The annual crop tour this year was split into two areas with the Cavendish area tour taking place on July 15, and the Fraser/Weippe area tour on July 19. Topics included discussion of the Russian Wheat Aphid problem, Bedrock Creek State Water Quality project, USDA and University of Idaho seeding trials, new herbicides for wild oat control, private forest land concerns, and private plant breeders presentation of new rust-resistant wheat strains. Sponsorship for these tours was provided by the Conservation District in conjunction with Lewiston Grain Growers, Brocke and Sons, and the U. of I. Extension Service.

On July 15th, the District's Bedrock Creek Project sponsored a barbe-cue for area farmer. Over 60 people gathered at the Cavendish School to share in the food and play volleyball or softball. ## Young Scholars Learn About Agriculture

Thirty-six high school students are learning about agricultural science in an innovative two-week program sponsored by the National Science Foundation, the University of Idaho, Washington State University, and the University of Idaho Centennial Committee. With the help of agricultural scientists, the young people are gaining an appreciation of science's contributions of agriculture.

During the last week of July, students participating in the Young Scholars Program talked with agricultural engineers, entomologists, food scientists, plant science researchers, and animal scientists.

From agricultural engineers, the students learned about high technology processes used in modern agriculture. With other researchers, they discussed issues and concepts in human nutrition, goals of plant science research, and research breakthroughs in animal physiology.

The students' schedule for the first week in August includes laboratory work assignments. The young people will take part in ongoing research projects. UI and WSU scientists will explain research objectives and will introduce the students to laboratory procedures.

Wayne Rush, student relations coordinator at the University of Idaho College of Agriculture, said the Young Scholars Program is helping the students explore careers in agriculture. "High School students know about farming, but they are not familiar with the scientific aspects of modern agriculture. In this program the students become involved in agricultural science. They obtain information that will be valuable for them as they plan their careers," he said.

Students selected for the Young Scholars Program have outstanding qualifications. Twenty-one are from Washington and 15 from Idaho. The Idaho students who participated in the program include Traci Anderson of Kendrick.

## Area Harvest Off to Good Start

The much needed rains of May and June quit at the right time, the weather turned warm and dry, and the fields are ripening at just about the right speed to allow the 1988 small grain harvest to get off to a good start in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area.

Local warehouses are reporting increased activity this week after the usual slow start. Peas, lentils, rape seed, early barley and some small amounts of wheat have all been cut and delivered as of Tuesday afternoon. Most of all of the reports seem to indicate good yields and quality this year.

George Brocke, Jr., reports that the first peas of the season came in to Brocke and Sons July 15, and since then Brocke said harvest has "been rolling right along". He said peas of all kinds have been cut in this area, lentils have come in from the Cottonwood Creek area and that most of the peas are looking good. George added that some of the early peas from the lower parts showed some bleaching, but as the farmers moved up the hills the quality began to get better.

Brocke said the rape seed crop looks "above average" and the peas are "definitely above average". He said the rains of May and June helped this picture. He estimated that about 20 percent of the expected deliveries were in.

"Just getting started," was the way Tom Jeffries summed up the harvest situation down at Lewiston Grain Growers where he is plant manager. It was two weeks ago Tuesday that the first barley started to come into Juliaetta and Kendrick from the lower elevations below Juliaetta. Some wheat has come in from Don Hoisington and Frank Heimgartner's places.

LGG has also taken in some black peas at the Peck warehouse.

Jeffries said the first wheat appears to be a pretty good quality. Harvest was also just getting started for Kendrick Rochdale, reported MaryBelle Larson, one of the managers of the local co-op. She said Dale Silflow brought the first peas of the season in July 20. Ted Meyer brought in the first wheat this Monday.

Mrs. Larson said that both the peas and the wheat were looking good this year.

The Latah County 4-H Horse Show will be conducted beginning at 9:00 a. m. on Sunday, August 7, at the Latah County Fairgrounds. This is the final event for horse project members, when all projects will be evaluated and graded. County 4-Hers will be competing for ribbons in Fitting and Showing, Bareback Equitation, Hunt Seat Equitation, and Western Trail. There will also be a Western Games Competition, with games including Pole Bending and Barrel, Keyhole, Figure 8, and Flag Racing.

