Public Notice

Lead Contamination Informative, City of Juliaetta Water System

This notice is being published in compliance with United States Environmental Protection Agency (EP A) Rules and Regulations Part 141.31 Volume 52, Number 208 regarding public notice requirements pertaining to the chemical lead in public water systems.

The lead content of water provided by the City of Juliaetta potable water system is currently well below EPA standards for lead contamination, according to the test of water samples that were taken at city wells. Because the tests have not revealed a concernable level of lead in any of the well water supplies no additional steps are being taken by the city to reduce lead in the system.

Taylor Construction applied for and was granted a permit to construct a building with an estimated value of \$125,000. According to city clerk ordinance which gives guidelines for Nancy Fey and councilman Bruce May, the building will be erected for a Troy, Idaho merchant who intends to establish a full grocery market and also gas and diesel pumps on land across from Gem State Lumber Co., It is understood that construction of the new building will begin immediately with a completion date of early September.
