## Public Notice

### Lead Contamination Informative, City of Juliaetta Water System

This notice is being published in compliance with United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Rules and Regulations Part 141.31 Volume 52, Number 208 regarding public notice requirements pertaining to the chemical lead in public water systems.

The lead content of water provided by the City of Juliaetta potable water system is currently well below EPA standards for lead contamination, according to the test of water samples that were taken at city wells. Because the tests have not revealed a concernable level of lead in any of the well water supplies no additional steps are being taken by the city to reduce lead in the system.

Even though there is no evidence of lead contamination in Juliaetta's well water supplies there is a potential source of lead contamination in the customer's own plumbing from the lead solder that was used to join copper pipe or from any old lead piping that might still be in service within the structure. Customers concerned that the level of lead present in their plumbing system may be higher than normal may have the water tested. These tests are the responsibility of the customer. Specific testing procedures may be obtained from the Department of Health. Unless tests from the customer's tap reveal lead above the maximum allowable by law, the City of Juliaetta does not recommend that customers seek alternative water supplies.

The following U. S. Environmental Protection Agency notice is included:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done though your water may not be in violation of the current standards.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

If your home or water system has lead pipes or

If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or

If you have soft or acidic

water, or If water sits in the pipes for several hours.

The City advises concerned water customers that a number of steps may be taken to minimize exposure to water most likely to contain lead:

- Using only water from the cold-water tap for cooking or drinking.

- Running the tap for a few minutes to flush the system prior to using the water for cooking, drinking, or preparing baby formula. If there has recently been major water use in the household such as showering or bathing, flushing toilets, or doing laundry with cold water, flushing pipes should take 5 to 30 seconds; if not, flushing the pipes could take as long as several minutes.

- Replacing lead pipes. Customers are advised to inspect their plumbing to determine if lead pipes, solder or flux have been used. Lead is a soft gray metal that scratches easily with a key or screwdriver and the scratches will be shiny. Lead levels can generally be reduced by replacing pipe and connections with lead-free materials. Plumbing materials containing lead are no longer permitted according to city building codes; customers are advised to use lead-free materials for plumbing repairs and modifications.

## Walter McCall, 87, Former Resident, Passes June 19

Walter N. McCall, 87, a retired warehouseman at Kendrick and a part-time worker for the Lewiston Parks and Recreation Department, died of causes related to age Sunday afternoon at the Orchards Villa Nursing Center at Lewiston.

McCall had been a Lewiston resident since 1969.

He was born March 14, 1901, at Webb Ridge, to James C. and Mary M. McCall. The family later moved to Lind, Washington.

In 1906, McCall moved to Carlsbad, Alberta, Canada, where he lived for seven years until the family moved to Potlatch Ridge near Kendrick. He farmed on Potlatch Ridge for 15 years.

McCall graduated from high school at Leland, Idaho in 1919. He graduated from business college at Moscow in 1921.

He married Bertha E. Hartung November 11, 1925 at Cameron. She survives him at the family home at Lewiston.

In 1928, McCall moved to Kellogg, where he was employed as a miner at the Bunker Hill and Sunshine mines. In 1935, he and his family returned to Kendrick.

He was employed by Kendrick Rochdale as a warehouseman in the grain elevator until his retirement in 1969, when he moved to Lewiston.

McCall worked part time in the summer months for the parks and recreation department until ill health forced him to retire.

He enjoyed baseball, gardening, hunting, fishing and camping.

He was a member of Grace Lutheran Church at Lewiston.

Survivors in addition to his wife, Bertha, include three sons, Walter C. McCall of Chicago, Richard J. McCall and Robert R. McCall, both of Lewiston; a brother, Jack McCall of Orofino; eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a sister and two brothers.

The funeral will be at 11 a. m. Thursday at Grace Lutheran Church at Lewiston with the Rev. Curtis Fox officiating. Burial will be at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens at Lewiston. Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel is in charge of arrangements.

The Kendrick City Council met in regular session last Tuesday, June 14 with Councilmen Dana Magnuson, Jerry Brown and David Klatt present. The meeting was presided over by Mayor Darrell Brocke. Councilman Dick Benjamin was out-of-town that evening.

The council approved a variance granting Milton Patterson permission to construct new steps from his house to the street.

## New Market To Be Constructed In Juliaetta

Plans for the construction of a new market and service station in Juliaetta came to light at the Tuesday meeting of the Juliaetta city council when Dale Taylor of D. Taylor Construction applied for and was granted a permit to construct a building with an estimated value of \$125,000.

According to Fey and May, the project also includes the sale of the Juliaetta Market, now owned and operated by Harry and Donna Burmeister.

Talking to the Gazette late Tuesday night after the council meeting, May said he understands that the person who is contracting for the new store has also purchased the Juliaetta Market and plans to take over operation of that business on July 1 and operate it until the new building is completed, at which time the Juliaetta Market will be closed.

The Gazette talked to Mrs. Burmeister early Wednesday morning and she confirmed that she and her husband plan to sell the market to Gary Collins of Troy and he will take over the operation of the market on July 1 and operate it until the new building is completed and ready to open.

More information on this will be published as details become available.

In other business at the council session Tuesday night, Jack Browning of Browning Cut Stock Co., was present to show the council a rough draft of a proposed sewage lagoon he might be willing to build to replace the present treatment plant now operated by the city. The final plans and approval for this project have not yet been received, but it will be seriously considered by the city when costs, etc. and finalized.

The council also granted approval of franchises to install cable television systems in Juliaetta to both Dale Fry and Cablevision System of Moscow. The franchises will become effective August 1, 1988. Since it appears that Juliaetta could not support two different and competing cable systems, one of the two franchises will not be used when the Aug. 1 date is reached. The decision to grant both franchises was made to avoid issuing just one franchise and making it appear that a monopoly was agreed to.

The council also passed an ordinance making the use of compression brakes in city limits illegal. The ordinance will become effective upon its legal publication, as required by law.

#### DEATH IN THE LIGHT OF GOD'S LOVE