The two top competitors in each class can then move on to the highest level of competition, the District 1 4-H Horse Show, where they will compete against 4-Hers representing counties as far north as Boundary and as far south as Idaho. The District Show will be hosted by Latah County on Saturday, August 13, and will also be conducted at the Fairgrounds beginning at 9:00 a. m.

District and County 4-H members and leaders welcome and encourage anyone interested in attending. Admission is free.

**THE PARSON'S CORNER**

**WORSHIP**

When we attend a church service it is often called a worship service or a time of worship. But is it really WORSHIP? I want to describe what might be a typical Sunday morning church service. I believe with all my heart that the vast majority of those attending church do so with a pure and worshipful heart. But the question is, are we accomplishing what our hearts have set out to do on Sunday morning? Is there something more we need to enter into? I hope the following will help answer these questions.

The service might open with a favorite hymn like "Jesus Saves!" and then the pastor offers the opening prayer. As the pastor prays he asks God for many things: to be in the service, and to care for those who are suffering in one way or another. Announcements are next and then some more songs. The climax of the singing may include "Amazing Grace". Then comes the pastor's message, a powerful one that challenges our hearts. Some where in the service an offering was taken. And at the end, the pastor or trusted saint prays again, this time asking God to help His people do His work and keep His people safe until next week.

In the midst of all this has there been worship? There has been a beautiful gathering of the saints with high praise. Petitions have been made over the offering and for those in need, but no worship. The hymns that were sung tell all about what Jesus has done and what God wants to do and how great and marvelous God is, but no worship. There has been praise, but no worship.

In the Gospel according to Luke,

and in the tenth chapter we discover a story about two women. These two gals are sisters and share the same house. The oldest, who is Martha, has invited Jesus to come to the house and stay a while. Jesus accepts the invitation and comes to the house gladly. So far in the story it sounds very much like church, we gather together and invite Jesus to be our guest. Now Martha is very concerned that the appetizers are served fresh, refreshments are poured, the table is set with enough places, and that Jesus' place setting gives Him the honor and recognition that He deserves. She becomes overwhelmed with what needs to be done and then makes a petition to Jesus. This still sounds like Church! We are very busy seeing to this and to that and petitioning God that these important things get done. Many things are done, but worship is not one of them.

Meanwhile, there's a younger sister named Mary. She appears to be doing very little . . . just sitting at Jesus' feet. Mary is worshipping. She comes to Jesus with no projects, works or petitions, she simply comes and gives herself completely and totally. Worship is being in His presence, giving your total self, loving Him for who He is. Jesus called this needful and the good part. Praise is good, we are commanded to do so. Praise is telling and sing about God, worship is giving Him love by saying directly to Him, we love Him and resting in his presence. Will we do the needful and good part by going beyond praise into worship?

## Public Notice

### City of Juliaetta Water System Lead Contamination Informative,

This notice is being published in compliance with United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Rules and Regulations Part 141.31 Volume 52, Number 208 regarding public notice requirements pertaining to the chemical lead in public water systems.

The lead content of water provided by the City of Juliaetta potable water system is currently well below EPA standards for lead contamination, according to the test of water samples that were taken at city wells. Because the tests have not revealed a concernable level of lead in any of the well water supplies no additional steps are being taken by the city to reduce lead in the system.

Even though there is no evidence of lead contamination in Juliaetta's well water supplies there is a potential source of lead contamination in the customer's own plumbing from the lead solder that was used to join copper pipe or from any old lead piping that might still be in service within the structure. Customers concerned that the level of lead present in their plumbing system may be higher than normal may have the water tested. These tests are the responsibility of the customer. Specific testing procedures may be obtained from the Department of Health. Unless tests from the customer's tap reveal lead above the maximum allowable by law, the City of Juliaetta does not recommend that customers seek alternative water supplies.

The following U. S. Environmental Protection Agency notice is included: The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of

exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done though your water may not be in violation of the current standards.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest: If your home or water system has lead pipes or If your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or If you have soft or acidic water, or If water sits in the pipes for several hours.

