## Policy for Free, Reduced Price Lunches Announced by Kendrick School District

Kendrick School District No. 283 this week announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program. Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used in determining eligibility. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available from the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income and the amount and source of the income received by each household member; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy, Eldon Tay-

lor, superintendent, will review the applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Doug Harris, board chairman, Kendrick, Idaho, 289-4622 for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown below.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household wished to apply for benefits for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes he/she has been discriminated against, he/she should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

## Swimming Pool to Close For Season August 27

The summer swimming season will end at the Kendrick War Memorial swimming pool on Saturday, Aug. 27, it was reminded this week by pool manager Selby Woods. The pool session will end at 5 p. m.

This was a slow season at the pool. The early part of summer was cool and wet, then when the weather did improve, the attendance didn't reach what it usually does, Woods said.

Some of the decrease in pool attendance may also be attributed to the lack of a diving board, which is an attraction for the older children. The State Health Dept. won't give the Recreation District approval to put a new board in until the depth of one end of the pool is lowered to conform to state requirements.

Woods also said there will be no evening session on Friday, Aug. 26.

## Kendrick Sets Restrictions on Outside Water Use

The dry season finally caught up with the City of Kendrick this week as the council imposed water restrictions Tuesday for the first time this summer. The restrictions are effective immediately and will continue in force until further notice, said city maintenance man Don Bateman.

For watering purposes the city has been divided into two sections:

From the West city limits to Kerby Street (the street going up school house hill) residents on the North side of this line may water on Mondays, Wednesday and Fridays. There have been no hour restrictions.

Residents below this line and out to the East city limits may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

There will be NO SUNDAY watering permitted, Bateman said.

The public's cooperation in this matter will be appreciated.

It was decided to impose watering restrictions when it was found that the output of all the city water sources had dropped substantially.

It is hoped that these restrictions, which aren't too severe, will allow the city to keep the reservoirs at an adequate level.

## Construction of New Juliaetta Market is Progressing

Construction of the new Juliaetta Marketing progresses smoothly and about on schedule said owner Garry Collins this week. Workers from D. Taylor Construction have footings poured and will soon begin raising the walls. Collins said he hopes to have the new business operating by the first or the middle of October.

When completed the new business will offer a full-service grocery store with deli items also available, plus a self-service gas and diesel island with a card-lock system.

Collins, who at present lives in Troy, bought the Juliaetta Market from Harry and Donna Burmeister and took over operation July 1.

The new market will be located across the highway from the offices of Gem State Lumber Co. in the west part of town on two acres of ground. Collins said the building containing the market will be 76 x 44 feet and will be of frame and steel construction with a steel and partial brick veneer facing. Plans are that approximately 3,300 square feet of floor space will be available.

The new market, when completed, will offer a complete grocery service with meat and produce departments and in addition will have a delicatessen area offering certain deli

and fast food features. The new owner said the self-serve gas island in front of the market will have both leaded and unleaded gasoline available, plus a diesel gas pump. There will be a card-lock system also installed. Coleman Oil Company of Lewiston will be the supplier.

Propane refilling tanks may also be installed.

"We're hoping to offer as many services and supplies as possible to the people of this area," Collins said.

When the new market is ready to open, Collins said he will close the present store on main street. If the gas pumps are ready before the main store, he said these will be opened for business. At the present time there is no retail gasoline outlet in Juliaetta.

Collins will continue to be assisted in the new store by Mary Jo Vallem and Debbie Denler.

Collins was born and raised in Moscow and has been in the grocery business since 1966 when he went to work for Rosaur's. He is married and he and his wife are parents of two youngsters Ben and Erin.

The store will be open from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m. seven days a week, Collins said.

## Juliaetta Cable Installation Work now Underway

A work crew under contract to the Moscow CableVision company is now in the processing of installing lines and equipment which will bring Juliaetta its first television cable system, greatly increasing the number of channels now available.

Jim Uebelher, CableVision's general manager from Moscow, said Tuesday that his company will transmit its signal from Moscow Mountain by micro-wave to a receiver

to be located on a site owned by Bill Belt. The company will then bring cable down the hill on poles of the Clearwater Power Co. to the city limits. Inside the city the cable lines will be attached to existing poles under an agreement with the Washington Water Power Co. Using these WWP poles CableVision will be able to bring its service to just about every location in town.

"We expect to be able to serve all of Juliaetta by the end of September," Uebelher stated.

For the basic fee of \$14.95 per month, CableVision subscribers will be able to choose from 28 different channels, the CableVision manager said. These include the regular network programming from Spokane and Lewiston, Public Broadcasting stations from Moscow and Lewiston, locally originated programs such as a weather channel, plus 24-hour a day sports and news channels. This is in addition to a number of satellite programs.

There will be optional channels also available at additional cost. These include HBO, Show Time, the Movie Channel and Disney Channel. Cost for these channels varies from \$11.00 per month for HBO to \$9.00 per month for the Disney station.

For television sets that have just 12 channel capacity, the company will furnish at no extra charge, a

converter unit that will allow for all stations on its signal. Optional converters with remote control may also be obtained.

In addition to its television service CableVision also offers, at an extra \$2.00 per month, FM radio service which allows for the reception of FM radio broadcasts.

Uebelher said his company will be using both the mail and personal door-to-door contact with Juliaetta residents to offer its services.

He said anyone with questions may call the office in Moscow at 882-2832.

## What About the Old Service?

With the arrival of a television cable service to the community, the future of the old system has undoubtedly crossed the minds of many.

Juliaetta is, and has been for a number of years, served by a community owned translator. This system has been cussed and discussed—but it has provided the town with television at a very low cost—local users are asked to pay \$1.00 per month. This \$1.00 per month compared to \$14.95 could be a matter of concern for some families; especially households on a fixed income, such as senior citizens living on their social security checks.

This was also the thinking of the Juliaetta City Council when it granted a non-exclusive franchise to the cable company.

"We'll protect it," was the reply from city councilman Jim Cuddy when he was asked about the future of the old TV system. "We want to see it stay in," he added. The continuation of the old system would give local users an option of signing up for the new service, or not signing, but still retaining the present television service.

**Kendrick School District Announces  
Free Milk Policy for Kindergarten**

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 this week announced its policy for free milk for Kindergarten children unable to pay the full price for milk served under the Special Milk Program. Each school and the office of Kendrick School District has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility:

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown above are eligible for free milk.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free milk, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility by school or other program officials. For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income and the amount and source of the income received by each household member; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. Under the provisions of the Free Milk Policy, Eldon Taylor, Superintendent, will receive applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Doug Harris, board chairman, Kendrick, Idaho 83537. Telephone 289-4622.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for free milk. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for these children, the household should contact the school for more information.

In the operation of child nutrition programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes he/she has been discriminated against he/she should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20205.

"you're beautiful," in their native language. She said the Thai women love to hear it. I tried to learn the phrase, not or the Thai women, but so that I could impress my wife. Again, in the same letter to the Romans, Paul writes how he with signs and wonders shared the Gospel of Jesus Christ (Romans 15:19). Paul really believed that the Gospel was the power of God, as a result there were signs and wonders present when he did share. The Gospel is the power of God, and if we will act in faith we too will see the resulting signs and wonders. The time to be bold is now. Never has there been a time on this earth that the power of God has been so evident.

Jesus is expecting us to be bold and unashamed. Mark 8:38 says very plainly that Jesus will be ashamed of us if when He returns He finds us ashamed of Him. Why not be bold, and step out in faith? If God expects that of us then we know that it will bless, encourage, and strengthen us as well as allowing the power of the Gospel to work for others.
