Marie Jane Mills, a former Kendrick resident and a Moscow native, died of cancer Monday morning, July 18, at Madigan Army Medical Center in Tacoma, Wash. She was 65.

She was born December 10, 1922, at Moscow, the daughter of Ira W. and Elsie J. Havens. She was raised at Kendrick and graduated from Kendrick High School. She attended the University of Idaho for two years.

On May 31, 1942, she married Stanley R. Mills.

Mrs. Mills spent much of her time supporting her husband's military career in the U. S. Army. She participated in many of the activities of Army spouses and was active with Army Thrift Shop operations. She was secretary-treasurer of the Faculty Dames at Midwestern University at Wichita Falls, Texas, for two years.

Mrs. Mills also enjoyed doing needle work.

Her husband survives her at the family home in Tacoma. Other survivors include two daughters, Judith E. Porter of Bozeman, Mont., and Anita M. Thompson of Rigby, Idaho; a brother, George Havens of Juliaetta; and nine grandchildren.

A funeral was held Thursday at Short's Funeral Chapel at Moscow with the Rev. Michael Burr of the United Church of Christ officiating. Burial was at Moscow Cemetery.

Centennial and Pioneer Families to be Honored During Centennial Years

The Centennial committee of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association held another public meeting last Wednesday evening in the Kendrick Fire Hall. The meetings are being held to gain ideas and suggestions on the observance of the centennials of the foundings of the two towns. Approximately 20 people were present.

Lucille Magnuson presented a report on the preliminary work the centennial families committee had done since the last meeting. Lucille reported that people from each of the ridges around the towns will be

researching centennial and pioneer families so these might be honored or recognized during the years 1990 and 1992.

There will be two categories of families to be honored: Centennial families and Pioneer families. The qualification of being a centennial family is obvious—these will be families who were in the area prior to 1890 for Kendrick; 1892 for Juliaetta. There was some discussion on what might constitute a "Pioneer" family and it was decided that it should be families who have lived in the area for at least 70 years. So Kendrick, a pioneer family would be one who arrived in the area after 1890 but prior to 1920. For Juliaetta it would be after 1892 and before 1922.

"Old-Timers" Are Needed

In discussing gathering of information to be used during the centennial observances, Martha Long stressed the importance of utilizing and recording the wealth of information that is contained in the memories and recollections of the older people in our area. These older people have knowledge, both written and in their memories, that is not only useful and interesting, but which could also save many hours of research by younger persons who simply don't have this information. As the planning continues, ways will be found to contact the "old timers" to help gain a better and more complete picture of what happened in the area in the last hundred years.

October Date Set

At the first public meeting held in June there was much discussion on setting a date for Kendrick's actual centennial celebration. The discussion came up again last Wednesday and there appeared to be a consensus that October of 1990 would be the most practical date. The actual date of the formal founding of Kendrick was October 15, 1890. So it seems that somewhere close to this date will be the culmination of the Centennial observance.

Another Meeting In October

There will continue to be meetings to plan for the centennial, but with harvest getting underway now, it was decided not to set another meeting under Thursday, October 20 in the Kendrick Fire Hall.

Dillard Stone to be Honored on 80th Birthday Sunday, Aug. 7

Dillard Stone, 802 Linden Drive, Lewiston, will celebrate his 80th birthday anniversary Sunday, Aug. 7, with a potluck dinner at noon and an open house until 5 o'clock at the Kendrick Grange Hall.



Mr. Stone was born August 4, 1908 on Bear Ridge, near Kendrick, the son of Tom and Amy Galloway Stone. He has lived at Bovill, Boise, the Portland, Oregon and Sacramento, California areas, as well as many other places in the west, as he followed his occupation of heavy equipment operator and diesel mechanic.

Stone started making part, or all of his own living at an early age, as many young people did at that time, building on an 8th grade education to make his way. He learned his trade "by the seat of his pants", as learned to service, repair, and operate each new piece of equipment as it came on the job. His method was to convince the job boss the job needed to be done and then convince him that he, Stone, was the man to do it.

Dillard married the former Betty Lighthart on March 11, 1932 at Reno, Nevada. They had two children, Charles, who died in 1975, and Betty Jo (Jody) Smith, of rural Deary. They have 8 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. He has two sisters: Mrs. Grace Maher of Lewiston, and Mrs. Augusta Conley of Hood River, Oregon and two brothers: Rupert Stone of Milton-Freewater, Oregon, and Joe Stone of Wytheville, Virginia.

Mr. Stone was the wrong age to be active in either World War I or II, but served as a teacher of vocational gas and diesel operations and maintenance for the military for two years at Astoria, Oregon during World War II. He was also a member of the Oregon National Guard. He is a retiree of the State of Idaho Department of Highways, where he worked in the Boise shop.

Dillard's other interests have included helping others, and he and his wife have been honored as Volunteer of the Month by the Banana Belt Senior Citizens. He is an avid hunter, fisherman and gardener, and has enjoyed passing on his knowledge in these fields to young people. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Kendrick Grange, Banana Belt Senior Citizens, and A. A. R. P. and has held many offices in these organizations. He represented the A. A. R. P. and the Grange at the state legislative conferences for several years. He recently became interested in researching his heritage.

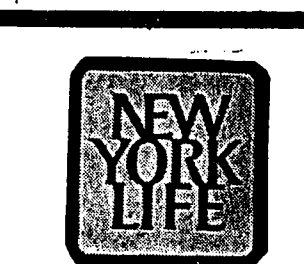

THE PARSON'S CORNER

The night was hot and the king was laying restless in his bed. It was the time of year when the kings go out to battle, but this king stayed home. Disaster was silently and patiently waiting, for it knew that the king was vulnerable for its attack. Christians are called kings, (Rev. 1:6) and it's when the Christian sits out of the battle that the disaster of back-sliding strikes. King David was drawn out to his balcony where he saw Bath-sheba in all her beauty bathing on a near-by roof. David was supposed to be at the battle, with his comrades putting God's

enemies to flight. Because he was at home, he became distracted, and vulnerable. Christians, who have "stayed at home" by not reading their Bibles, praying, and fellowshipping in a church become distracted and vulnerable. David thought that it would not hurt to look just a little. That looking, which seemed so small, was the first step to adultery and murder, and along the way deceit, bribery, and fraud joined. Back-sliding comes subtly, and quietly to the Christian. First it's a harmless family trip on Sunday skipping church, then it's, "well, I'll read my Bible tomorrow." But these small things left unchecked, will lead the Christian into the dark pits of disaster. Alcohol, adultery, a perverse mouth, and divorce are just a few of the slimy pits that are sealed off with guilt.

Some of you who are reading this article have once experienced God's presence in your life, but now feel like you're caught in a pit. Jesus' love for you still stands regardless. How could Jesus, who died for you, condemn you? Trouble, distress, adultery, alcohol, or any other thing imaginable cannot separate you from His love! (Rom. 8:34, 35).

King David was confronted by the prophet Nathan concerning his sin. The Holy Spirit may be talking to

you about your situation. David cried to God in Psalm 51, "Wash me thoroughly from mine iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin . . . Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from Thy presence; and take not Thy Holy Spirit from me. Restore unto me the joy of Thy salvation; and uphold me with Thy free Spirit." Jesus is always ready to pull anyone out of the slimy pits of back-sliding. Take David's example, and call out to Jesus, then you too can be known for having a heart after God's own heart like King David. (For the story of David and Bath-sheba read 2 Samuel 11.)
