## Water Still a Problem for City of Juliaetta

Despite the problems and shortage of last year which resulted in the drilling of a new well at the cost of several thousand dollars, the City of Juliaetta still finds itself facing a similar shortage this summer and a man from the State Dept. of Health will be in town Wednesday to meet with councilmen and city employees in an effort to find a solution to the troubles. This was the word that came out of the meeting of the Juliaetta council Tuesday evening.

Dirk Hammond, manager of the First Security Bank and a resident of Juliaetta, was at the Tuesday night session to report that he had been contacted by the state man who had heard of Juliaetta's water problems and wanted to meet with the council to determine if the state could be of assistance.

After clamping a complete ban on outside watering last week, the council eased the restrictions enough this week to permit watering on an odd-even day basis for a period of one hour each day. As of Tuesday, those city residents below State St. could water between 8 and 9 each even day. Those residents above State St. could water outside for a similar length of time on odd numbered days. (That's 8 to 9 p. m.)

When the weather warmed up and usage increased this summer, the wells just couldn't keep up an adequate supply.

A letter from Latah County Sheriff Ken Buxton was read regarding law enforcement in the valley. Both Kendrick and Juliaetta are interested in having a Latah County Deputy reside in this area. Sheriff Buxton's letter indicated that his office was also interested in this possibility, but details of such an arrangement will have to be worked out. There may be costs to the towns involved.

Diane Groseclose was present at the meeting with an estimate on what the costs would be if she were to do some of the city's administrative work on a computer. This is being taken under advisement by the council.

There was a discussion of installing a sidewalk from First Street to the site of the new grocery store that is under construction across the highway from Gem State Lumber's office. The council agreed that this is needed. In an effort to get financial help with this, the city will investigate the possibility of getting some help from the J-K Recreation District.

The council also voted to accept the proposed budget for the coming fiscal year and a public hearing on the budget will be held Tuesday, Aug. 23, at 7:30 p. m. at the Library.

A council meeting will be held at 7:00 p. m. that same date, prior to the public hearing.

The daughter of Ernest and Bertha Heimgartner, she was born on Sept. 1, 1922, at Compton, Calif., where she graduated from high school June 13, 1940. She was confirmed in the Evangelical Lutheran Church at Compton March 21, 1937.

She married Harold H. Silflow January 10, 1943, at Cameron. He survives her at the family home at Cameron.

Mildred was a talented decorator and painter. She drew the plans for the family's home and enjoyed flowers and traveling.

She raised her brother, Ernie, after the death of their mother, and also raised a niece, Susan Schwarz, after the death of her sister Irene. She also provided a home for her father, Ernest, for nine years.

Survivors, in addition to her husband, Harold, include a daughter, Kathy M. Garland of Washougal, Washington; a brother, Ernie Heimgartner of Clarkston; and two grandchildren.

A sister, Irene Schwarz, died previously.

The funeral was held Monday morning at 10 at the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church with the Rev. John Blom officiating. Burial was at the Cameron Cemetery.

## Saturday Rain Failed to Slow Area Harvest

A surprise rain in the early hours last Saturday morning didn't slow the harvest operations in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area. All three warehouses in Kendrick reported that deliveries were coming in on an increasing basis this week and that the crops were looking good in both quality and quantity.

The rain did settle some of the dust and the temperatures dropped down into the seventies and middle eighties early in the week, but were gradually starting to moved back into the nineties by mid-week.

"Better than average," was the way Geo. Brocke, Jr., described the peas and lentils coming into Brocke and Sons this week. He said the small sieve peas were just about harvested, Alaska peas were about 35 percent complete and rape seed approximately 90 percent finished. Lentils coming into the Brocke warehouses from the Southwick area were estimated at about 15 to 20 percent completed and Austrian peas about 50 percent harvested.