The City advises concerned water customers that a number of steps may be taken to minimize exposure to water most likely to contain lead:

1. Using only water from the cold-water tap for cooking or drinking.
2. Running the tap for a few minutes to flush the system prior to using the water for cooking, drinking, or preparing baby formula. If there has recently been major water use in the household such as showering or bathing, flushing toilets, or doing laundry with cold water, flushing pipes should take 5 to 30 seconds: If not, flushing the pipes could take as long as several minutes.
3. Replacing lead pipes.

Customers are advised to inspect their plumbing to determine if lead pipes, solder or flux have been used. Lead is a soft gray metal that scratches easily with a key or screwdriver and the scratches will be shiny. Lead levels can generally be reduced by replacing pipe and connections with lead-free materials. Plumbing materials containing lead are no longer permitted according to city building codes; customers are advised to use lead-free materials for plumbing repairs and modifications.



### Pre-Historic Indian Campsite Excavated

In the first major excavation in the Hells Canyon National Recreational Area, U. S. D. A. Forest Service Archaeologists have uncovered evidence of an ancient Indian campsite believed to be 5,000 years old.

More than 10 archaeologists from Idaho, Oregon, Washington, and Ohio are currently excavating an area on the bank of the Snake River at Pittsburgh Landing, located on the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest, near the Oregon border.

The archaeologists have found arrowheads, knives, scrapers, and pestles, which have been dated through radiocarbon analysis. The evidence suggests the ancestors of modern day Shoshone and Nez Perce Indians hunted, fleshed hides, and processed food materials at the site. However, archaeologists are not sure whether the site was a permanent or seasonal camp. Evidence of a much younger

Indian campsite, between 500 and 1,000 years old has been found on the site as well.

Archaeologists say that ancient Indians would have found the area attractive because it is relatively warm in the winter and has plenty of game, as well as roots and berries.

The ancient Indian campsite is now a popular recreation area. The Forest Service plans to develop the area next year by installing boat and raft launching ramps, a campground, a parking lot, and a day use facility.

However, the Forest Service does not want progress to come at the expense of learning about our past. It instigated the excavation so that information and evidence about the site and the people who lived there can be collected and analyzed before development.

Forest Service Archaeologists will be working in Hells Canyon until early September.

## Industry Construction Grows Rapidly, Says Bank Report

Rapid growth in Idaho's construction industry continued in June, with the monthly permit total valuation nearly double the year-ago levels.

This is the report of the monthly First Security Bank "Idaho Construction Report," according to W. Dirk Hammond, Manager of the Kendrick office of First Security Bank. The report is written by Dr. Kelly K. Matthews, senior vice president and economist of First Security Corporation, regional financial services company.

First Security said that while much of the expansion momentum remains centered in nonresidential building, new single-family residential construction recorded another strong month in June. During the first six months of 1988, noted the report, total construction value in the Boise-Ada County area was \$141 million, a gain of 96 percent over the \$72-million permit valuation of last year.

"The resurgence in single-family building in May and June is expected to continue in the third quarter," said First Security. The average single-family permit valuation in June statewide was \$87,406, compared with \$80,478 in the first six months of 1988 and \$73,885 in the first half of 1987. Of the 56 locations in this report, 30 locations during the Jan-

uary-June period had a total of five or fewer single-family permits. This compares with 28 locations in that category a year ago, indicating that many areas of the state continue to experience minimal population and new housing growth."

The report noted that despite the significant growth in total construction activity, Idaho's construction employment in May was 13,400, unchanged from last year. Average hourly earnings in the construction industry were \$13.13—an increase of 3.7 percent over a year ago. In the months ahead, said First Security, new construction jobs in Idaho are likely to increase, and wage increases will edge higher, reflecting a growing labor demand.

Total construction value for authorized building permit construction in 56 major Idaho locations in June was \$87.4 million, or 96.1 percent above 1987. New residential construction for 357 new dwelling units totaled \$23.4 million, an increase of 6.9 percent in number and an in-

crease of 39.1 percent in value compared with last year. Nonresidential construction valued at \$20.7 million was up 142.5 percent from last year, while alterations and repairs totaling \$23.3 million were up 158.1 percent, the report said.
