.

3. Replacing lead pipes.

Customers are advised to inspect their plumbing to determine if lead pipes, solder, or flux have been used. Lead is a soft gray metal that scratches easily with a key or screwdriver and the scratches will be shiny. Lead levels can generally be reduced by replacing pipe and connections with lead-free materials. Plumbing materials containing lead are no longer permitted according to city building codes; customers are advised to use lead-free materials for plumbing repairs and modifications.