"We should be going good by the end of the week," say Tom Jeffries, manager of Lewiston Grain Growers warehouses in the Kendrick area. Jeffries said the farmers are beginning to finish up in the peas and are moving into the spring barley and some fall wheat. Wheat coming in has been testing well in weight.

Jeffries said that up to Tuesday afternoon there have been about 15 to 20 loads a day coming into the Cavendish warehouse. The warehouse at Lenore has been taking in about 40 to 45 loads each day and Kendrick has been receiving about 45 loads a day.

Marybelle Larson, one of the managers at Kendrick Rochdale reported that harvest was not even at the halfway mark yet, but was picking up each day. Both barley and wheat is coming in from all parts of the area and is "looking excellent."

## Kendrick Council Passes Mobile Home Park Ordinance

At a meeting Tuesday evening, the Kendrick City Council approved and passed a mobile home park ordinance which will set regulations and guidelines for the construction and use of mobile home parks within the city limits. The ordinance will become effective with its signing and publication. Under the provisions of Ordinance No. 619, mobile home parks are defined as many plot of ground upon which two or more mobile homes, occupied for dwelling or sleeping are purposes are located.

The ordinance requires a permit be obtained from the City Clerk before a mobile home park is constructed, and also that the city be shown the plans and lay-out of such a park. A permit fee of \$25 for each space will also be assessed.

It is understood that the ordinance does not affect single unit mobile homes already in place within the city limits.

### Swim Pool Variance Denied

The council was also informed at the Tuesday night meeting that the state of Idaho Health Department has again denied the city a variance which would allow the installation of a diving board at the swimming pool without deepening one end of the pool. The city is now faced with the expense of major pool re-modeling to meet the requirements if it intends to put in a diving board.

The council also approved a grant of \$100 to the Latah County Centennial Committee to help promote centennial activities.

Three members of the Kendrick Council will attend a meeting Aug. 11 to be held in Genesee concerning the garbage disposal problems with Latah Sanitation and the small communities it serves. Mayor Darrell Brocke and councilmen David Klatt and Dana Magnuson will represent Kendrick at this meeting.

The council also approved a budget of \$149,430.00 for the coming fiscal year. A public meeting on the budget will be held at the city hall on Tuesday, August 30 at 7:00 p. m.

## Applications for Part-time Rural Mail Carriers Being Taken Aug. 15-19

Kendrick Post Master Don Chrystal said this week that applications for the position of rural carrier associates will be accepted at Post Offices in the area August 15 to 19.

Rural carrier associates are needed to provide service on established regular rural routes in the absence of regular rural carriers or to provide service on auxiliary routes. This is a non-career position with no guaranteed work hours. Rural carrier associates are selected from a register of eligibles established as the result of an open competitive rural carrier examination.

Position Requirements are:

- 1) Qualify on written examination.
- 2) Valid state drivers license.
- 3) Two year's driving experience.
- 4) Good driving record.
- 5) Use of personal vehicle.
- 6) Meet personal & medical suitability requirements.

After 1 year as a Rural Carrier Associate, an employee may apply for full-time rural carrier positions, as vacancies occur.

Compensation: \$10.39 (average hourly rate) and equipment maintenance allowance for use of personal vehicle.

Chrystal said application Form 2479-AB may be obtained from any of the following locations: Culesac, Juliaetta, Kendrick, Lapwai, Lewiston, Lenore, Orofino, Kamiah, Cottonwood, Craigmont, Grangeville, Kooskia and Pomeroy.

Applicants will be contacted concerning examination scheduling.

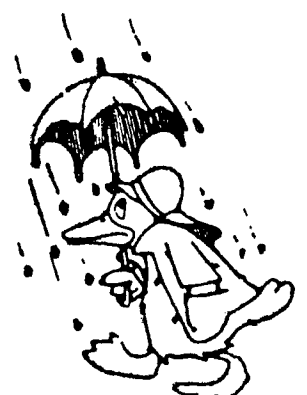
